THE following Address has been presented to Her Majesty.

To the QUEEN's most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the Bishop, Dean and Chapter, and others of the Clergy of the Diocese of Bangor.

May it please Your Majesty

TO accept this our humble and hearty Acknowledgement for all Your Royal Favours in the Church of England, particularly for Your late Noble Gift of the Revenue of Tenths and First Fruits, to improve the Maintenance of the Poor Clergy.

As Your Majesty has in this exceeded the Munificence of any of Your Royal Predecessors, so we doubt not but all those in the Nation, who love our Church and Religion, have a just Sense of Your Majesty's Piety in it: The Clergy have Reason, above others, to be very sensible of this great Favour, as well for the Honour Your Majesty has been pleas'd by this to do to our Profession, as for the Relief intended to our Poor Brethren, of which there is a great Number in this Diocese, who stand in need of Your Royal Bounty.

We, on our parts, humbly beg Leave to assure Your Majesty, That we shall make it our Care to return this and all other Blessings of Your Majesty's Government, with our utmost Duty and Gratitude; especially we shall daily pray, That God would bless Your Majesty's Person, and all Your glorious Designs, for the Good of this Church and Kingdom; That he would give You Success in this dangerous War with the Enemies of Your Crown and our Religion; That You may be long an Honour to both of them in Your own Person; and at last transmit both down to Posterity in the Protestant Succession as by Law Established.

Which Address Her Majesty received very Graciously.

From the Camp at Estremos, July 20. N. S. We have received the Confirmation, That the *Castel de Vide* capitulated on the 25th past: The Portuguese Governor having surrender'd the Town, Colonel *Hussey*, with Lieutenant-General *Stewart's* Regiment under his Command, retired into the Castle, but for want of the Provisions and Ammunition

that were necessary for them, were soon obliged to surrender themselves Prisoners of War, after they had done all that could be expected from Men of undaunted Courage and Resolution. Seven or eight Soldiers of that Regiment having made their Escape out of the Enemy's Hands, came hither about a fortnight ago, who report, that during the whole Siege, they had but 5 or 6 Men wounded, and not one Officer or Soldier of the whole Regiment killed. Colonel *Hussey*, and several of the Officers that were with him, are since come to this Place, who had their Liberty granted them upon Parole. All the Horse and Dragoons which lay in this Town, and in the Neighbourhood, are march'd towards *Elvas* on some Design, which is kept secret; but is believed to be the intercepting of some of the Enemy's Troops which are marching into Quarters of Refreshment. The English Regiments of Foot in this Camp are order'd into Quarters; Brigadier-General *Brudenell's* Regiment march'd out the 17th Instant to *Arroyolos*, the Place assign'd them; the other 5 Regiments are to be reviewed to-morrow morning, and 4 of them are to march in the evening, the Earl of *Portmore's* to *Portel*, the Earl of *Barrimore's* to *Vimieiro*, the Lord *Mountjoy's* to *Avis*, and Colonel *Duncanfon's* to *Redondo*: Colonel *Blood's* Regiment is to remain quartered in this Town. *Montmore* is the Place appointed for the Quarters of the Horse and Dragoons. His Grace the Duke of *Schomberg*, being very much indispos'd with the Gout, is gone to *Villa Visosa*, for the Benefit of the Air. The Earl of *Portmore* intends to set out to-morrow morning for *Lisbon*. The Conde de *San Vincente* is lately come to this Place, the King of *Portugal* having appointed him to be Assistant-Governor of this Province.

Lisbon, July 23. N. S. The Heat of the Weather obliging the Armies on both sides to quit the Field, and the Enemy not thinking themselves safe in the Places they were possess'd of on our Frontier, they are all retir'd into the Spanish Territories. Our Foot are also march'd into Quarters of Refreshment, and the Horse and Dragoons will soon follow.

Falmouth,

Falmouth, July 31. The Prince Pacquet-Beat arrived here this morning from Lisbon, having been 18 days in Her Passage: The Master reports, That the French and Spaniards are all retired into Spain, leaving the Portuguese in possession of all the Towns and Castles which they had taken from them: That the Forces on both sides were gone into Quarters of Refreshment; and that the Kings of Spain and Portugal intended to go to Calmina, and to continue there during the extrem hot Season. At his coming away from Lisbon, it was said there, That the Confederate Fleet was sailed from Lagos Bay 8 days before for the Straights.

Yarmouth, August 4. Several light Colliers came into our Road this week; and this day came in Her Majesty's Ships the *Chester* and *Nightingale*, with divers more under their Convoy from the Southward; so that there are now about 150 Sail of them in our Road, ready to sail with the first fair Wind for Newcastle. Rear-Admiral *Whetstone*, with the Squadron of Her Majesty's Ships under his Command, sailed out of our Road yesterday.

Deale, August 4. Yesterday came into the Downs Her Majesty's Ship the *Flamorough*. This day came in the *Queen Anne*, the *Jacob Gally*, and the *Tuscan Gally*, all three from Leghorn, with a French Privateer of 6 Guns, 4 Patereroes, and 52 Men, taken by the *Tuscan Gally*.

Deale, August 5. A considerable Fleet of homeward-bound Merchant Ships from Virginia arrived this day in the Downs, under Convoy of several of Her Majesty's Ships.

Whitehall, August 3. Her Majesty has been pleased to give unto the Marquis de Miremont Her Commission to be Lieutenant-General of Her Armies, and Commander in Chief of the Forces, which shall be raised to serve Her Majesty or Her Allies in Piedmont, or the adjacent Countries.
