His day came in Two Mails from Holland, the freshest of the 16th Instant, N. S. which bring an Account, That his Grace the Duke of Mailbur high marched the 6th to Kirloch; and having Advice; That some of the Enemy's Squadrons appeared on the rising Ground over-against Philipsbourg, he ordered the English and Danish Horse to advance, and pass over the Rhine with all Expediction, to join the Palatine Troops which Prince Eugene had sent over that morning; upon whose Approach the Enemy retired. The 7th, the rest of the Army passed over the River. The Marshals de Villeroy and Martin, and the Count de Coignies, possed themselves on the Passes along the River Queich, which they had begun to sorry, as if they had intended to appute his Grace's passing that River; but upon our Army's advancing thister, they retired the 9th from their Camp in great Contusion to Hagunau. The 12th Prince Lewis marched to Landau, with the Forces which are to early on the Siege of that Place, while the Duke of Marlborough covers it with the rest of the Army. That day Brigadur-General Fergusin marched with 5 English Battalions to Mentz, where
