To the QUEEN's most Excellent Majesty.
The humble Address of the Bishop of Peterborough, the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church, and the Archdeacon and Clergy of the Diocese.

WE Your Majesty's most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects, beg Leave to acknowledge in a more particular Manner Your Majesty's unexampled Bounty in remitting the Arrears of Tithes to the poor Clergy of this Kingdom, in appropriating your whole Revenue of First Fruits and Tithes to their Maintenance, and in opening their Hands to receive, and the Heirs of others to give further Benefactions.
Your Majesty's pious Zeal and hearty Concern for the Interest of the Church of England, are clearly visible in this your Princely Beneficence under Clergy, many of which will now enjoy a more comfortable Sub- sistance than was provided at the Reformation, and all your Satisfaction of beholding that Defect thus happily supplied.
Your Royal Predecessors have been Defenders of the Faith; Your Majesty the Maintainer of it. They paid unto God the Things that were His; You give the Things that were Caesar's.
Wherefore it is but just that we devote our selves entirely to Your Majesty's Service, teaching the People under your Care to do the same, and to assist with us in Prayers and Endeavours, that Peace may be in your Time and Borders, and Plenteousness within your Palaces.
May that God, who only could inspire so much Goodness, Crown you with a long and happy Reign over us, and after that, with an exceeding glorious Glory.
