WHEREAS the Church Commissioners have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the 9th day of June, 1955, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Church Commissioners, acting in pursuance of the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, and the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1952, now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme which we have prepared with the consent of the Right Reverend Robert, Bishop of Exeter (in witness whereof he has signed the Scheme), for effecting the union of the benefice of Blackborough (being part of the benefice of Blackborough with Sheldon) and the benefice of Kentisbeare both situate in the diocese of Exeter.

"SCHEME.

"1. *Union of the benefices of Blackborough and Kentisbeare.*

"(1) The benefice of Blackborough (being part of the benefice of Blackborough with Sheldon) and the benefice of Kentisbeare shall be permanently united together and form one benefice with cure of souls under the style of 'The United Benefice of Kentisbeare with Blackborough', but the parishes of the said benefices shall remain in all respects distinct.

"(2) Upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council affirming this Scheme is published in the London Gazette the union shall forthwith take effect and the Reverend Frederick George Baker if he is then incumbent of the said benefice of Kentisbeare shall, with his consent (testified by his signature hereto), be the first incumbent of the united benefice.

"(3) Upon the union taking effect the parsonage house at present belonging to the benefice of Kentisbeare shall be the house of residence of the incumbent of the united benefice.

"(4) After the union has taken effect the right of presentation to the united benefice shall be exercisable solely by the patron of the benefice of Kentisbeare.

"2. *The Benefice of Sheldon.*

"(1) The remaining part of the benefice of Blackborough with Sheldon shall become a separate benefice under the style of 'The Benefice of Sheldon' with cure of souls within the limits of its separate parish.

"(2) The right of presentation to the said separate benefice of Sheldon shall be exercisable by the patron (or his successor in title) who was patron of the former benefice of Sheldon immediately prior to its union with the benefice of Blackborough.

"3. *Endowments.*

"Upon the taking effect of the union hereinbefore recommended and proposed a capital sum sufficient to produce an annual income of £204 being part of a larger capital sum at present held by us as part of the endowments of the benefice of Blackborough with Sheldon shall be appropriated and held by us for the united benefice of Kentisbeare with Blackborough, and all other the endowments and property of the said benefice of Blackborough with Sheldon shall be appropriated to and form part of the endowments and property of the separate benefice of Sheldon."

And Whereas the provisions of the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1952, the Union of Benefices Rules, 1926 and 1930, and the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, relating to the preparation and submission of this Scheme have been duly complied with:

WHEREAS the Church Commissioners have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the 9th day of June, 1955, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Church Commissioners, acting in pursuance of the New Parishes Measure, 1943, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme for altering the boundaries of the parish of Cholderton, in the diocese of Salisbury, and of the parish of Quarley, in the diocese of Winchester.

"SCHEME.

"Whereas we are satisfied that it is desirable that the boundaries of the said parishes should be altered in the manner hereinafter mentioned:

"And whereas the Right Reverend William, Bishop of Salisbury, and the Right Reverend Alwyn, Bishop of Winchester, consent to the proposed arrangements (in testimony whereof they have signed this Scheme):

"Now, therefore, we, the said Church Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme the boundaries of the said parishes of Cholderton and Quarley shall be altered in the manner described in the Schedule and delineated on the map annexed to this Scheme.

"THE SCHEDULE.

"The territory to be annexed to the parish of Cholderton comprising:—

"All that part of the parish of Quarley (coloured pink on the map annexed hereto) which is bounded upon the west partly by the parish of Newton Tony partly by the parish of Cholderton and partly by the parish of Shipton Bellinger upon the north by the parish of Shipton Bellinger and upon the remaining sides by an imaginary line commencing at a point on the boundary which divides the parish of Shipton Bellinger from the parish of Quarley at a point in the middle of the road leading from Tidworth to Romsey and continuing thence south-eastwards along the middle of the said road to a point opposite the middle of the road or track leading to Quarley Down Farm and continuing thence south-westwards to and along the middle of the last mentioned road or track to a point opposite the north eastern end of the wall or fence forming the northwestern boundary of close number 104 on the map and continuing thence first south-eastwards to and then south-westwards along the last mentioned wall or fence and thence south-eastwards along the wall or fence forming the southwestern boundary of close number 104 to a point opposite the middle of the track or footpath leading to the unmetalled road which at this point forms the boundary between the counties of Hants and Wilts and continuing thence south-westwards to and along the middle of the last mentioned track or footpath and in the same straight line in continuation thereof to the boundary which divides the parish of Quarley from the parish of Newton Tony."
