Upon leveral and great complaints m de to the S ates of Noltand that the French have more then doubled the impofitions laid upon the Merchandices and Manufactures of Hol-18nd, particularly, in that upon Cloth, raifing it from 40 to 86 Francs upon a picce; they have by way of Retailation refored that 25 Francs thall be for the future charged upon every Mued, three of which are to make a Tun of French Wines imported, and proportionable Rates upon their Manufactures, and have ordered this relove to be propofed by their Deputies to the States-G.neral, and tis believed, the reft of the United Provinces will be cafily inclined to follow the fame method.

Highe, Offsb. 4.
