1952, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Supple-mentary Scheme for altering the provisions of an Order of His late Majesty King George the Sixth in Council (hereinafter called 'the original Order') dated the 5th day of May, 1939, and published in the London Gazette on the 9th day of the same month authorising the taking down and the sale of the site and materials of Redruth Chapel situate in the parish of Redruth in the diocese of Truro.

"Whereas by the original Order it was provided "Whereas by the original Order it was provided that Redruth Chapel should be taken down and the site and materials thereof sold by the Ecclesiastical Commissioners and that the net proceeds arising from the sale should be held and invested by the Ecclesiastical Commissioners as a curate fund for the benefit of the benefice of Redruth: "And whereas the said chapel has not been taken down and the materials and site thereof have not been sold:

been sold:

"And whereas it has been represented to us, the said Church Commissioners, and we are satisfied that the said chapel might properly be appropriated for the purposes hereinafter recommended and proposed :

And whereas upon the coming into operation of the provisions hereinafter recommended and pro-posed the said chapel of Redruth will without any conveyance or other assurance vest in the Diocesan Board of Finance of the diocese of Truro (herein-after called 'the Board') on trust to allow the said chapel to be used for the purposes hereinafter speci-fied but subject to the conditions so specified.

chapel to be used for the purposes hereinafter speci-fied but subject to the conditions so specified: "Now, therefore, we, the said Church Commis-sioners, with the consents of the Right Reverend Edmund, Bishop of Truro, and of the Reverend Canon Willie Richard Ladd Canney, now incumbent of the said benefice of Redruth (in testimony whereof they have signed this Scheme), do humbly recom-mend and propose to Your Majesty in Council that as from the date of publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council affirming this Scheme the provisions of the original Order respecting the taking down of the chapel and the sale of the site and materials thereof shall cease to have effect and in place thereof there shall be substituted the following, that is to say:----1. (1) Redruth Chapel shall be appropriated to use as a warehouse or repository for general storage purposes.

to use as a warehouse of repository for general storage purposes. (2) The parochial church council of the parish of Redruth (hereinafter called 'the parochial church council') may, with the consents of the Bishop for the time being of the diocese of Truro, of the Board and of the incumbent for the time being of the said benefice of Redruth (or during a vacancy in the incumbency of the said benefice the vacancy in the incumbency of the said benefice the curate, who, with the permission of the Bishop for the time being of the diocese of Truro, is in charge of the parish of Redruth), let the chapel or any part therof for the said purposes and may enter into an agreement or agreements with any person or body upon consequential and ancillary matters in connection with the use of the said chapel, not being repugnant to or inconsistent with the pro-visions of this Scheme.

"(3) The parochial church council shall not effect, or permit to be effected, any alterations in or additions to the fabric of the said chapel except with the consent of the Board and in accordance with and subject to lawful authority. "(4) The parochial church council shall pay or procure the payment of the whole cost of the

repair and maintenance and insurance of the said chapel and all other expenses in connection with the provisions of this Scheme, and shall reimburse to the Board any expenditure which the Board as

to the Board any expenditure which the Board as legal owners of the chapel may incur pursuant to any statutory requirement. "2. The net income accruing from any letting of the said chapel in accordance with the provisions of this Scheme shall be applied towards the cost of the provision of clerical or lay assistance employed within the said parish of Bedruth with the licence or perthe said parish of Redruth with the licence or per-mission of the Bishop for the time being of the diocese of Truro; provided that the Bishop may from time to time direct that any unexpended income appearing to him not to be required for that purpose shall be paid to the incumbent for the time being of the said benefice of Redruth in augmentation of the income of the benefice."

And Whereas the provisions of the Union of Bene-fices Measures, 1923 to 1952, and the Union of Benefices Rules, 1926 and 1930, relating to the preparation and submission of this Scheme have been duly complied with: And Whereas the said Scheme has been approved at the Council held under the authority of the said Letters Patent.
