Your humble Address of Your Majesty's Justices of the Peace of and within his Grace the Lord Archbishop of York his Liberties of Ripon, in the County of York, and of the Grand Jury at the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace holden at Ripon the Seventh Day of October, in the Third Year of Your Majesty's Reign; and of the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, and Common Council, of Your Majesty's ancient Corporation of Ripon; together with other Gentlemen and Freeholders within the Liberties aforesaid.

WE Your Majesty's Dutiful Subjects, humbly beg Leave to Congratulate Your Majesty upon the Glorious Victories Your Arms have obtained over the French and Bavarian Forces. It is well known that Your Majesty's being at the Head of the said Alliances, hath produced this happy Success. Heaven still protect Your Majesty in this great undertaking, till You have restored Peace to those contending Nations that are about You; that You may be acknowledged as great a Blessing abroad, as You are to Your People at home. It is very remarkable, that extraordinary Actions have happen'd under the Government of English Queens; and may Your Majesty's happy Reign over us last very long; for nothing but want of time can hinder Your Majesty from being more eminent than any of Your Glorious Predecessors.

MADAM,

WE, the Lieutenant-Governor, Lieutenant-Bayliff, Jurats, and Civil Officers, of the Royal County of Your Majesty's Island of Guernsey, parcel of the ancient Dutchy of Normandy, do most humbly pray Your Majesty to permit us, with the rest of Your Faithful Subjects, to express our Joy for the Glorious Success of Your Arms, as well in the Battel of Hochstet,

under the Conduct of Your brave General the Duke of Marlborough; as in the taking of Gibraltar, and in the Victory obtained over the French Fleet by Your Majesty's Navy commanded by Sir George Rooke; wherein God has manifestly clared himself Your Protector, and shewn his Approbation of Your Zeal and Piety.

We return our most humble Thanks to God for it, and pray to him, from the bottom of our Hearts, to make Your Arms still successful by Sea and Land, in order to bring down the Pride of Your Enemies; and that Your Majesty, being crowned with Laurels, may procure us a Glorious Peace: And that he may preserve Your Majesty, and grant You a long and happy Reign over us.

The most humble Address of the Clergy of the Island of Guernsey.

MADAM,

WE, the Dean, Rectors and Ministers, of Your Majesty's Island of Guernsey, being sensibly affected with the happy Successes wherewith it has pleased Almighty God to bless Your Majesty's Arms both at Sea and Land during this Campaign, find our selves under a powerful Obligation to express to Your Majesty our Joy for it. We consider these great Victories Your Generals have gained as the propitious Work of Heaven, as the Effect of the Valour of Your Officers, and as a Reward for Your Piety towards God, and Your Zeal towards his Church. These Glorious Events fill us with great Hopes for the future: And we look upon those Conragious Troops, and that Invincible Fleet which have lately died the Danube and the Streights with the Blood of Your Enemies, as so many Heralds, who were sent to declare to the World the Glory and the Strength of Your Scepter; and as so many Messengers designed to carry to the Common Enemy of Europe the News of his own Confusion.
