THE following Address was presented this day to Her Majesty by the Reverend Dr. William Grabme, one of the Prebendaries of the Cathedral Church of Durham.

To the QUEEN's most Excellent Majesty.
The humble Address of the Clergy of the Diocese of Durham.
May it please Your Majesty,

WE Your Majesty's Loyal and Obedient Subjects, the Clergy of this Diocese, having been already Provincially Represented to Your Majesty with most humble Acknowledgements of Your Pious Care and Compassion towards the poorer sort of Your Clergy; do now again humbly beg Leave, in a particular Manner, to address our Thankfulness for Your Charitable Augmentation of their Maintenance.

And it is yet greater Joy and Encouragement to us, That Your own Inclinations for Supporting this Church of England, wherein You have been happily Educated, will induce Your Majesty chiefly to Countenance those, who for their Principles, as well as Poverty, are the truest Objects of Your Favour.

That Your Majesty's Reign over us may be long and prosperous; That You may live, even to see this Your Royal Bounty and Benefaction compleatly enjoy'd by those for whom You have thus Graciously designed it, is the hearty Prayer of Your Majesty's most Dutiful Subjects.

The Address which follows was presented to Her Majesty by the Mayor, Bayliffs, and several of the Burgeesses of Windsor, accompanied by the Rt. Hon. the Lord Fitzharding and Richard Topham Esq; their Representatives in Parliament, and introduced by his Grace the Duke of Northumberland, Constable of the Castle of Windsor.

The humble Address of the Mayor, Bayliffs and Burgeesses, Gentlemen and other Inhabitants, of the Borough of New-Windsor in the County of Berks.
Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE Your Majesty's most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects, having a just Sense of the great

Benefit we enjoy under Your Majesty's most Auspicious Reign; do in all humble manner beg Leave to Congratulate the Glorious Success of Your Majesty's Arms, under the Valiant and Wise Conduct of the Duke of Marlborough.

May such Victories constantly attend the Justice of that Cause, in which Your Majesty and Your Allies are engaged; That You may at length be able to set due Limits to the Ambition of France, and give such a Peace to Europe, as not only we Your Majesty's Subjects may be long happy under the Justice and Clemency of Your Reign, but that the Protestant Religion, and the Laws and Liberties of England, may be secured to our utmost Posterity, under a lasting Succession of Protestant Princes.

Which Addresses Her Majesty received very graciously.

Ratisbon, August 18. General Herberville came about 10 days ago before Beyerhoff, and summoned the Governor to surrender, who refusing to do it, the General began to batter that Place the 11th Instant, at 5 in the morning; About 8 he made a general Assault, and by 10 was Master of the Place: Part of the Garison was put to the Sword; but after the first Fury of our Soldiers was over, they gave Quarter to the Governor and the rest of his Men, who remain Prisoners of War. The next day General Herberville sent a Detachment to Donaustauff, another Town belonging to the Elector of Bavaria, which immediately surrendered. The 15th he came hither, and took possession of our Gate, and Bridge over the Danube, and of our two Gates towards the Country; the Bavarian Forces which had lain here several months, in order to keep the Imperial Diet in awe, being retired some days before, upon the Arrival in these Parts of the Confederate Forces under the Command of his Grace the Duke of Marlborough. The same day Te Deum was sung here for the late Glorious Victory over the French and Bavarian Armies near Bleinheim, and for our Deliverance from their Power. The General intends to leave a Regiment of the Forces of Hesse and another of those of Prussia in Garison here, and to march to morrow with the rest of his Troops to attack Straubingen.
