Venice, Dec. 6. N.S. Our Senate appears very much diffatisfied with the Imperialists possesfing themselves of Salo, and the French of Dezenzano, both Places situate on the Lake di Garda, and within the Territories of this Republick: They have fent Expresses to their Ministers at the Imperial Court, and that of France, with Orders to make their Complaint of this Proceeding; and a considerable Reinforcement has been sent to the Garison of Brescia, to secure it against any Attempt of this nature. General Davia, a very active and experienced Officer in the Imperial Army, died lately in the German Quarters, of a Wound he had received in a Rencounter between a Party under his Command, and one of French Horse. By a Felucca lately arrived from Cattaro, we have Advice of Proveditor-General Delfino's being arrived there the 12th of the last Month from the Morea, with 11 Gallies belonging to this State; and that General Du Hamel, who had the Chief Command of the Venetian Forces in those Paris, is lately dead.
