

NOTICE. We hear that 12 French Men of War are sailed from Toulon, which cruise in the Mediterranean from the Straights as high as Malta, and that 12 more are fitting out in that Port, and 20 Gallies at Marseilles.

Vienna, April 2. On the 22d of the last Month a Party of 800 of the Malecontents of Hungary advanced into the Neighbourhood of this Place, and burnt the Villages of Schwecket and Mansworth, and others, after which they retired to their former Posts. This occasioned a great alarm in this City, the Burghers were ordered to take Arms, and a Line to be made without the Suburbs to secure them from any Attempt. The 26th Adjutant General Maltemberg arrived here from the Imperial Army, under General Heister, with several Colours, which had been taken from the Malecontents in 3 or 4 different Engagements on the 22d, 23d and 24th past, whereof the Adjutant gives the following Account: General Heister marched the 22d from Ebensturz, with intent to attack Count Carols, who lay at Eysenstaat with the Body of Malecontents under his Command; but upon his Arrival there, found the Place abandoned by the Enemy, who had carried away with them 4 Pieces of Cannon, and all the Provisions that were in the Place; a great part whereof was taken by General Heister at Gála, a considerable Village on the Lake of Neusiedl, where he overtaken a Body of the Malecontents, 200 of them having posted themselves in the Church-yard, pretending to make Resistance, were all put to the Sword. The two days following the Imperialists continued to pursue the Malecontents along the Lake, and having overtaken their main Body near St. Nichola, intirely routed them, and took from them 14 Pieces of Cannon, with a great number of Oxen, and a considerable Quantity of Corn, Wine and other Provisions. It is said this Body of Rebels consisted at first of 10000 Hussars, and 3000 Foot, the first made little Resistance, but the Foot defended themselves very well, about 700 of them were killed, and as many drowned, either in the Lake of Neusiedl, or in the River Leita; two of their Officers were brought Prisoners to Brünn; but to the rest the Germans gave no Quarter. Count Carol seeing his Forces quite dispersed, made his escape into the Island Schab. This Express left General Heister at St. Nichola, preparing to march toward Raab, with intent to retress his Men in and about the Island abovementioned. The 31st past 250 of the Malecontents who had been taken Prisoners by General Heister's Forces in some other Encounters, were brought hither, who are employed in working on the new Lines which are making for the Security of our Suburbs. This Expedition has freed the City of Oedenburgh, which had been in a manner blocked up 9 weeks. The Garison and Inhabitants of that Place had also made some successful Sallies against the Rebels before their Retreat, which happened on the 23d past, 100 of them, and in another, which happened on the 24th past, surprised 170 more in the Village of Combofs, where they took 49 Prisoners, and killed all the rest. Thus is all this side or the Danube cleared of the Malecontents, except at Gintz, a Town three Leagues distant from Oedenburgh, where it is believed there may be about 3000 of them. Lieutenant Colonel Herberstein, who is Captain of the *Rakians*, passed over the *Drave* at *Verona* on the 26th past with 10000 Men, and the Ban of *Croatia* is shortly expected at *Dernia* with a considerable Body of *Croatians*, in order to join the former, and march into *Hungary*, where they are to act against the Malecontents in concert with General Heister. The Peasants of *Croatia* have retaken the Castle of *Birstein* from the Rebels.

Zarich, April 5. The French Ambassador has writ a Letter to this Canton, to acquaint them, That having laid before his Master their Demands at the late Diet at *Soleure*, concerning a Neutrality for *Savoy*, he had received Orders to ask them whether they would put any Forces of their own into that Duchy, or if it should be left to the Defence of the Inhabitants themselves; in which last Case the French King desired to know what Security he should have that he should not be attacked in his own Territories through those of *Savoy*; and these Queries being answered, he would let them know his Intentions. Upon this a General Diet is appointed to meet at *Baden* the 13th Instant; and the French Ambassador and the Envoy of *Savoy* are desired to procure full Powers from their respective Masters against that time, for concluding upon a Neutrality for *Savoy*. They write from *Basse*, that the French have drawn together a Body of 18000 Men at *Huningen*, and are laying a Bridge there over the *Rhine*; by which it should seem that they design to march into *Swabia*, either by the way of the *Red-Rose*, or of the Town of *St. Blas* in the *Black Forest*; but the Germans have provided very carefully for that purpose, Passes, having cast up some Lines and Redoubts for that purpose, which General *Thungen* can reinforce as there shall be occasion. Some think this is only a Feint, to conceal the Enemy's true Designs, which they imagine to be to pass over the *Rhine* at *Montz*, and march into *Swabia* through the *Palatinate*; and the Duchy of *Wirttemberg*. The *Camilars* have lately obtained a considerable Advantage near *Pont St. Esprit* over a Battalion of the French King's Marines, having drawn them into an Ambush: The French in their publick Accounts own that 300 Soldiers of that Battalion were killed, with all their Officers, except the *Sieur la Jonquieres*, their Commander in Chief, who narrowly escaped by swimming over the *Rhône*; but there are private Letters from *Languedoc* which say, that the Slaughter was much greater, the *Camilars* having given no Quarter. They write from *Verona*, that the Germans have recovered *Concordia* from the French, and taken 300 of them Prisoners.

Hague, April 15. N.S. The States General have at length resolved upon the Nomination of the General Officers to command their Forces next Summer, who are the same that have been formerly mentioned. The French began the 31st past to form a Camp near the Place where the Count de *Nojelles* demolished their Lines some time ago; and being superior in number to the Forces which were drawn together towards *Lige* to observe them, they repaired the Lines, and are since returned to their former Quarters. Letters from France bring an Account of a considerable Detach given by the *Camilars* to the French King's Forces: Some Advices say, the Loss of the latter amounts to 1000 Men. They write from *Paris*, that the French King had appointed the Marshal de *Sillars* to command his Forces in the *Couvenes*, in the room of the Marshal de *Montcaulx*; That the Marshal de *Chateaufort*

was gone to *Toulon*, to command the Men of War that are fitting out there; and that the Count de *Toulouse*, Great Admiral of France, would shortly set out for *Brest*, to go on board a Squadron which is fitting out in that Port.

Falmouth, April 3. Yesterday came in two Zealand Capers from cruising. In the evening the Alliance Pacquet-Boat sailed for *Lisbon*.

Hull, April 5. Her Majesty's Ship the *Rochester's* Prize sailed out of *Humber* the 2d Instant, with about 50 Sail of Merchant Ships laden with Corn and other Goods for *London*, under her Convoy. The next day sailed hence three Dutch Men of War, with about 80 Sail of Merchant Ships under their Convoy for *Rotterdam*. **Turmuath, April 5.** Yesterday failed out of our Roads about 20 Vessels laden with Corn for *Hollana*, to take the opportunity of a Fleet bound thither from *Hull*, under Convoy of 3 Dutch Men of War, that were then on the back of our Sands.

St. James's, April 8. Her Majesty and his Royal Highness returned hither this evening from *Windsor*.
