WHEREAS Her Majesty, in pursuance of the Regency Acts, 1937 to 1953, was pleased, by Letters Patent dated the 20th day of November, 1953, to delegate to Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth The Queen Mother, Her Royal Highness The Princess Margaret, His Royal Highness The Duke of Gloucester, Her Royal Highness The Princess Royal and the Earl of Harewood, or any two or more of them, as Counsellors of State, full power and authority during the period of Her Majesty's absence from the United Kingdom to summon and hold on Her Majesty's behalf Her Privy Council and to signify thereat Her Majesty's approval of anything for which Her Majesty's approval in Council is required:

And Whereas the Church Commissioners have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the 3rd day of March, 1954, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Church Commissioners, acting in pursuance of the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, and the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1952, now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme which we have prepared with the consent of the Right Reverend Ronald, Bishop of Leicester (in witness whereof he has signed the Scheme), for effecting the disunion of the united benefice of Garthorpe and Coston and the union of (1) the benefice of Saxby with Stapleford, the benefice of Wyfordby and the benefice of Garthorpe and (2) the benefice of Sproxton with Saltby and the benefice of Coston, all of which benefices are situate in the diocese of Leicester.

"SCHEME.

"Whereas by an Order of His late Majesty King George the Fifth in Council dated the 5th day of November, 1929, and published in the London Gazette on the 8th day of the same month it was directed that the benefice of Garthorpe and the benefice of Coston should be permanently united together and form one benefice with cure of souls, but that the parishes of the said benefices should continue distinct in all respects:

"And whereas in pursuance of the said Order the union of the said benefices took effect upon the 8th day of November, 1929:

"Now therefore, we, the said Church Commissioners, do humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty as follows, that is to say:—

"1. *Disunion of the united benefice of Garthorpe and Coston.*

"(1) The union of the benefice of Garthorpe and the benefice of Coston in the said united benefice of Garthorpe and Coston shall be dissolved and the said benefices of Garthorpe and Coston shall thereupon each become a separate benefice with cure of souls within the limits of its separate parish.

"(2) The disunion of the said united benefice shall take effect upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council affirming this Scheme is published in the London Gazette.

"(3) The parsonage house of the said united benefice shall belong to the benefice of Garthorpe.

"(4) The endowments and property of the said united benefice shall be divided and distributed as follows, that is to say, the endowments and property specified in Part I of the Schedule hereto shall be assigned and annexed to the benefice of Garthorpe and the endowments and property specified in Part II of the said Schedule shall be assigned and annexed to the benefice of Coston.

"(5) Upon the disunion taking effect the right of presentation to the benefice of Garthorpe shall be vested in Sir Cecil Lyonel Newcomen Tollemache, Baronet, and the right of presentation to the benefice of Coston shall be vested in Your Majesty, Your Heirs and Successors, and shall and may from time to time and at all times be exercised on behalf of Your Majesty by the Right Honourable Gavin Turnbull, Baron Simonds, or other the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain for the time being.

"2. *Union of the benefices of Saxby with Stapleford, Garthorpe, and Wyfordby*

"(1) The benefice of Saxby with Stapleford, the benefice of Garthorpe, and the benefice of Wyfordby shall be permanently united together and form one benefice with cure of souls under the style of 'The United Benefice of Saxby cum Stapleford, Garthorpe and Wyfordby' but the parishes of all the said benefices shall continue in all respects distinct.

"(2) The union shall take effect upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council affirming this Scheme is published in the London Gazette and the Reverend Harold Leslie Miles if he is then incumbent of the said benefices of Saxby with Stapleford and Wyfordby shall with his consent (testified by his signature hereto), be the first incumbent of the said united benefice.

"(3) Without prejudice to the exercise, before the date when the union has taken effect, of any of the powers conferred by the Parsonages Measures, 1938 and 1947, the parsonage house at present belonging to the benefice of Saxby with Stapleford shall, if at that date it belongs to the said benefice, be the house of residence of the incumbent of the said
