Venice, November 15. N. S. The Imperial Forces commanded by the Count de Leiningen are now encamped at Goggione and Gavardo, where they are intreaching themselves, intending to expect there their Reinforcements from Germany. They lately made a general Forage about Rezato, San-Giacomo, Torre, and Castagnedola, advancing within 5 Miles of Brescia. Signior Molino, Proveditor General of the Forces of this State in those Parts, arrived in this last Place the 5th Instant, and reviewed the Garison, which had lately been reinforced with 5000 Men, to prevent any Surprise either from the Germans, or the French. The latter are encamped about Montechiari, where the Grand Prior has his head Quarter; but it is said he intends to advance towards Ponte de San Marco, to hinder the Imperialists from receiving any Supplies of Forage and Provisions by that way from the Country of Brescia.
