Turin, Novemb. 19. N. S.

Our Duke is still at Crescentino, and intends to continue there as long as the Enemies Troops remain in the Field, having disposed the Quarters of his own Forces in such manner that he can in a very short time draw them together upon any occasion; and to the end he may not find himself obliged to disperse his Horse, a large Magazine of Forage, and other Provisions, is erecting at Chivazzo for their Subsistence. The Enemy hath also been obliged to send his Horse into Quarters, which were no longer able to keep the Field, by reason of the great Rains we have lately had, which have very much retarded the Siege of Veruc. But we have an Account from thence, That the Weather not being at present so wet as it has been of late, the French have, with no little loss and pains, planted 14 pieces of Cannon and 6 Mortars upon their Batteries, which began to play on the 17th instant; but that their Minets have been able to make but very little progress; and that abundance of their Men fall sick every day, through the great Hardships they undergo, as well by the Badness of the Season, as by the want of Provisions and other Necessaries.

Pentice, Dec. 6. The Imperial Forces under the Command of Count Leiningen continue at Salo, and the French Troops under the Grand Prior at Dezenzano; and they are intrenching themselves on both sides. A German Party of 100 Horse has lately seized a Convoy of Provisions which was going to the French Quarters, having totally routed the Party that guarded it. Letters from Constantinople of the 10th of the last Month say, That the Grand Signior has displaced his Grand Visier, and has preferred the Bassa of Candia to that Employment; and that the Turks had sent divers Gallies with Forces on board towards the Black Sea, and had made other Preparations; whereby it should seem that they have thoughts of coming to a Rupture with the Muscovites.

Vienna, Decemb. 6. Colonel Tyllier arrived here this Morning from Hungary, having left General Heister yesterday at Zistertzdorf in Austria, about a German Mile on this side the Mark; where it is believed he will continue till he has been reinforced by two Imperial Regiments of Horse, which are daily expected here from Lintz. It is said, That the Count de Montecuculi is marched from Ephrata with a Body of 3000 Men towards Timau, in order to attempt the Relief of that Place, which is besieged by the Malecontents, and afterwards to joyn General Heister. General Herbersteyn, with another Body of the Emperor's Forces, is near Weiffelbourg. The Town of Palsau being now again in the Emperor's Possession, Cardinal Lamberg intends in a day or two to return to

his Residence there. The Queen of the Romans's Departure for Nicubaus in Bohemia, where she intends to meet the King, is said to be fixt for the 10th instant.

Ratisbonne, December 11. The Bavarian Garrison at Ingolstadt marched out of that Place the 7th Instant, and 2000 Imperialists entered into the Town, who are to continue there, under the Command of the Count de Montfort. There were found in the Place a great Number of Pieces of Brass Cannon, and great quantities of Ammunition. This being the strongest Place that remain'd in the Possession of the Bavarians, it is not doubted but the other Towns which are yet in their hands will be forthwith evacuated, in pursuance of the Treaty lately concluded between the Emperor and the Electors of Bavaria. The Cardinal de Lamberg is shortly expected at Passau; and as is said will soon after return hither, to assist as formerly at the Imperial Diet in the Quality of the Emperor's first Commissioner.

Triers, Decemb. 12. The Siege of Trarback is carried on with all the vigour imaginable, and we hope in few days to be in Possession of that Place. Several Deserters who are come over to us from the Garrison confirm the News of the Governor, and several other Officers, being killed, which will probably forward its Surrender. A Detachment of the Confederate Forces being lately sent towards Blies Cassel, to possess themselves of that Castle, for the greater Security of their Winter-Quarters on this side, the French Garrison abandoned the Place upon their approach. Three Regiments of Hussars arrived here yesterday from Landau, which, as is said, will be sent into Quarters towards Saarboiurg.

