WHEREAS Our Parliament stands Prorogued to the Nineteenth Day of October next, We with the Advice of Our Privy-Council, do hereby Publish and Declare, That the said Parliament shall be further Prorogued on the said Nineteenth Day of October, to the Twenty-fourth Day of the said Month of October. And We have given Order to our Keeper of Our Great-Seal of England, to prepare a Commission for Proroguing the same accordingly. And We do hereby further Declare Our Pleasure, That the said Parliament shall, on the said Twenty-fourth Day of October next, be Held, and Sit for the Dispatch of divers Weighty and Important Affairs. And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens and Burgeses of the House of Commons are hereby Required, and Comanded to give their Attendance accordingly at Westminster on the said Twenty-fourth Day of October next.

Given at Our Court at Hampton-Court, the Twenty-first Day of September 1704. In the Third Year of Our Reign.

After our sincere and humble Acknowledgment for the numerous Blessings we enjoy at home under Your Majesty's Auspicious Administration, which make us distinguishably happy beyond any part of the World, vouchsafe us Leave to approach Your Sacred Person, with Hearts full of Duty and Joy for that eminent Signal, one so lately obtained at *Pleinheim* near *Hochster*, by the Providence of Heaven, and the Glory of Your Majesty's Arms, in Conjunction with Your Allies, under the Conduct of an English, and for ever Renowned General, the Duke of *Marborough*.

Your own generous Contribution towards the Support of the War, together with Your benign Encouragement of all those under Your Majesty's Obedience and Pay, render Your Commands, and even Your Wishes, to be thus effectually executed, and evidently show what a truly Royal and English Heart can perform.

By these Means, and by this memorable Action, Your Majesty's Name will in all Histories be recorded with greater Lustre than any of Your Predecessors; and Your Fame for having at this Critical Juncture obliged the Common Enemy to retire before Your Victorious Forces both by Land and Sea, and for having secured our Liberties and Religion as by Law Established, and transporting it safe to Posterity, (as Your Majesty hath been graciously pleased to promise) must always, in a more peculiar Manner, remain engraven in the Mind of every Well-Wisher to the Honour and Constitution of England.

That Your Majesty's Reign may be long over us, and constantly as prosperous as hitherto, are our earnest and fervent Prayers.

All which Addresses Her Majesty received very graciously.

Lisbon, Sept. 23. N. S. Sir John Lake, with a Squadron of English Men of War under his Command, came into this River 3 days ago, and several more are daily expected. Our Letters from the Frontier say, That the Earl of *Galway*, with the English and Dutch Forces, having joined the Portuguese Troops under the Marquis *das Minas*, they are now encamped about a Mile on this side of *Almeida*; and that the Kings of *Spain* and *Portugal*, are come from *Guarda* to the Camp. The Enemies Forces lie near *Salamanca*.

Turin, Sept. 16. N. S. On the 30th past *Te Deum* was Sung here and in our Duke's Camp at *Crescenino* for the glorious Victory gained by the Allies at *Pleinheim* near *Hochster*. The Duke of *Vendome* having Invested *Ivrea* about the end of the last month, opened his Trenches the 3d instant at night, and began to play upon the Town from seven Batteries; but his Attacks being all on one side only of the River *Doire*, which runs through the Place, we had still one Gate open, and thereby an opportunity of Reinforcing the Garrison, for which purpose a Regiment of *Fuzeliers*, and about 330 *Heydukes*, were sent thither, as were also great quantities of all sorts of Provisions and Ammunition. The 5th at Night, the Enemy attacked the Half-Moon, but were repulsed 3 several times, and altho' the Besieged were at last obliged to quit that Post, yet the Enemy durst not make a Lodgment there. Monsieur *Kirchbarun*, Governour of the Town, and all the Officers of the Garrison were present at this Attack, but some of them were obliged to retire before the Action was over, to give Direction, about extinguishing a Fire which the Enemies Bombs had kindled at

