Windsor, July 29.

THE following Address from the Clergy of York was presented this Day to Her Majesty by John Sharp Esq; being Introduced by the most Honourable the Lord Treasurer.

To the QUEEN's most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the Clergy of the Diocese of York.

May it please Your most Excellent Majesty,

WE Your Majesty's most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects, the Clergy of the Diocese of York, being deeply affected with Your Majesty's surprising Goodness, in settling Your whole Ecclesiastical Revenue to be a perpetual Fund for the augmenting small Benefices throughout England; do humbly beg Leave at this Season, when we are called together in our several Districts to repeat and renew in our own Persons these Solemn Thanks for this Royal Benefaction to the Church, which have been already offer'd to Your Majesty by our Representatives in Convocation.

Indeed, we are glad of all Occasions to express our great Satisfaction and Joy in having Your Majesty to Reign over us, whose Principles must always keep You Entirely to the Interests and Religion of the Church of England, and who has given us so convincing a Proof of Your Care of us, by this late Act of Grace to Your poor Clergy.

We heartily pray God long to preserve Your Majesty, and so to Direct and Influence all Your Counsels, that You may ever pursue those glorious Principles and Inclinations which God hath Inspired You withall; and that it may never be in the Power of Your Majesty's or the Church's Enemies to obstruct or frustrate the happy Effects of them.

Which Address Her Majesty received very graciously.

Dantzick, July 23. Our Advices from Warsaw say, That Preparations were making there for the Coronation of their new King Stanislaus. The King of Sweden has Complimented him on his Election, and has, tho' not without great difficulty, prevailed with the

Cardinal Primate, the Crown General, and several more of the Confederates, who opposed it; to acknowledge him, and has promised him a powerful Assistance. Some Letters add, That Three Commissioners are appointed on the part of Sweden, with the Character of Ambassadors Extraordinary, viz. Lieutenant General Count Hoorn, the Swedish Envoy Wradsleven, and the Vice-President Palmberg, to Treat of an Alliance with Poland. In the mean time the King of Poland, had for the third time issued his Summons to the Nobility to mount on Horseback for the Defence of his Person and Government against the Swedes; and those who are in their Interest, and according to the last Account from Sendomir, was preparing to depart from thence in order to joyn the Succours that are marching from Muscovy to his Assistance.

Paris, July 28. The Marquis d'Elbeuf arrived from Piedmont the 26th instant at night at Versailles, who, it is said, brings Advice of the Surrender of Verceil, and that the Duke of Vendosme intended to Dismantle that Place, and to attack Ivrea. Our Letters from Germany say, The Marshal de Villeroy had been to view the Imperial Lines at Biehl, in hopes to have been able to force them; now that most of the Forces which were there are marched with Prince Eugene to observe the Marshal de Tallard; but that he found them so well guarded, that he did not think fit to attempt them.

Kinsale, July 23. On the 21st instant came in here the Owner's Adventure, Michael Staples Master, of 240 Tuns, 10 Guns, and 20 Men; the Samuel, Richard Holland Master, of 230 Tuns; and the Lion and Lamb, Joseph Green Master, of 250 Tuns; all three belonging to London, and homeward bound with Sugar and other Goods from Barbadoes. The first of these Ships was attacked off of this Harbour by a French Privateer of 12 or 14 Guns, who boarded her twice; but the Master and his Men made so good a Defence, that they killed as many of the Enemy as entered on Board the Ship; and with the Assistance of one of the other Merchant Ships obliged the Privateer to retire: The Owner's Adventure had

in this Action two Men killed, and one or two slightly wounded. The same Day the Friendship Brigantine of Cork, John Moody Master, bound from thence to Jamaica, put into this Port. The James Galley of and from Liverpoole, Michael Rymer Master, arrived yesterday from thence at Cork, being laden with Salt and Tobacco for that Port.

Dartmouth, July 28. Yesterday came to Anchor in our Range, the St. Andrew, Andrew Wolfe Master, of and from Dram, laden with Deals: The Evening before, off of Lime, a little to the Eastward of this Harbour, he met with a small French Privateer of six Guns, who took from him one of his Boats.

Hull, July 29. On Wednesday the 26th instant came into Humber, the London, George Mathews Commander, of and for London, homeward bound from the East Indies.

Plimouth, July 30. On the 26th instant sailed hence the Eagle Transport, Henry Chub Master. The same day came in the May-Flower of Plimouth, William Mills Master, with Groceries from London. The 27th came in the Providence of and from Christianstad, Garret Hanson Master, with Mafts for the Dock; and a Dutch Privateer from Cruising. Yesterday sailed hence Her Majesty's Ships the Gloucester and Moderate to the Eastward.

Bristol, July 31. On the 27th instant at night came in the Christian Geuldenlew of and from Dram, who had six Weeks Passage, and off of the Lands-end was plundered by a small French Privateer. The same Tide came in several Vessels from Dublin. This day came in the Vine Ketch of Londonderry, Francis Violet Master, in eight Weeks from Barbadoes. On the 29th instant came in the Margaret of and from Dram.

Yarmouth, July 31. Her Majesty's Ship the Dunwich passed through our Road the 28th of the last Month, with several Coasters under her Convoy to the Northward. Rear Admiral Whetstone came into our Road that Evening with the Squadron of Her Majesty's Ships under his Command. The Assistance and Queenborough sailed hence the 29th for Newcastle. Yesterday and this Day there passed through our Road about 200 Sail of laden Colliers to the Southward, under Convoy of Her Majesty's Ships the Greyhound and Kinsale.

Portsmouth, August 1. The 29th past sailed from St. Hellens Her Majesty's Ship the Medway bound to the Eastward. The same Day sailed from Spithead the Chichester Man of War for Woolwich. Yesterday in the Afternoon arrived at Spithead Her Majesty's Ships the Greenwich and Flamborough, with many Transport Ships and Coasters under their Convoy from the Downes. The same

Day came into this Harbour Her Majesty's Ships the Deptford and Laistoff.

Kensington, August 1. Her Majesty and His Royal Highness came hither this Evening from Windsor.
