To the QUEEN's most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the Clergy of the Diocese of York.

May it please Your most Excellent Majesty,

WE Your Majesty's most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects, the Clergy of the Diocese of York, being deeply affected with Your Majesty's surprising Goodness, in settling Your whole Ecclesiastical Revenue to be a perpetual Fund for the augmenting small Benefices throughout England; do humbly beg Leave at this Season, when we are called together in our several Districts to repeat and renew in our own Persons these Solemn Thanks for this Royal Benefaction to the Church, which have been already offer'd to Your Majesty by our Representatives in Convocation.

Indeed, we are glad of all Occasions to express our great Satisfaction and Joy in having Your Majesty to Reign over us, whose Principles must always keep You Entirely to the Interests and Religion of the Church of England, and who has given us so convincing a Proof of Your Care of us, by this late Act of Grace to Your poor Clergy.

We heartily pray God long to preserve Your Majesty, and so to Direct and Influence all Your Counsels, that You may ever pursue those glorious Principles and Inclinations which God hath Inspired You withall; and that it may never be in the Power of Your Majesty's or the Church's Enemies to obstruct or frustrate the happy Effects of them.

Dantzick, July 23. Our Advices from Warsaw say, That Preparations were making there for the Coronation of their new King Stanislaus. The King of Sweden has Complimented him on his Election, and has, tho' not without great difficulty, prevailed with the

Cardinal Primate, the Crown General, and several more of the Confederates, who opposed it; to acknowledge him, and has promised him a powerful Assistance. Some Letters add, That Three Commissioners are appointed on the part of Sweden, with the Character of Ambassadors Extraordinary, viz. Lieutenant General Count Hoorn, the Swedish Envoy Wradsleven, and the Vice-President Palmberg, to Treat of an Alliance with Poland. In the mean time the King of Poland, had for the third time issued his Summons to the Nobility to mount on Horseback for the Defence of his Person and Government against the Swedes; and those who are in their Interest, and according to the last Account from Sandomir, was preparing to depart from thence in order to joyn the Succours that are marching from Muscovy to his Assistance.

Paris, July 28. The Marquis d'Elbeuf arrived from Piedmont the 26th instant at night at Versailles, who, it is said, brings Advice of the Surrender of Verceil, and that the Duke of Vendosme intended to Dismantle that Place, and to attack Ivrea. Our Letters from Germany say, The Marshal de Villeroy had been to view the Imperial Lines at Biehl, in hopes to have been able to force them; now that most of the Forces which were there are marched with Prince Eugene to observe the Marshal de Tallard; but that he found them so well guarded, that he did not think fit to attempt them.

Kinsale, July 23. On the 21st instant came in here the Owner's Adventure, Michael Staples Master, of 240 Tuns, 10 Guns, and 20 Men; the Samuel, Richard Holland Master, of 230 Tuns; and the Lion and Lamb, Joseph Green Master, of 250 Tuns; all three belonging to London, and homeward bound with Sugar and other Goods from Barbadoes. The first of these Ships was attacked off of this Harbour by a French Privateer of 12 or 14 Guns, who boarded her twice; but the Master and his Men made so good a Defence, that they killed as many of the Enemy as entered on Board the Ship; and with the Assistance of one of the other Merchant Ships obliged the Privateer to retire: The Owner's Adventure had