the *Doire*, to possess themselves of some Posts on the other side of that River, so that our Communication with the Town is now entirely cut off; however, the Garrison continues to defend itself with all imaginable Resolution, the Governour having caused Incumbments to be cast up behind the Breach, and being resolved to hold out to the utmost; Two days ago they made a great Sally, and drove the Enemy into their Trenches, killing above 200 of them. The Duke de *la Feuillade*, with the French Forces under his Command, is at present in the *Vallics*, whither our Duke has sent the Regiment de *Porte*, and a new raised Regiment consisting of French Deserters, to assist the *Vandois*, who have hitherto defended themselves very resolutely, tho' with little assistance of any Regular Troops. A new raised Swiss Regiment called the *Queen's Regiment*, which has been in *Garison* here some time, is marched to *Coni*, to supply the Places of two Battalions, which are marched from thence to the Camp at *Crescenino*. The Duke of *Vendome* has detached about 20 Squadrons of Horse, and some Foot, that were in *Garison* at *Castel Albi*, to reinforce the Grand Prior his Brother. Monsieur *d'Albergotti* with a Body of French Troops is encamped in the *Astican* within sight of *Verua*. He has lately sent a Detachment towards *Quiéri*, whereupon Orders were dispatched to the Regiment of *Saluties*, which was marching from thence to our Army to return to their *Garison*; And the Baron de *Martigni*, who commanded a Flying Camp near *Pignatol*, is ordered to march towards the *Astican*, where he will be joined by that Regiment which consists of 2 Battalions, and by 2 Battalions more, in order to observe Monsieur *Albergotti*. Six or 7 days ago a Party of our Hussars took between *Tortone* and *Vercell*, five French Ingenieurs, who were sent by the Duke de *la Feuillade* to be employed in the Siege of *Ivrea*; and since that another of our Parties of Hussars fell in with a French Convoy from *Casé*. There were several Officers who had lain Sick in that Town, and being recovered, were returning to their Army, most of whom were taken by our Hussars, with the best part of their Baggage, their Guard, though much Superior to our Party, having been entirely routed. The Enemies Forces are very Sickly, especially those before *Ivrea*, there being at present above 12000 of them in their Hospitals. Our Letters from *Geneva* give an Account of an Engagement between the Confederate Fleet commanded by Sir George Rook, and the French Fleet under the Count de *Toulouse* the 14th past, off of *Malaga*; and do all agree, That the Advantage remained on our Side; which is also confirmed by the Letters from *Lions*, which came by the way of *Switzerland*, and by some Advices from *Marteilles*; the latter adding, That several of the Enemies Ships and Gallies were yet missing.

Plymouth, September 24. Her Majesty's Ship the *Edgar* sailed hence the 20th Instant, with about 20 Sail of homeward-bound Merchant Men and Coasters. The 21st sailed Sir Stafford Fairborne with the Squadron under his Command, yesterday the *Roche* brought in a French Privateer of 6 Guns. Last Night one other of Her Majesty's Ships arrived here from the *Strigins*, one of which brought in upon Suspicion a large Ship richly laden, the Master whereof pretends she belongs to *Leghorn*; This day a Dutch Man of War sailed hence to the Eastward, with about 13 Sail of Merchant Ships and Coasters, most of them bound for *London*.

Dartmouth, September 24. A Dutch Rear-Admiral, and 4 other of their Men of War, with their homeward-bound St. Hubs Fleet, and several Merchant Ships from *Lisbon*, most of them bound for *Ireland*, came into *Torbay* the 20th Instant; since which 5 of the Men of War with the St. Hubs Ships are sailed for *Spirhead*: And last night Sir Stafford Fairborne with his Squadron put into *Torbay*, as did also this Afternoon a Dutch Man of War with about 11 Sail, supposed to be some Dutch Prizes and Coasters from *Falmouth*.

Turmouth, September 25. A Fleet of laden Colliers bound to the Southward, is come into our Road this day from *Newcastle*.

Bristol, September 25. On the 22d Instant 5 Merchant Ships arrived here from *Jamaica*, having left the rest of the Fleet bound from thence to *London* the 20th Instant off the Coast of *Ireland*. This day came in Her Majesty's Ship the *Arundel*, and under her Convey 3 Merchant Ships from the *West-Indies*, but last from *Ireland*, and several Vessels from that Kingdom bound hither.

Cowes, September 25. The Dutch St. Hubs Fleet came to *Schellens* the 23d Instant; and yesterday about noon Sir George Rook came thither, with the Fleet under his Command.

Portsmouth, September 26. Her Majesty's Fleet under the Command of Sir George Rook is still at *St. Hellens*; where is also the Dutch homeward-bound St. Hubs Fleet, which wait for a fair Wind to proceed to *Holland*.
