"Now, therefore, we the said Church Commis-Now, increiore, we the said Church Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme the boundaries of the said parishes of Stony Stratford; Saint Mary the Virgin, Stony Stratford; and Calverton shall be altered in the manner described in the Schedule and delineated on the map annexed to this Scheme.

"(a) All that part of the panish of Saint Mary the Virgin, Stony Stratford (coloured pink on the map annexed hereto) which is bounded on the east by the parish of Wolverton, on the northeast and northwest by the parish of Cosgrove, on the southwest partly by the parish of Passenham, partly by a detached part of the parish of Calverton and partly by the parish of Stony Stratford and on the partly by the parish of Stony Stratford and on the remaining sides by an imaginary line commencing at a point on the boundary which divides the parish of Saint Mary the Virgin, Stony Stratford, from which divides close numbered 17 (on the map) from close numbered 34 and continuing thence northeastwards along the last mentioned wall or fence to the point where the wall or fence which divides close numbered 17 from close numbered 16 meets the said wall or fence and continuing thence northwestwards along the wall or fence which divides close numbered 17 from close numbered 16
