WHEREAS the Church Commissioners have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the 23rd day of February, 1955, in the words and figures following, that is to say:

"We, the Church Commissioners, acting in pursuance of the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, and the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1952, now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme which we have prepared with the consent of the Right Reverend Arthur, Bishop of Bristol (in witness whereof he has signed the Scheme), for effecting the union of the benefice of Lacock and the benefice of Saint Anne, Bowden Hill, both situate in the diocese of Bristol.

"SCHEME.

"1. *Union of Benefices and Parishes.* The benefice of Lacock and the benefice of Saint Anne, Bowden Hill, shall be permanently united together and form one benefice with cure of souls under the style of 'The United Benefice of Lacock with Bowden Hill', and the parishes of the said benefices shall also be united into one parish for ecclesiastical purposes.

"2. *Taking effect of union.* Upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council affirming this Scheme is published in the London Gazette the union shall forthwith take effect and the Reverend John Griffith Frith, if he is then incumbent of the said benefice of Lacock shall with his consent (testified by his signature hereto), be the first incumbent of the united benefice.

"3. *Parish Church.* The parish church of the parish of Lacock shall be the parish church of the united parish.

"4. *Registers.* The marriage registers current at the church of Saint Anne, Bowden Hill, shall be dealt with in accordance with the provisions of section 62 of the Marriage Act, 1949, and the register books (if any) of baptisms and burials and other the records and muniments deposited in the said church shall be transferred to the parish church of the united parish.

"5. *Parsonage House.* Upon the union taking effect the parsonage house at present belonging to the benefice of Lacock shall be the house of residence of the incumbent of the united benefice, and the parsonage house belonging to the benefice of Saint Anne, Bowden Hill, and the site and appurtenances thereof and the grounds heretofore usually occupied and enjoyed therewith shall, as soon as conveniently may be, be sold and disposed of by us at such time or times and in such manner in all respects as to us shall seem expedient, and the net proceeds of such sale or sales shall constitute and form part of the Expenses Fund of the diocese of Bristol established pursuant to the said Union of Benefices Measures.

"6. *Patronage.* In every series of three successive turns of presentation or nomination to be made to the united benefice after the union has taken effect the patron of the benefice of Lacock shall have the first and third turns, and the patron of the benefice of Saint Anne, Bowden Hill, shall have the second turn."

And Whereas the provisions of the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1952, the Union of Benefices Rules, 1926 and 1930, and the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, relating to the preparation and submission of this Scheme have been duly complied with:

WHEREAS the Church Commissioners have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the 28th day of April, 1955, in the words and figures following, that is to say:

"We, the Church Commissioners, acting in pursuance of the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, and the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1952, now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme which we have prepared with the consent of the Right Reverend Russell, Bishop of Southwell (in witness whereof he has signed the Scheme), for altering the boundaries of the parish of Brinsley by annexing thereto (1) a portion of the parish of Selston and (2) the extra-parochial place known as Felley all situate in the diocese of Southwell.

"SCHEME

"1. With the consents (testified by their signatures hereto) of the Reverend Frederick Horace Newbery, being the incumbent of the benefice of Brinsley, and the Reverend Hugh Bickersteth Biddell, being the incumbent of the benefice of Selston, upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council affirming this Scheme is published in the London Gazette the boundaries of the parish of Brinsley shall be altered by annexing thereto:—

"(a) all that part of the parish of Selston which is described in the Schedule hereto and coloured pink on the map annexed hereto; and

"(b) the extra-parochial place known as Felley (coloured green on the said map).

"2. Upon the alteration of boundaries taking effect the benefice and parish of Brinsley shall be known as 'The Benefice (or Parish) of Brinsley with Underwood'.

"THE SCHEDULE

"The territory to be annexed to the parish of Brinsley—

"All that part of the parish of Selston (coloured pink on the map annexed hereto) which lies to the south of an imaginary line commencing at a point on the boundary which divides the parish of Brinsley from the parish of Selston at the western end of the wall or fence forming the southern and south eastern boundary of close number 754 and proceeding thence generally north-eastwards along the last mentioned wall or fence and along the walls or fences forming the south-eastern boundaries of closes numbered 727 and 729 to a point in the middle of the footpath leading from Yewtree Farm to Willhallow Lane and continuing thence first southeastwards and then eastwards along the middle of the last mentioned footpath to a point opposite to its eastern end in the middle of the last mentioned lane and continuing thence generally northwards along the middle of the last mentioned lane to a point opposite to its northeastern end in the middle of Flats Lane and continuing thence northwards along the middle of the last mentioned lane to a point opposite the middle of the southwestern end of Wansley Lane and continuing thence northeastwards to and along the middle of the last mentioned lane to a point opposite the southern end of the wall or fence which divides close number 776 from close number 850 and continuing thence northeastwards first to and then along the last mentioned wall or fence and continuing thence first northeastwards and then generally eastwards and then southeastwards along the fences dividing close number 822 from the surrounding closes numbered 777, 819 and 818 to the western end of the wall or fence forming the southern boundary of closes numbered 818 and 817 and continuing thence along the last mentioned wall or fence to the wall or fence forming the eastern boundary of close number 817 and continuing thence northwards along the last mentioned wall or fence to the wall or fence forming the southern boundary of close number 816 and continuing thence eastwards along the last mentioned wall or fence
