1. Age Candidates must be at least 174 and under 19 years of age (a half-year equals six calendar months) on 1st September, 1954. 2. Sex and Marriage

(i) Both men and women are eligible, but women will not ordinarily be appointed to posts in the Admiralty or War Office or to the Immigration Ser-vice of the Home Office.

vice of the Home Office. (ii) Married women are not eligible for appoint-ment to Branch B of the Foreign Service. A woman member of Branch B of the Foreign Service must resign her appointment on marriage. (iii) The approval of the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs is required before a successful male candidate who is married takes up appointment in Branch B of the Foreign Service.

3. Nationality

Candidates must be British subjects. They must also satisfy one of the following conditions:— (a) If natural-born British subjects, they must

either

(i) have at least one parent who is or was at death a British subject; or
(ii) have resided in Her Majesty's dominions

and/or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of their appointment.

(b) If naturalised British subjects, they must have resided in Her Majesty's dominions and/or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of their appointment. (c) If not qualified under (a) or (b) of this paragraph, they must satisfy the Commissioners that they are so closely connected with Her Majesty's dominions either by ancestry, upbring-ing or residence, or by reason of national service, that an exception may properly be made in their favour. favour.

For the Foreign Service every candidate must be For the Foreign Service every candidate must be a natural-born British subject, and have been born within the United Kingdom or one of the self-governing Dominions, of parents both of whom were also born within the United Kingdom or one of the self-governing Dominions. No departure from this rule will be made without the special permission of the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, and then only in exceptional cases, and in favour of candidates who satisfy the condi-tions laid down above for the Home Civil Service.

A candidate may take three optional subjects; but a candidate who takes Pure and Applied Mathe-matics may not take either Pure Mathematics or Applied Mathematics; and a candidate who takes Biology may not take either Botany or Zoology.
