The humble Address of the Presbyterian Ministers, and those of their Parishes in the North of Ireland.

May it please Your Majesty,

As we have Religiously observ'd the Publick Thanksgiving appointed by the Government for that Glorious Victory obtained over the French and Bavarians by Your Majesty's Forces, under the Renowned Conduct and Bravery of his Grace the Duke of Marlborough; we humbly beg Leave to congratulate Your Sacred Majesty upon this happy Season, and never to be forgotten Success, together with all the other powerful Effects of Your Majesty's Arms, wherewith it hath pleas'd God Almighty to bless Your Majesty, in Conjunction with Your Allies; hoping that by this means the Divine Goodness may give Your Majesty a further Opportunity of exerting Your Princely Compassion, Tender Care and Fervent Zeal; towards the Relief of the distressed Protestants abroad, so agreeable to Your Royal Goodness to Your Protestant Subjects at home, of whom we are a considerable Part in this Kingdom.

We shall always take Care to insure our unwearied Fidelity to Your Majesty's Person and Government, according to our lawful Loyal Principles; and in our Stations, according to our lawful Loyal Principles, to support and defend the Protestant Succession as by Law established. That God will bless Your Majesty with a long and prosperous Reign; and afterwards excite You to an incorruptible Crown, is the earnest Prayer of us, who in our own Name, and in the Name of those we represent, subscribe our selves, (may it please Your Majesty) Your Majesty's most Dutiful, most Loyal, and most Obedient Subjects.

All which Addresses Her Majesty received very Graciously.

Avantes, Nov. 4. N. S. Lieutenant-General Windham, with the English Foot under his Command, came and encamped near this place the 31st inst. Yesterday the Earl of Galway went to Extremos, to confer with the Conde de San Vicente, Governor of Armus in Alentejo, about Quarters for the English Forces which are to Winter in that Province. The Dutch Forces marched yesterday to their Quarters at Tomar, Punhete, Touques, and other Places in our Neighbourhood. The King of Portugal is come to Tomar, in his way to Lisbon. The King of Spain is at Coimbra.

Lisbon, Novemb. 6. N. S. The English and Dutch Transport Ships are come into the Tajo, and the Forces on board them will shortly march to the Quarters assigned them. Sir John Leake, with the Squadron under his Command, consisting upwards of 20 Ships of the Line, sailed this day towards Gibraltar, with a supply of Provisions and Ammunition for that Place, before which the French have left only 5 or 6 Frigates; Monsieur Poincy being gone with the rest of his Squadron to Cadix, where he has laid up his biggest Ships. We have an Account from Gibraltar, That the Marquis de Villadarias, who besieges that Town by Land, opened his Trenches the 21st inst, but had made very little Progress; and that the Prince of Hesse has raised a Battery upon one of the Hills near it, which commands the Enemy's Works.

Falmouth, November 6. This day sailed hence a Dutch Man of War, and a Privateer of 26 Guns, with 7 Prizes under their Convoy, bound for Flushing, 2 of them laden with Sugars from St. Domingo, 1 with Furs from Canada, and 1 with Wine from Bourdeaux.

Plymouth, Nov. 7. This day came in here Her Majesty's Ship the Looe, which sailed from Newfoundland about five Weeks ago in Company of 13 Sail of Merchant-men, but was separated from them 10 days ago in stormy Weather. Her Majesty's Ships the Hazardous and Laystoffs sailed this day for the Downs, and under their Convoy the William and Shepard, John Beach Master, from Lisbon; the Mayflower, William Mills Master, the Edward and Sarah, Henry Moore Master, and the Hurdis Gally; being all bound for London.

Hull, Nov. 8. A Fleet of Dutch Merchant Ships bound to Amsterdam sailed hence the 6th Instant, under the Convoy of two of their Men of War.

Cowes, Nov. 8. Yesterday was brought in here by a Privateer of Flushing, a Prize called the Revenge of Duskirik, formerly the Bridgewater Packet-Boat, taken from us by the French.

Tarnewick, Nov. 10. The 7th Instant sailed hence the Ormond and Betty Gallies, laden with Herrings for the Straights. That day and the 8th came into our Roads about 40 Sail of Laden Colliers from Newcastle, which sailed again this day to the Southward.

There are Three Mails due from Holland.
