Vienna, Nov. 26. N.S. General Heister went from hence last night towards Hungary, where he will have under his Command an Army of between 11 and 12000 Men. He intends to pass the Danube this day at Presbourg with about 6 or 7000 of them, and Colonel Viard is to march with the rest over the River Mark towards St. George and Bofing, so as to be able to join with General Heister near Tinnau in 2 or 3 days. By this Disposition the General hopes to surprize and rout several small Bodies of the Malcontents who lie scattered on this side of the River Waag; after which, he will endeavour to make himself Master of Schemnitz, and the other Towns, where are the Emperor's Mines. He is shortly to be reinforced by the two Regiments of Cuirassiers of Hohenzollern and Cusani, which are now marching hither from Straubingen. Mr. Whitworth, Her Majesty of Great Britain's Envoy Extraordinary to the Czar of Muscovy, set out from hence this morning for Moscow, intending to take his way by Breslaw and Dantzick.

Triers, Dec. 1. The Batteries before Traerbach not having had the intended effect, some alteration has been made in them, which being now perfected, we are in hopes in few days to have an Account of the Surrender of that Place.

Heydelberg, Dec. 2. The French Garison being marched out of Landau, part of the Forces which were employed in the Siege of that Place, are marching towards Bavaria, and the rest into Winter-Quarters. The Bavarian Garisons of Ingolstadt, Kuffstein, and Braunau, having made a difficulty of obeying the Elector's Orders for their Evacuating those Places, Prince Eugene is gone thither to adjust that Matter. The King of the Romans intends in two days to begin his Journey to Vienna.

Hanover, Dec. 5. N. S. Yesterday the Prince Royal of Prussia left this Place, and continued his Journey to Holland. The Duke of Marlborough, who intended to have set forward at the same time, but was prevailed upon by his Electoral Highness to stay here a day longer, took his Audiences of Leave last night, and began his Journey to the Hague early this morning, after having received at this Court all the Honours due to his Personal Merit, his Character, and the great Services he has rendered to the Common Cause in general, and particularly to the Empire.

Hague, Dec. 9. N. S. The Duke of Marlborough is expected here to morrow from Hanover; and it being believed he will pass through Amsterdamb, Preparations are made there for his Reception. The States have ordered one of their Yachts to attend him at Utrecht. The Yacht on Board which his Grace intends to take his Passage to England, with several English Men of War which are to Convey him, arrived at Helvoetsluis two days ago. We lately received Advice, That the French were drawing some Troops together near the Saar, in order, as was believed, to endeavour to repossess themselves of the Castle of Saarbruck, and afterwards of Treves; but yesterday we had an Express, with the News of their being separated, and gone into Winter-quarters. The Letters from France, which came in this day, say, The Marquis de Villadarias continues with his Forces before Gibraltar; but they own, That Sir John Lake had been there with the English Squadron under his Command, and had supplied that Garison with all they had occasion for; and that he had fallen in with several Frigates of Monsieur Pointi's Squadron, which he had either burnt or taken.

Plymouth, Nov. 28. This day arrived here Her Majesty's Ships the Medway, Mary, Exeter, and Sheerness Galley, and under their Convey, the James, the Lee Frigate, and the Hanover Frigate from Nevis; the Elizabeth and Catherine, the Barbadoes Merchant, the Nisbet, the Sufanna, the Lancaster, the Providence, the Prudence, the Britannia, and Success, from Barbadoes; the Churchill Frigate, the Samuel and Mary, the Yarmouth, the Anne Galley, the Greyhound, the John and Margaret, the Charles, the Virginia Merchant, the America, and the Elizabeth of Boston, retaken by the Sheerness, from Antegoa; being part of the homeward bound West-India Fleet: They were separated from the rest of the said Fleet in bad Weather about 25 days ago.

Dartmouth, November 28. Yesterday came into this Port the Ilena and for Zurichzee in Zealand, a Dogger, laden with Figs, and other Fruits from Portugal. This day came into this Harbour, a Dutch Dogger of 6 Guns, which was taken formerly by the French, and was since re-taken by the Robin and Seven Privateers, two Zealand Privateers, one of 26, and the other of 31 Guns, which took her two days since off of Ushant out of a Fleet of 40 Sail that came out of the River of Nants, and was bound to the Eastward; and the two Privateers were in pursuit of the rest when this Prize came from them.

Cowes, Nov. 29. A Dutch Man of War, with divers Merchant Ships from Rotterdam bound for Topham, and other Ports, failed hence yesterday morning; but soon after it proving Calm, they came to an Anchor between this Place and Yarmouth, where they still continue.

Portsmouth, Nov. 30. Yesterday morning arrived at Spithead Her Majesty's Ship the Winchester, and three Dutch Privateers from the Downes. The same day failed into this Harbour Her Majesty's Ship the Expedition.
