"We the Church Commissioners, acting in pursuance of the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, and the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1952, now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the now numbly lay before your majesty in country the following Scheme which we have prepared with the consent of the Right Reverend Harold, Bishop of Saint Edmundsbury and Ipswich (in witness whereof he has signed the Scheme), for effecting the union of the benefice of Grundisburgh and the benefice of Burgh both situate in the diocese of Saint Edmundsbury and Ipswich.

" SCHEME.

"1. Union of Benefices. The benefice of Grundisburgh and the benefice of Burgh shall be permanently united together and form one benefice with cure of souls under the style of 'The United Benefice of Grundisburgh with Burgh', but the parishes of the said benefices shall continue in all

respects distinct.

"2. Taking effect of Union. Upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council affirming this Scheme is published in the London Gazette the union

shall forthwith take effect.

"3. Parsonage House. Upon the union taking effect the parsonage house at present belonging to

the benefice of Grundisburgh shall be the house of residence of the incumbent of the united benefice.

"4. Patronage. In every series of three successive turns of presentation or nomination to be made to the united benefice after the union has taken effect, the patron of the benefice of Grundisburgh shall have the first and second turns and the patron of the benefice of Burgh shall have the third turn."

"We, the Church Commissioners, acting in pursuance of the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923, and

suance of the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1952, and the Diocesan Stipends Funds Measure, 1953, now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme which we have prepared with the consent of the Right Reverend Henry, Bishop of Guildford (in witness whereof he has signed the Scheme), for effecting the union of the benefice of Ockham and the benefice of Hatchford (the church probabil subgraph of or chapel whereof is situate within the parish of

Cobham) and for altering the boundaries of the parishes of Cobham and Ockham, all of which benefices and parishes are situate in the diocese of Guildford.

" SCHEME.

"1. Union of Benefices. The benefice of Ockham "1. Union of Benefices. The benefice of Ockham and the benefice of Hatchford shall be permanently united together and form one benefice with cure of souls under the style of 'The United Benefice of Ockham with Hatchford', and the parish of the said benefice of Ockham and all that part of the parish of the benefice of Cobham which is described in the First Schedule hereto shall, with the consent of the Reverend Frederick Walter Crooks, being the incumbent of the benefice of Cobham (in witness whereof he has signed this Scheme), be united into one parish for ecclesiastical purposes. one parish for ecclesiastical purposes.

"2. Parish Church. The parish church of the parish of Ockham shall be the parish church of the united parish of Ockham with Hatchford.

"3. Taking effect of union. Upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council affirming this Scheme is published in the London Gazette the union shall forthwith take effect and the Reverend Charles William Wall if he is then incumbent of the said benefice of Hatchford shall with his consent (testified by his signature hereto), be the first incumbent of the united benefice.

"4. Patronage. After the union has taken effect the right of presentation to the united benefice shall be exercised by the patrons of the two benefices alternately, the patron of the benefice of Hatchford having the first presentation to the united benefice to be made after the union.

"5. Diversion of surplus endowment income.

"(a) Subject as hereinafter provided any surplus, calculated by us for the twelve months ending on the 31st March in each year, of the endowment income (calculated as prescribed in the Second Schedule hereto) of the united benefice over and above an annual sum of £700 shall, with effect from the date upon which the union shall take effect, be paid to and be held by us for the benefit of the diocesan stipends fund of the diocese of Guildford. "(b) The said endowment income and the said surplus and the said annual sum of £700 shall be deemed to accrue from day to day and shall, when

deemed to accrue from day to day and shall, when we deem that circumstances so require, be appor-

tionable accordingly.

"(c) Any moneys due to us from the incumbent of the united benefice, or, during any vacancy in the united benefice, from the sequestrators thereof, as the case may be (hereinafter called 'the incumbent or sequestrators') upon the calculation of the said. surplus shall be paid by the incumbent or sequestrators to us not later than the 30th June in each

year and shall be recoverable as a debt due to us.

"(d) For the purpose of ascertaining the amounts of the said endowment income and of the said surplus, we shall have power to require production by the incumbent or sequestrators of accounts and other documents in relation thereto, and the said accounts for the twelve months to 31st March in each year (or where applicable for a part of the year ending on that date) shall be rendered annually to us within six weeks of that date in such form as we shall prescribe; and in the event of failure by the incumbent or sequestrators to produce such accounts or documents we shall have all legal remedies for enforcing production thereof.

"6. Archdeaconry and Rural Deanery. The united benefice shall be in the archdeaconry of Dorking and the Rural deanery of Leatherhead.
