

of his servants and part of his Baggage. The Baron de *Battaville* the Spanish Ambassador has desired leave to returne home, but has not yet obtained a Revocation, but several considerations have prevailed with the Court of *Spain* to continue him here for a longer time. His Highness the Prince of *Portugal* has had thoughts of dispatching some other person to *Madrid* with the Character only of his Envoye, and *Diego Gomez de Figueroa*, an old Colonel of the army has been proposed for that Employment, but as yet not fully resolved on.

The 16th instant arrived here *Diego Lopes Eliva*, who for some years past has been an Agent in *Holland* from this Crown, bringing with him the Treaty last concluded with the States of the *United Provinces*, containing amongst other things that *Cochin* and *Canonor* in the *East Indies*, shall remain to the States, so as not to administer for the future any farther dispute: that as to the four Millions due to the States, *Portugal* is obliged to deliver to them before the end of this present year 1669 as much Salt as shall be valued at One hundred and fifty thousand Crowns of *Portugal*, or Three hundred thousand *Livres*, the States being obliged to send their ships to transport it, and the rest of the Debt to be satisfied out of the Salt Customes, allowing One hundred and fifty thousand Crowns a year for Twenty years following, and that the *Hollanders* shall have liberty to send what ships they please to any part of *Brazile*, without any Licence either general or particular to be demanded for the same, provided they go and return with the *Portugal* Fleet.

About Six months since the French Ambassador gave in a Memorial to the Prince, pressing his Highness to grant the King his Masters Subjects the liberty of a free Trade into his Ports in the *East Indies*, to which of late an answer was returned him, That his Highness will write to his Viceroy of *India* to Treat the ships belonging to His most Christian Majesties Subjects with civility, and to let them have refreshments and other necessaries for their Money.

From *Cadix* we are advised, that Sir *Thomas Allen* with the Fleet under his Command, sailed thence on the 21 of *August*, where dividing his Fleet into three Squadrons, he ordered them to meet at their Rendezvous at *Alexante*, from whence he purposed to cross over to *Argier*.

Hambourg, *Octob 4*. Our Letters from *Warsaw*, bearing not a late Date, give us not any account of the King of *Polands* Coronation, or what passed at the solemnity or the ensuing great Assembly of the States of the Kingdom, but from the frontiers of the said Kingdom they write, that *Dorofensko*, General of one party of the *Cossacks* had given a great defeat to the *Tartars*, with some other *Cossacks* joyned with them between *Corson* and *Kiovia*, and had pursued them toward *Crim Tartary*, which way they endeavoured to make good their Retreat, having with them *Suchowitz*, who was said to be the General to the Rebel *Cossacks*.

From *Copenhagen* they write, that the Bishop of *Osna-brug* had made an overture or proposal of a Marriage between the young Prince, Son to the Prince Elector *Palatine*, of 18 years of age, and a Princess of *Denmark*.

They farther say, that the King of *Denmark* returned home to *Copenhagen* the 25th of the last Month, and had given Audience to the Heer *le Maier*, Resident from the States-General of the *United Provinces*.

From *Hanover* that the Heer de *Groot* the Dutch Ambassador having order from His Masters the States of the *United Provinces* on his return from *Sweden* to attend the Duke *Jean Frederick*, that the said Duke was there arrived to receive from him such proposals as he was commanded to make to him.

Let us of the 11. past from *Stockholme* informs us, that His Majesty the King of *Sweden* was inviyed by the continuance of the fair weather to pursue his recreations and huntings in the Country, but that several of the Senators were returned again to that City. And that His Excellency the Earl of *Carlisle* Ambassador

Extraordinary from His Majesty of great *Britaine* intended within 15 days to embark himself on his return home, but to take *Denmark* in his way.

They further say that upon the arrival of the General the Heer *Wrangle*, the Count de *Conning-mark* Chancellor of the Crown retired himself into the Country, and that as is said by Order.

From *Berlin* we are advised that his Electoral Highness of *Brandenbourg* is lately arrived there, and had given Order for four thousand men to march towards the *Rhine*, and that the great work in cutting a Channel for the Joyning of several Rivers within the Countreyes of the said Elector was near finished, insomuch as a passage was now opened for boats to pass between the *Oder* and the *Elbe*, which would much advantage the Trade and Commerce of those parts.

Kinsale *October 1*. Yesterday came in here the *Anno* and *Mary* of this place from the *Leeward Islands* with a considerable lading of *Tobacco*, *Sugar* and *Indigo*. And this day the *Ruby* of *Bristol* bound for *Bilboa*, and one other merchant ship of the same place intended for *Lisbonne*, and with them Entred a Spanish ship, which had lost her way in her returne from *Greenland*, homewards bound.

Deal, *Octob. 11*. This last night came in here the *Non-such* Ketch, which having endeavoured to make out a passage by the *North-West*, was in those seas environed with Ice, which opposing her progress, the men were forced to hale her on shoar and to provide against the ensuing cold of a long Winter; which endings, they returned with a considerable quantity of *Beaver*, which made them some recompence for their cold confinement.