Berlin, Decemb. 13. On the 7th instant *Te Deum* was sung here for the taking of Landau. Monsieur Prebendow, who lately arrived here with the Character of Ambassador Extraordinary from the Crown and Republick of Poland, is going from hence to wait upon the King his Master at Dresden. Our last Letters from Poland, say, That the King of Sweden's Army continued in Quarters of Refreshment in the Greater Poland, but would shortly go into Winter-Quarters in the Polish Prussia.

Frankfort, Decemb. 14. The King of the Romans passed by Nuremberg the 10th instant in his way to Vienna. The Confederate Forces in these Parts continue their March into Winter-Quarters. General Thungen is appointed to Command the Forces which are to be employed this Winter to guard the Imperial Lines at Biehl and Stollhofen.

Cologne, Decemb. 16. The Elector Palatine returned the 12th instant to Dusseldorp. Count Zinzendorf the Emperor's Envoy is gone thither to wait upon his Electoral Highness, intending afterwards to proceed to Liege.

Hague, Dec. 19. N. S. His Grace the Duke of Marlborough intends to go for England next Week. The Mar-
shal de Tallard, and the other French Officers, that are to
be carried over thither, are expected the 22th instant at
Rotterdam from Aix-la-Chapelle, in order to their Em-
barking. The Marquis de Prie is lately arrived here
with the Character of Envoy from the Duke of Savoy,
and is very pressing with the States to send speedy Suc-
cours to the Duke his Master, which in all probability
will be complied with. General Dopff is returned hither
from Triers; from whence we have Advice, That the
Baron de Trogne, who acted as Chief Ingenier in the
Siege of Traerbach, was killed by a Musket-Ball as he
was visiting the Mines; whose loss is greatly lamented.
The Prince Royal of Prussia continues here; and it is
believed the King his Father will also shortly come hi-
ther, in order to the settling of several Matters, which re-
main hitherto undecided, in relation to the Succession
of his late Majesty of Great Britain.

Falmouth, Decemb. 9. On the 7th instant sailed the
Mansbridge Packet-Boat, with two Mails for Lisbon,
John Chenhall Commander; likewise two Doggers of Zu-
rickzee, bound for Cork; and the Sancta Catharina, of
and from Rotterdam, from Maderas. This day came in
the Endeavour of this Place, homeward bound from Rot-
terdam; the St. John of Rotterdam, bound for the Ma-
deras; and a Coasting Vessel from the Isle of Wight.

Plymouth, Decemb. 8. Yesterday sailed hence the Eagle-
Galley of London; John Smith Master, bound for the
Coast of Barbary. This day sailed the Duke of Marlbo-
rough; a Dutch Privateer, a Cruising; the Serdam of
Rotterdam, in Ballast, bound for Faoe; and the Sophia
la Weeza of Carelscroon for Lisbon. This day came in
from Spithead, Rear-Admiral Bing, with a Squadron of
Her Majesty's Ships under his Command; and a Dutch
Man of War from Rotterdam. As did also, Her Ma-
jesty's Ship, the Winchester, with two English Ships un-
der her Convoy, bound for Portugal; 3 Dutch for Dublin;
3 English laden with Hemp from Archangelo; for this Dock;
and two Dutch Ships with Pipe-Staves, from Rotterdam,
bound hither.

Comes, Decemb. 11. The 7th instant in the Afternoon,
the Dutch Man of War mentioned in our former Letters,
with the Ships under her Convoy, set Sail for the West-
ward. Yesterday came in the Ormond-Galley, Edmund
Holmes Master, bound for Plymouth; and the Providence,
William Newton Master, for Lisbon, both from London.
And this day came in the Flying-Horse, of 9 Guns,
William Thorp Commander; and the Dolphin, of ten
Guns, both Privateers belonging to Rye.

Portsmouth, Decemb. 12. A Fleet of outward-bound
Merchantmen came the 9th instant from the Downs to
Spithead, and sailed again yesterday, under Convoy of se-
veral of Her Majesty's Ships.
