THE following Address from the Borough of Ripon was presented to Her Majesty by John Sharpe Esq; one of their Representatives in Parliament; being introduced by His Grace the Lord Archbishop of York.

To the QUEEN's most Excellent Majesty.

Your humble Address of Your Majesty's Justices of the Peace of and within his Grace the Lord Archbishop of York his Liberties of Ripon, in the County of York, and of the Grand Jury at the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace holden at Ripon the Seventh Day of October, in the Third Year of Your Majesty's Reign; and of the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, and Common Council, of Your Majesty's ancient Corporation of Ripon; together with other Gentlemen and Freeholders within the Liberties aforesaid.

It please Your Majesty.

WE Your Majesty's Dutiful Subjects, humbly beg Leave to Congratulate Your Majesty upon the Glorious Victories Your Arms have obtained over the French and Bavarian Forces. It is well known that Your Majesty's being at the Head of the said Alliances, hath produced this happy Success. Heaven still protect Your Majesty in this great undertaking, till You have restored Peace to those contending Nations that are about You; that You may be acknowledged as great a Blessing abroad, as You are to Your People at home. It is very remarkable, that extraordinary Actions have happen'd under the Government of English Queens; and may Your Majesty's happy Reign over us last very long; for nothing but want of time can hinder Your Majesty from being more eminent than any of Your Glorious Predecessors.

The Two Addresses which follow have likewise been presented to Her Majesty.

To the QUEEN's most Excellent Majesty.

MADAM,

WE, the Lieutenant-Governor, Lieutenant-Bayliff, Jurats, and Civil Officers, of the Royal County of Your Majesty's Island of Guernsey, parcel of the ancient Dutchy of Normandy, do most humbly pray Your Majesty to permit us, with the rest of Your Faithful Subjects, to express our Joy for the Glorious Success of Your Arms, as well in the Battel of Hochstet,

under the Conduct of Your brave General the Duke of Marlborough; as in the taking of Gibraltar, and in the Victory obtained over the French Fleet by Your Majesty's Navy commanded by Sir George Rooke; wherein God has manifestly clared himself Your Protector, and shewn his Approbation of Your Zeal and Piety.

We return our most humble Thanks to God for it, and pray to him, from the bottom of our Hearts, to make Your Arms still successful by Sea and Land, in order to bring down the Pride of Your Enemies; and that Your Majesty, being crowned with Laurels, may procure us a Glorious Peace: And that he may preserve Your Majesty, and grant You a long and happy Reign over us.

The most humble Address of the Clergy of the Island of Guernsey.

MADAM,

WE, the Dean, Rectors and Ministers, of Your Majesty's Island of Guernsey, being sensibly affected with the happy Successes wherewith it has pleased Almighty God to bless Your Majesty's Arms both at Sea and Land during this Campaign, find our selves under a powerful Obligation to express to Your Majesty our Joy for it. We consider these great Victories Your Generals have gained as the propitious Work of Heaven, as the Effect of the Valour of Your Officers, and as a Reward for Your Piety towards God, and Your Zeal towards his Church. These Glorious Events fill us with great Hopes for the future: And we look upon those Conragious Troops, and that Invincible Fleet which have lately died the Danube and the Streights with the Blood of Your Enemies, as so many Heralds, who were sent to declare to the World the Glory and the Strength of Your Scepter; and as so many Messengers designed to carry to the Common Enemy of Europe the News of his own Confusion. We pray God that he will pour down yet more and more his Blessings upon Your Majesty's Sacred Person; and that he will give You a long, happy and prosperous Reign, to the end You may maintain the Glory of Your Kingdoms, confound all Your Enemies, be the Admiration of all Mankind; and at length that, after many Triumphs, You may give Peace to Europe; and, as Cyrus did heretofore, may now restore both in the East and the West the Sanctuaries which Superstition has thrown down. These are the Sentiments of Your Faithful Subjects, and these are the Prayers they offer to Heaven in behalf of Your Majesty.

Rome, Octob. 13. N. S. On the 11th Instant died here Cardinal Charles Barberini, in the 75th year of his Age: He was the eldest of the College of Cardinals, in which there are now 17 Places vacant. The Pope has made Cardinal Nerli Arch-priest of the Church of St Peter in his room: But there is not yet any talk of his making a Promotion of Cardinals. We have received an Account by a Tartane, which came from Messina to Civita-Vecchia, That the Gallies of Maltha met lately with three Men of War belonging to Tripoly, whom they attacked very vigorously; and after a sharp Dispute, wherein 400 of the Maltese were killed or wounded, among whom are 17 Knights of Maltha, one of the Turkish Ships was taken, another sunk, and the other got away very much damaged.

Falmouth, Nov. 9. On the 7th Instant came in here the King William Pacquet Boat, William Smith Commander, from Jamaica, having been 49 days in her Passage. Yesterday arrived the Prince Pacquet Boat, Zachariah Rogers Commander, which came in 7 days from Lisbon. This day sailed the Alliance Pacquet Boat for Lisbon, John Green Commander, with the Betty Galley, Renatus Curtis Master, bound for Oporto.

Plymouth, Nov. 12. On the 8th Instant came in here the Phoenix of and from Fowey, John Step Master, bound for Lisbon. The Zelander, a Flushing Privateer of 24 Guns, has brought in here as Prize a Privateer of 16 Guns, belonging to St. Malo. The 10th came in Her Majesty's Ships the Rochester and Deptford, and under their Convoy the Alexander Galley from the East-Indies, 5 Ships from the West-Indies, and 9 Sail of English and Dutch from Ireland, Curassaw, and other Parts. Yesterday sailed to the Westward Her Majesty's Ships the Exeter, May and Medway, and the Sophia Galley of London, Richard Rider Master, bound for Lisbon. Last night sailed to the Eastward Her Majesty's Ships the Deptford and Rochester, with the homeward-bound English and Dutch Merchant Ships under their Convoy.

Bristol, Novemb. 11. On the 9th Instant came in here the Ruby of Chester from Rotterdam; the Lamb, William Everard Master, and the Loyalty, Henry Brown Master, both belonging to Liverpool; the Somerset of this Port, William Wellcome Master, and the Barbadoes Merchant of Liverpool, Simon Young Master; all 4 from Virginia. The 10th came in the Good Alliance, or the Greyhound Prize, from Newfoundland, taken by a Letter of Mart-man belonging to this Port; and the Mary of this Port, John Madox Master, from Newfoundland. Last night came into Kingroad the Mermaid Galley of London, James French Commander, from Guinea, but last from Virginia; and the Dolphin Galley of London, Captain Carnaby Commander. This day came in Her Majesty's Ship the Bridgewater, having been Convoy to several Ships bound from Ireland to Biddisford and Minthead; with her came also the Samuel from Waterford.

Portsmouth, Novemb. 12. The 10th Instant arrived at Spithead Her Majesty's Ships the Revenge

and Advice Prize from the Downes. The 11th day came in Her Majesty's Ships the Lifford and Hazardous, with about 8 Sail of Merchant-men under their Convoy from the Westward.

Yarmouth, Novemb. 13. Her Majesty's Ships the Solebay and Sorlings failed out of our Road on the 11th, with a Fleet of Merchant Ships under their Convoy, bound for Rotterdam. Yesterday came into our Road from the Southward several light Colliers and Coasters, under Convoy of Her Majesty's Ship the Chatham Prize.
