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Twin, Decemb. 10. Our Advices from Verue give the following Account of the brave Defence made by the Garillon of that Place: On the 4th instant, both sides being busy in making Mines, our Miners net with those of the Enemy, and we had two Men wounded; however, we set fire to a Mine, which been up the Enemy's Gallery, and killed 17 of their Workmen. Dreiden, December 24. Yesterday several of Her Majesty's, Ships supposed to be the Squadron Commanded by Rear-Admiral Bing, appeared off of this Place, and with them a finall Ship which we believe to be a Prize.

Dartmouth, December 29. Yesterday came into this Port the Nicholas of London from Lisbon, Captain Robert Newman Commander; the Tuscan-Galley of London, Captain Pennel; the Norton-Galley, Captain Wall; the Blosson-Galley, Captain Williams; the Rumbo-Galley, Captain Hays; and the Flying-Fame of Amsterdam, Captain Symon Vandaras; all from Leghorn, from wherea they came the 18th of the 1.8 Leghorn, from whence they came the 28th of the laft Month, being all bound for London, except the Dutch-Ship, which is bound home.
