WE are in great Expectation of the Success of the Archbishop of Colocza's Negotiation with Prince Ragorzi, and the other Heads of the Malecontents, which it is hoped will restore Tranquility to these Parts, the Emperor having made them to Gracious Answers upon what they desired of him for redressing the Grievances they complained of, that it is scarce to be doubted but they will readily be complied with. We hear that Prince Ragorzi has built two Forts on either side of the Danube to secure his passage over that River, and is marched towards Segedin; and some Advices add, That he hath actually Invested that Place. There have been several Rencounters between some Parties of his Troops, and of the Russians, who have taken up Arms to oppose him. The Malecontents have obliged many of the Inhabitants of the open Country in Transilvania to declare for them, but have not yet been able to make themselves Masters of any fortified Place in that Province.

Vienna, July 19. On the 14th instant the Emperor appointed, the Count de Lamberg Governour of the Province of Upper Austria, Count Kinsky Chancellor of Bohemia, Count Martinitz Grand Marshal of the Court, and Count Traun Land Marshal and Colonel of the Lower Austria, to be of the Conference, or Cabinet-Council. The Count de Lamberg being lately sent with some Proposals from this Court to the Malecontents in Hungary, for a Cessation of Arms, in order to a Treaty for an Accommodation, is still at Raab, expecting the Issue of the Archbishop of Colocza's Conferences with Prince Ragorzi. A considerable Sum of Money has lately been sent to General Heister for the Subsistence of his Forces; and it is said, a further Supply of Men and Ammunition will shortly be sent him, unless the good Disposition of the Malecontents towards the composing of all Differences, and quieting those Troubles, do render it unnecessary. Orders are given for raising the Militia in all the Emperor's Hereditary Countries, where the Inhabitants have accordingly begun to take Arms, and do all express a very great Zeal for his Imperial Majesty's Service, particularly those of Tirol, who have lately made an Inroad into the Elector of Bavaria's Territories with very good Success.

Cologne, July 25. The Prince of Saxe Zeits Bishop of Raab, who is entrusted with the Management of the Emperor's Affairs in these Parts, went from hence the 25th instant, with the Count de Cominleck Dean of this Chapter, Gen. Bernzau, and several other Persons of Note to Bonn, where they intend to continue till the Elector Palatine's return from Vienna to

Dusseldorp, where he is shortly expected, and then to repair to his Court. They were guarded by a Detachment of 1000 Men out of our Garison, which was met half way, and relieved by a like Detachment from Bonn, and is returned hither. Several Persons have been Executed for being concerned in the Conspiracy lately discovered here to Seize the Bishop of Raab, and to Convey him, alive or dead, to the next French Garison, which we hope will deter others in such manner, that we may hereafter be free from any Attempts of this Nature. The French have of late had several Parties abroad in these Parts, which came out of Vianden, and other Neighbouring Towns, but they are all returned to their Garisons, without doing any great Mischief. The Partyman Thomé who is in the King of Prussia's Service, and is in Garison at Deuts over against this Place, brought hither lately the Magistrates and other Principal Inhabitants of several Towns about Metz, whom he had seized in an Excursion he had made that way, as Hostages for the Payment of Contributions; and they were all sent the 24th to Wesel, where they are to remain Prisoners till the Money is paid. The Marquis de Varennes, Lieutenant General in the French Service, came the 21th to Traerbach, and having viewed the Fortifications of that Place, returned the 23d to Metz. The Detachment which lately marched from the Marshal de Villeroy's Camp for the Netherlands, came the 24th to Phaltzbourg, and continued their march the next day: And it is said they are expected the 31st at Metz. We are without any Letters from Italy or Swisserland, which we fear may have been intercepted by the Enemy.

Plimouth, July 25. This day came in here from London, the Industry of this Place; the Experiment of and for Liverpoole, John Hewse Master; the Mull Frigate of London, John Sherbourn Master, bound for Newfoundland; and the Mary Sloop of London, Jacob Doble Master, bound for Guinea.

Bidford, July 25. On Sunday arrived here about 10 Sail of Vessels, with Wooll from Dublin, under Convoy of Her Majesty's Ship the Bridgewater; And yesterday sailed about 20 Sail more for Waterford, Cork, &c. under Convoy of the Arundel, Captain Deering Commander.

Portsmouth, July 27. Her Majesty's Ship the Laifoff came to Spithead the 25th Instant from the Downes; And the Medway sailed that Afternoon out of our Harbour to Spithead.

Yarmouth, July 28. Her Majesty's Ship the Rochester sailed out of our Road yesterday to the Eastward. This day above 200 Sail of light Colliers sailed hence for Newcastle, and at the same time several more from the Southward, passed through our Road, being also bound thither. Her Majesty's Ship the Queenborough is now in our Road.

Deale, July 28. Yesterday came into the Downs the Betty Galley, bound for Oporto. Her Majesty's Ship the Flamborough, with the Greenfish Storehip, and several Transport Ships, are now coming down the River; as is also the King William, Bigg Master, bound for Ireland. There are besides in the Downs Her Majesty's Ship the Greenwich, and several outward bound Merchant Ships.
