WE beg leave to assure Your Majesty, That we do, with Hearts full of Loyalty and Duty, congratulate Your Majesty upon the late Glorious Victory obtained by the Arms of Your Majesty, under the unparalleled Conduct of his Grace the Duke of Marlborough, over a powerful Army of French and Bavarians in Germany; which doth evidently show, that Your Majesty is the only Power on Earth from whom Injured Princes can hope for a Redress of their Wrongs; and plainly inform Europe, that Your Sacred Person is Her Balance, and the Preserver of Her Peace and Tranquillity.

We cannot but take hold of this welcome Opportunity, to assure Your Majesty of our earnest Supplications to Almighty God, That his Blessing may always attend Your Sacred Person; that Your Majesty's Arms, in all their Undertakings and Enterprises, may have the like Success; and that Your Reign over us may be long and prosperous; and shall be the hearty Prayers of, Dread Sovereign, Your Majesty's most Dutiful and most Obedient Subjects and Servants.

All which Addresses Her Majesty received very Graciously.

Vicenna, Novemb. 12. The Negotiation with the Malecontents of Hungary having proved unsuccessful, Mr. Stepany, Her Majesty's Great Britain's Envoy Extraordinary, and Monsieur Bruynier, who has the same Character from the States-General, are returned hither from Schemnitz, the Place of Treaty, where they have been to contribute their good Offices towards bringing Matters to an Accommodation. Prince Ragotzi, the Chief of the Malecontents, set down before the Town of Newhausel the Seventh Instant with an Army of 20000 Men. General Herbeville is drawing together the Imperial Troops under his Command near Presbourg, in order to oppose the Malecontents, and three Regiments of Cuirassiers are marching from Bavaria to reinforce him. Letters from Transylvania, of the 24th of September, say, That General Rabutin had on the 14th obtained a considerable Advantage over a Body of the Malecontents near Hermanstadt, and had afterwards Relieved Devan, a considerable Fortress, that had been block'd up by them about Seven Months, and was reduced to great Straits. On the Twenty ninth past, Count Straatman, the Emperor's Envoy to the King of Poland, who had been here some time upon his own private Affairs, set out for Brellaw in order to proceed from thence to that King's Court. The same day the Bishop of Augsburg, Brother to the Empress, arrived here from Judenburg in Carinthia, where he has Resided with the Electress Palatine his Mother ever since they left Inspruck, upon the Irruption which the Bavarians made the last Year into Tyrol.

From the Camp at Croon-Weissenbourg, Nov. 10. N.S. The Duke of Marlborough having given the necessary Directions for Attacking Traerbach, set out from Berncastel the 4th Instant early in the Morning, and came that Night to Kern, the next Day to Keyerslauteren, and the 6th at Night to the Camp before Lantzen, where he found the Besiegers entirely Masters of the Counterfort, on which they had raised some Batteries, and more being perfected the next Day, they have now about 60 Pieces of Canon bring to make a Breach, which they have already done on the Face of the Counterguard on the Right; and the Miners continue the Sappe under the Covered-way, both on the Right and Left, to make Passages into the Ditch, for the filling of which a great part of the Materials is already provided, and the rest are expected to Morrow. The 8th his Grace returned hither. The Enemy having sent all their Horse of the Household from the Camp at Hagenau, in order, as they give out, to put them into Winter-Quarters, his Grace intends that the English Horse shall march from hence very speedily towards Holland, and that the Foot shall embark

bark in order to return thither as soon as we are Masters of the Countre-guard at Landau. A Defenter, who came this Morning from thence, says, that the Garison has suffered very much.

Frankfort, Nov. 16. The Duke of Marlborough arrived here last Night from his Camp at Weissenbourg; The Magistrates offered to salute him with a Discharge of their Cannon, and to pay him all the other Honours due to his Rank and Quality; but his Grace was pleased to decline all manner of Ceremony, to pursue his Journey with more Diligence, and set out early this Morning towards Cassel, intending to proceed from thence to the Courts of Prussia and Hanover. Letters from the Camp before Landau give Account, That on the 11th Instant they raised a new Battery on the Countre-garp of 4 Pieces of Cannon; the 12th they raised two Batteries more of two Pieces of Cannon each and one of two Mortars; the 13th they began to fill up the Ditch, which Work was continued the next day; and they carried on a Gallery to the Right side of the Half-moon, and were making the other necessary Preparations in order to lodge themselves upon it.

Frankfort, Novemb. 19. The Treaty of Accommodation between the Emperor and the Electors of Bavaria was concluded the 10th Instant, by the King of the Romans and the Deputies of Her Electoral Highness, who is to surrender all the Towns in her Possession to His Imperial Majesty; to continue at Munich with a Guard of 400 Men, the new Fortifications of that Place being razed; and to have an Yearly Pension allowed her. The Considerate Forces which were in and about Triers, marched from thence the Seventh towards Saarburg, which Place surrendered to them the next Day at Discretion; the Garison, to the Number of 350 Men, remaining Prisoners of War. The Siege of Traerbach goes on with very good Success. Our last Advices from the Camp before Landau are of the 17th, and give an Account, That they had the day before possessed themselves of the Half-Moon with inconsiderable loss, and had a very fair Prospect of being soon entirely Masters of the Place. The Deputies of the Electoral Circle of the Rhine, who are assembled here, have lately publish'd a very strict Order against the sending of Horses out of these Parts into the French Dominions.

