Hague, January 13. Letters from Paris give an Account, That a Courier arrived there the 3d infiant from Spain, with the News of the Arrival at Gibraltar of the Succours from Lisbon. The fame day came at Express from the Duke of Vendosme, with Advice, That on the 26th past, the Garison of Verue, being favoured by a thick Mist, made a great Salley; and having surprised the french, heat them from their Trenches, and from the rifing Ground of Guerbignan, where they had feveral Batteries, and nailed up most of their Cannon and Mortars. The Count de Maule-vrier was wounded and taken Prifoner, with fix other Officers of Note; and Monsieur d'immecourt, Mar-shalde Camp and Major-General, and a other Officers, were killed: At length, the Duke of Vendosme, having rallied his Men, obliged the Garison to retire, after an obstinate Dispute of about an hour and half, who left behind them 400 Men fliin, 100 taken Prifoners, and 20 Officers either killed or taken. This is the Account which the French themselves give of this Action, who are filent as to any further Particulars of the Lofs which they have fulfained; whereof we must expect a more fairnful Relation in our next Letters from Turin. Those from Geneva, which mention this great Salley, raking no notice of any such Lois on the side of the Duke of Savoy, who was present in this Action; but say, on the contrary, that the Advantage remained wholly on the side of his Royal Highness's Forces, who destroyed as much of the Enemy's Works as it would cost them at least 20 days to repair. All the Officers in the Service of the States General who are in Town, are ordered to repair forth-with to their respective Commands. Colonel Cronfrom, Adjutant General to Monfieur d'Auverquerque, is made Governor of Huy, in the room of the Baron de Trogne. They write from Namur, That the French have laid a Tax of 32000 Guilderstowards the Remounting of their Cavalry, and 12000 Guilders towards the Charges of the necessary Levies for Recruiting and Augmenting their Forces.
