

to a point opposite the middle of the southwestern end of Walton Avenue and continuing thence north-eastwards to and along the middle of Walton Avenue to a point opposite its northeastern end in the middle of Carlyon Avenue and continuing thence north-westwards along the middle of Carlyon Avenue to a point opposite its northwestern end in the middle of Eastcote Lane and continuing thence north-eastwards along the middle of Eastcote Lane to the middle of the junction of Eastcote Lane and Alexandra Avenue and continuing thence north-westwards along the middle of Alexandra Avenue to the boundary which divides the parish of St. Paul, South Harrow, from the parish of St. Alban, North Harrow.

“(b) All that adjacent part (coloured green on the map) of the parish of St. Alban, North Harrow, which lies to the south of an imaginary line commencing at a point on the boundary which divides the parish of St. Alban, North Harrow, from the parish of St. Paul, South Harrow, in the middle of the railway line of the Uxbridge Branch of the Piccadilly Line of London Transport Executive opposite the northern end of the wall or fence forming the eastern boundary of the Sports Ground of Harrow Town Cricket Club and continuing thence in a northwesterly direction along the middle of the said railway line to its junction with the Uxbridge Branch railway line of Metropolitan Line of London Transport Executive at Rayners Lane Station and continuing thence in a northwesterly direction along the middle of the joint railway line of the Piccadilly & Metropolitan Lines to the boundary, which divides the parish of St. Alban, North Harrow, from the parish of St. Lawrence, Eastcote.”

And whereas the provisions of the New Parishes Measure, 1943, relating to the preparation and submission of this Scheme, have been duly complied with:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately upon the publication of this Order in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Measure.

And Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London.

WHEREAS the Church Commissioners have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the 21st day of *October*, 1955, in the words and figures following, that is to say:

“We, the Church Commissioners, acting in pursuance of the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, and the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1952, now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme which we have prepared with the consent of the Right Reverend Ronald Ralph, Bishop of Leicester (in witness whereof he has signed the Scheme), for effecting the union of the benefice of Frolesworth and the benefice of Leire with Ashby Parva both situate in the diocese of Leicester.

“SCHEME.

“1. *Union of Benefices.* The benefice of Frolesworth and the benefice of Leire with Ashby Parva shall be permanently united together and form one benefice with cure of souls under the style of ‘The United Benefice of Frolesworth and Leire with Ashby Parva’, but the parishes of the said benefices shall continue in all respects distinct.

“2. *Taking effect of union.* Upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council affirming this Scheme is published in the London Gazette the union shall forthwith take effect.

“3. *Parsonage House.*

“(a) After the union has taken effect and upon the provision at Leire of a house approved by us as suitable to be the residence house for the incumbent of the united benefice such house as aforesaid shall be the house of residence of the incumbent of the united benefice.

“(b) Without prejudice to the exercise, before the date when the union takes effect, of any of the powers conferred by the Parsonage Measures, 1938 and 1947, the parsonage house at present belonging to the benefice of Frolesworth, if at that date it so belongs, and the site and appurtenances thereof and the grounds heretofore usually occupied and enjoyed therewith shall, as soon as conveniently may be, be sold and disposed of by us at such time or times and in such manner in all respects as to us shall seem expedient, and the net proceeds of such sale or sales shall be held by us for the augmentation of the endowment of the united benefice.

“4. *Patronage.* After the union has taken effect, in every series of three successive turns of presentation or nomination to be made to the united benefice, that one of the alternate patrons of the benefice of Leire with Ashby Parva who but for the provisions of this scheme would have been entitled to the next presentation to that benefice shall have the first turn, the patron of the benefice of Frolesworth shall have the second turn and the other alternate patron of the benefice of Leire with Ashby Parva shall have the third turn.”

And whereas the provisions of the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1952, the Union of Benefices Rules, 1926 and 1930, and the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, relating to the preparation and submission of this Scheme have been duly complied with:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to affirm the said Scheme and to order that it shall be and become effectual in law immediately upon the publication of this Order in the London Gazette.

WHEREAS the Church Commissioners have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the 21st day of *October*, 1955, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

“We, the Church Commissioners, acting in pursuance of the New Parishes Measure, 1943, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme for altering the boundaries of the parishes of Torpenhow and Bassenthwaite both in the diocese of Carlisle.

“SCHEME.

“Whereas we are satisfied that it is desirable that the boundaries of the said parishes should be altered in the manner hereinafter mentioned:

“And whereas the Right Reverend Thomas, Bishop of Carlisle, consents to the proposed arrangements (in testimony whereof he has signed this Scheme):

“Now, therefore, we, the said Church Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme the boundaries of the said parishes of Torpenhow and Bassenthwaite shall be altered in the manner described in the Schedule and delineated on the map annexed to this Scheme.

“THE SCHEDULE.

“The territory to be annexed to the parish of Bassenthwaite:

“All that part of the parish of Torpenhow (coloured pink on the map annexed hereto) which is bounded upon the east by the parish of Ireby upon the south by the parish of Bassenthwaite upon the west by the parish of Isel and upon the remaining side by an imaginary line commencing at the point on the boundary which divides the parish of Isel from the parish of Torpenhow in the middle of Isel Old Park Road and proceeding thence first north-eastwards and then eastwards along the last mentioned road to its end and continuing thence in a straight line north-eastwards (thereby crossing the Keswick to Carlisle Road) to the western end of the wall or fence forming the southern and southeastern boundary of close number 62 and continuing thence first eastwards and then north-eastwards along the last mentioned
