WE Your Majesty's most Loyal and Obedient Subjects, being deeply sensible of Your Royal Grace and Favour towards all Your People, and of the happy Security and Protection Your Subjects enjoy under Your Auspicious Government, not only by a due Administration of Your Majesty's Laws at home, but also by the Courage and Conduct of Your Armies and Fleets abroad; do most humbly beg Leave to Congratulate Your Majesty upon the Glorious Victory obtained over the French and Bavarians by Your Majesty's Arms, and those of Your Allies, under the Conduct of his Grace John Duke of Marlborough; and upon the Victory and good Successes obtained by Your Majesty's Fleet under the Command of Sir George Rooke.

We do with a fervent Zeal beseech Almighty God to bless Your Majesty with long Life, and a glorious and happy Reign over these Your Realms, and with a further Prosperity of Your Arms by Sea and Land.

And we do with Sincerity of Hearts unanimously and cheerfully promise and assure Your Majesty, of our constant Fidelity to Your Majesty's Person and Government.

All which Addresses Her Majesty received very Graciously.

Venice, September 15. N.S. The Imperial Forces under the Count de Leiningen have passed the Adige, and are marching towards the Province of Breſcia, in order to make a Diversion of the French Forces in favour of the Duke of Savoy: The Grand Prior intends, as is said, to oppose them with part of his Army, and with the rest to lay formal Siege to Mirandola.

Warsaw, September 20. The King of Sweden has taken Lemberg, and obliged that City to pay him 300000 Crowns to be exempted from Plunder. A Detachment of the Swedish Army is march'd towards Samosc: The King of Poland draws his Troops together near the Place where the River Bug falls into the Weisſell, and seems to draw all his Forces towards Prussia, in order to cut off the Communication of the Swedes with their own Country.

Vienna, Sept. 27. The Suspension of Arms which the Emperor had granted to the Malecontents in Hungary being very near expired, His Imperial Majesty, at the Solicitation of the Ministers of England and Holland, has been pleas'd to prolong it to the 15th of the next Month; And further to shew his good Disposition to put an end to those unhappy Troubles, has appointed Baron Zeilar, Count Lamberg, and Count Cobari, his Plenipotentiaries to treat with the Malecontents, who have likewise named three Commissioners on their side, and propos'd Schemnitz for the Place of Treaty, at which they desire the English and Dutch Ministers to assist. On the 20th Instant Prince Ragotski, the Archbishop of Colocza, Count Berezeni, and Baron Zirmal were together at Herzg, a little Village near Leventz, preparing Matters for the intended Treaty: And General Heister is return'd to Vienna, leaving the Army under his Command to the care of Lieutenant-General Herberstein.

On the 24th the Emperor, Empress, Arch-Duchesses, and the whole Court, went to a Spanish Convent in the Suburb of this City, where Te Deum was sung for the taking of Gibraltar, and the Cannon round the Town was thrice discharged.

The King of Prussia has, by his Resident here, disavow'd the Conduct of his Resident at Ratisbonne, in protecting the Ministers of Bavaria and Cologne, which will be likewise declared publickly at the Diet.

From the Duke of Marlborough's Camp at Weissenbourg, Octob. 3. The Duke of Marlborough having waited on the King of the Romans in the Camp before Landau, and view'd the Approaches our Troops have made towards the Place, return'd hither on the 24th of the last Month in the Evening, as Pr. Eugene did the next Morning. The 25th 4 Prussian Regiments of Foot march'd hence to reinforce
