To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the Bishop, the Dean and Chapter, Archdeacon and Beneficed Clergy, of the Diocese of Carlisle.

May it please Your Majesty,

WE Your Majesty's most Dutiful and most Obedient Subjects, humbly beg Leave to present to Your Majesty our most hearty and unfeigned Thanks for that unparalleled Goodness which Your Majesty has been Graciously pleas'd to express towards the poorer Vicarages and unwor'd'd Cures of this Kingdom: 'Tis a Charity, Publick in its Nature; High and Honourable in its Object; and which happily illustrates those many Divine Virtues that are (of themselves) so Conspicuous in Your Majesty's Reign.

In these remote Parts of the Nation, there are too frequent Instances of the low Estate of Your Clergy; where those who attend upon Holy Things have a meaner Subsistence than Persons of much inferior Professions: And, as their Condition is deplorable, so 'tis only to be reliev'd by Your Majesty's Royal Bounty and the Pious Concern of Your Great Council.

That God Almighty, who has been pleas'd to open Your Generous Heart in so signal an Emanation of unprecedented Charity, would accept Your Oblation, and ever Crown Your Sacred Person and Government with all Temporal and Spiritual Blessings, is the constant Prayer of, Madam, Your Majesty's most Dutiful and most Grateful Subjects.

Revel, June 20. N. S. Vice-Admiral Priu, who lately failed from hence with a Squadron of Swedish Men of War, and divers Vessels laden with Provisions and Ammunition, for Narva, is returned hither, finding it impracticable to send any Supplies into that Place, which continues closely blocked up by the Muscovites both by Sea and Land. He has lost two of his Ships, which were forced on Shore in a Storm, whereof one was seized by the Muscovites, and the other was staved to pieces. The Enemy has also blocked up Dorpat, and frequently sends out Parties further into this Province, to ravage the Country and to destroy the Corn.

Sendamir, June 20. The King of Poland sent lately from hence a Detachment of 5000 Saxons and Lithuanians, under the Command of the Prince of Wicisnowiski, Castellan of Wilna, and a Saxon General, with Orders to observe General Reinschild, who lay within a few Leagues of this Place with a Body of Swedish Forces. They marched accordingly towards his Camp, and on the 18th Instant met with a Detachment of his Troops of 500 Horse, whom they surrounded, fell upon them, and put most of them to the Sword, the Lithuanians giving no Quarter. The King has passed the Weiffel with the rest of his Army, and has removed his Camp further from hence than it was before. General Radomiski has brought over to the King's Interest a great number of the Nobility of the Greater Poland, who were in the Confederacy, and he lately held an Assembly of the Chief of them at Kosovia, wherein several Resolutions were taken for the better disappointing the Designs of the Cardinal Primate, and those of his Party. While they were assembled, a small Body of Swedish Forces came before the Place; whereupon the Nobility marched out, and obliged them to retire. Lemberg, the chief Town of Russland, with its Ga-

rison, consisting of 700 Men of the Forces of the Crown, has also declared for the King. Monsieur Smiegelski, who commands a Body of the King's Troops in the Palatinate of Posen, has lately gained some Advantages over the Swedish Forces in those Parts.

Warsaw, June 24. The Heads of the Confederated Nobility met here the 19th Instant, in order to proceed to the Choice of a new King, but, by reason of the very small appearance of Senators, and other Members of their Assembly, adjourn'd till the 26th; and it is generally believed the Election will then be put off for some longer time. The Cardinal Primate has received an Express with Letters from the Pope, exhorting him not to proceed any further in that Matter, but rather to endeavour an Accommodation of the Differences between the King and the Confederates, and the restoring of the Peace of his Country; and the same Express was immediately sent back with the Cardinal's Answer. We hear the King of Poland has removed his Camp from under the Cannon of Sendamir; and it is believed he designs to advance further towards Silesia, in order to facilitate his joining the Reinforcements he expects from Saxony.

Dantzick, June 28. Our Magistrates have given Directions for the making of some Alterations in the Fortifications of this Place, and adding some new Works thereto. The King of Sweden is marching with all his Forces out of Prussia, and passed the Weiffel the 26th Instant at Graudentz, in his way to Warsaw.

Bristol, July 4. The Nevis Merchant, Charles Rynion Master, came in here the 2d Instant from the West-Indies, but left from Milford. This day came in the Spy Gally of London, John Kimber Master, homeward-bound from Aviro in Portugal: She was chased in her Passage by 3 French Privateers, but had the good fortune to fall in with a Ship of 60 Guns from Genoa, bound to Amsterdam, who protected her.

Yarmouth, July 7. Her Majesty's Ships the Chester and Nighringale came into our Road the 4th Instant from the Southward, with divers light Colliers under their Convoy, bound for Newcastle; since which several more are come in, so that here are now above 300 of them waiting for a fair Wind. Her Majesty's Ship the Bristol, and a Dutch Man of War, which lately came in from Rotterdam with a Fleet of Merchant-men, do still continue here.
