To THE QUEEN'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY:

It is our first duty and our valued privilege as we now assemble in a new Convocation to present this loyal address to Your Majesty. The happy memory of Your Majesty's Coronation and of the hopes and prayers which then surrounded you is still fresh and living in the minds and hearts of all your peoples. Those hopes and prayers have been fulfilled and answered, for Your Majesty, both at home and in your journeys through your wide dominions, has daily given proof of unwearying dedication to the tasks and opportunities of public duty. Your subjects in many parts of the world have rejoiced in Your Majesty's presence among them, and your safe return brought equal joy to us all.

We are thankful that in bearing the burden of the many and grave responsibilities which fall upon you, Your Majesty has the unfailing support of your husband His Royal Highness the Duke of Edinburgh.