Triers, Nov. 17. The Body of French Forces, which was lately drawn together in these Parts, and lay near Coningsmacheren, is marched to Nederholtz, below Diedenhoven, in order to separate and go into Winter Quarters; The Troops of the French King's Household, which were in Alface, are come to Metz, in order to their being likewise put into Quarters. On the 10th Instant a Detachment out of the Garison of Fribourg endeavour'd to surprize Old Brisac; for which purpose part of them were advanced thither disguised in Habits like Peasants, and others concealed in Carts under some Hay, which they pretended to carry into the Town for the use of the Garison; and they had already made themselves Masters of one of the Gates; but the rest of their Body not coming timely to their Assistance, they were obliged to retire, which they did with inconsiderable Loss. The Trenches before Traerbach are to be opened to-morrow; and all the Batteries will be ready to fire at the same time.

Hambourg, November 21. Letters from Poland give an Account, That upon the Approach of the Swedish Army, King Augustus marched from Puitowsk towards Cracow, with all his Horse and part of his Foot, having given Orders to the rest, being about 4000 in Number, commanded by Lieutenant-General Schuylichemberg, to return into Saxony, and take their Winter-Quarters there; but the King of Sweden having passed the Weisfel with a considerable Detachment of Horse, pursued Lieutenant-General Schuylichemberg, and having overtaken his Rear near Unienou, they had a sharp Dispute, which was renewed the next Day near Pauniz: After the Battle, the Saxons pursued their March towards Sicilia; and passed over the Oder without any farther Interruption. The Saxon and Muscovite Forces which lay before Posen raised the Siege of that Place the 7th Instant, in order to join the King of Poland in his March towards Cracow. They write from Lithuania, That the Forces in that Dutchy, Commanded by Oginski, having been reinforced by a considerable Body of Muscovites, did afterwards attack those under General Sapieha, and gave them a considerable Deteat. An Edict has lately been Issued by the King of Prussia, forbidding all his Subjects, under severe Penalties, to sell any Horses to the French.

Paris, Novemb. 23. The Count de Thoulouse arrived the 10th Instant at Marly from Thoulon. Our freshest Advices from the Duke of Vendome's Camp before Verue are of the 6th Instant, and give an Account of his having that day possessed himself of the Fort of Guerbignan, and that the Duke of Savoy's Infantry, which lay near that Place, was returned to his Royal Highness's Camp at Crescentino. The Grand Prior, with the Body of Forces under his Command, decamped the 28th past from Misolli, and posted himself at Monteciaro, where he was on the 5th Instant observing the German Troops under Count Leiningen, which continued in the same Camp near Salo, by the Lake di Garda, expecting further Reinforcements.

Hague, November 25. N. S. The Enemy having sent their Forces in the Netherlands into Winter-Quarters, Orders were sent last Week to Monsieur d'Auverquerque to separate the Army of the States-General under his Command, and send them into Quarters; which he accordingly began to do on the 22d Instant, and he is expected here in few Days. His Grace the Duke of Marlborough passed by Cassel the 17th, in his way to Berlin, where he intended to be the 23th, and after a short stay at that Court, to proceed to Hanover, from whence he is expected here in a Fort-night. Our freshest Advices from the Camp before Landau, say, it was firmly believed that the Garison would Capitulate as last

Week; so that we are in hourly Expectation of the News of its Surrender; as we are also of an Account of the Taking of Traerbach; our Letters from Coblenz, of the 20th, saying, That the Batteries against that Place had begun to play with so good Success, that it was thought that Garison could not hold out longer than the 22th. A Convoy of several Yachts and Men of War from England came into the Maese the 14th Instant, on board which came Vice-Admiral Mitchell, who arrived here the next Day, being sent by Her Majesty of Great Britain to confer with the Deputies of the States-General, in order to settle divers Matters relating to the Service at Sea for the next Year.

Whitehaven, Nov. 12. Seven or Eight of our Merchant-men, which have been made use of as Transport-Ships in the Portugal Service, came in here this week from Dublin; as did also this morning a light Collier from thence: Here are now above 60 Sail in our Harbour.

Plimouth, Nov. 14. This day came in here Her Majesty's Ship the Chathan: from Cruizing, which brings Advice, That on the 12th Instant Her Majesty's Ship the Elizabeth was taken in their sight 20 Leagues to the Westward of Scilly by 4 French Men of War, which are supposed to be part of the Count de St. Paul's Squadron, lately come out of Brest.

Portsmouth, Nov. 16. Yesterday morning arrived at Spithead Her Majesty's Ships the Rupert and Expedition; with two Prizes, one laden with Fish, and the other with Canary.

Yarmouth, Nov. 17. Yesterday came into our Road several Merchant Ships from Rotterdam, belonging to this Port.
