The whole Battalion of English Guards was got fate into Gibralrar, and with the rest that were arrived made above 1700 Mcn. His Highness adds, That upon the Arrival of this Reinforcement, he made a Salley the 23th with so good Success, that he destroyed the nearest of the Enemies Lines, which were within 160 Paces of the Pallifadoes, which would cost them more than 8 days time to repair, if they thought fit to go on with the Siege.
