middle of the northwestern end of the lane leading from Plough Lane to close numbered 512 and continuing themee southeastwards along the middle of the first mentioned lane to its junction with Plough Lane at the point known as Beggar's Corner and continuing thence northeastwards along the middle of Plough Lane to a point opposite the northwestern end of the wall which divides close numbered 508 from close numbered 509 and continuing thence southeastwards to and along the last men-tioned wall and in the same straight line along the wall forming the southwestern boundary of Cobham Park Gardens to its end at its junction with the wall or fence which divides close numbered 508 from close numbered 508A and continuing thence first southeastwards then southwestwards along the last-mentioned wall or fence and along the wall or fence which divides close numbered 508A from closes num-bered 509A and 510 and continuing thence first which divides close numbered 508A from closes numbered 509A and 510 and continuing thence first southwestwards then southeastwards along the wall or fence which divides close numbered 522 from closes numbered 510 and 549 to its junction with the wall or fence which divides close numbered 548 from close numbered 549 and continuing thence southeastwards along the last mentioned wall or fence and along the wall or fence which divides close numbered 547 from close numbered 549 to its end and in the same straight line in continuation thereof to a point in the middle of the road from Downside to Cobham and continuing thence southwards along the middle of the said road to a point opposite the western end of the wall or fence which divides close numbered 573 from close numbered 574 and continuing thence eastwards to and along the last mentioned wall or fence, thence southeastwards along the wall or fence which divides closes numbered 575, 576 and 591A from closes numbered 574, 592 and 591 to its end and continuing thence in the same direction along the wall or fence which crosses close numbered 590 to a point in the middle of the road leading from Downside Common to Cobham Park Road opposite the southeastern end of the last mentioned wall or fence and continuing thence northeastwards along the middle of Cobham Park Road at its junction with the said road and continuing thence first southeastwards then northeastwards along the middle of Cobham Park Road at its junction with the said road and continuing thence first southeastwards to the last mentioned wall or fence then northeastwards to the last mentioned wall or fence then northeastwards to the last mentioned wall or fence for a distance of 111 yards and continuing thence for a distance of 111 yards and continuing thence southeastwards in a straight line the said wall or fence for a distance of 111 yards and continuing thence southeastwards in a straight line to the boundary which divides the parish of Gobham from the parish of Stoke D'Abernon at a point in the middle of the mill-race flowing from Downside Saw Mill approximately 108 yards from the point at which the said mill-race emerges from the mill tunnel.

"(1) all gross secured income payable by us

and any other person or body.

"and (2) all gross income received from ground rents, chief rents or other fixed charges, other glebe rents and any letting of the parsonage house or a formally divided portion thereof,

"and by deducting therefrom:—

"(1) the rates payable on the parsonage house

if occupied by the incumbent,

"(2) the rent and rates payable on any house cupied by the incumbent other than the occupied by the parsonage house,

"(3) the annual assessment charged upon the incumbent under the Ecclesiastical Dilapidations Measures, 1923 to 1951, in respect of the benefice,

"(4) the rate payable on the glebe,

"(5) the cost of collecting glebe rents,

"(6) any tithe annuity, rentcharge or fee farm rent charged upon the glebe,

"(7) any other outgoings in respect of the glebe, "(8) any charge upon the benefice income in favour of another benefice or any lay person,

"(9) any payment to a curate or lay worker out of the benefice income,

"(10) the annual payments in respect of capital and interest in respect of any mortgage of the benefice income,

"(11) any pension paid to a retired incumbent

out of the benefice income,

"(12) any part of the benefice income diverted to the diocesan stipends fund pursuant to an Order under Section 12 of the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949."

And whereas the provisions of the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1952, the Union of Benefices Rules, 1926 and 1930, and the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, relating to the preparation and submission of this Scheme have been duly complied with:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council:
