

The Emperor has lately sent Order to Chemnitz, a Town upon the Mountains in Hungary, to oppose such of the Reformed Protestant Religion as are got together in an unlawful manner to possess themselves of some Churches made use of by the Roman Catholics, which they pretend were formerly unduly taken from them.

Bourges, Octob. 7. The 5th instant arrived here the Corps of the lately deceased Cardinal and Duke de Vendosme, which was carried on a Chariot covered with black Velvet, Embroidered with a Silver Cross and the said Cardinals Coat of Arms; before the Chariot rode two Almoners, one of them bearing his Cardinals Hat, the other his Cap, after it marched the Captain of his Guards at the head of his Troop, followed by all the Officers of the Cardinals Household and a great Train of Coaches, the Corps was disposed of in the body of the Church of St Stephens, with as much State as the little notice the Cannons had of his arrival could allow them.

Yesterday the several Orders of the Religious and other Ecclesiasticks, meeting at the said Church, conducted the Body to the Gate of the City, where it was received by the Abbot of Saint Sulpitius with the Religious, with many Torches, who attended the body out of the Suburbs, where it was received again by the Convey, who continued their intended journey towards Vendosme, the place designed for its Enterrment.

Paris, Octob. 22. The Letters by which the Duke de Navailles informed His Majesty of his arrival at Thoulon, gives him also advice, that the same day put into the same Port of Thoulon a Ship; the Master whereof had been long known to the Duke, who informed him, that the Town of Candia came to a Capitulation with the Turks the 2 of September, viz. Five days after the departure of the Auxiliary forces, and had agreed upon Articles of Surrender, affirming that he saw 20 Turkish Officers, all of them seemingly persons of good quality whom the Visier had sent as Hostages for the security of the Articles agreed on.

On Saturday last the King arrived at Versailles, and the next night came to St Germain; Some disputes have been about the manner of Treating the King of Poland, and whether the King should give him the Right hand he being an Elective King, but this was at last agreed in the Affirmative.

The States of Bretagne have upon the solicitation of the Duke de Chaulnes, granted to the King the summe of two Millions and two hundred thousand Liures.

Edenbourg, Octob. 9. This night arrived at the Earl of Tweeddale house at Telfer about 14 miles distant from this place his Grace the Earl of Lauderdale, His Majesties High Commissioner for the Parliament of Scotland, and on Monday in the Evening is expected here: he has through all his journey in all parts been honourably received and entertained, and particularly at Stamsford was met by the Lord Bishop of Durham, who obligingly invited him to make use of his Castle of Durham for his Lodging, and accordingly took Order for his entertainment, where the Lord Commissioner lodged one night; the Town of Newcastle made likewise Provision for his Graces entertainment, but he made no stop in that place. At Woodolton the Lord Widdrington with divers persons of quality attended his Grace and waited on him to the borders of Scotland, where he was met by divers of the Nobility and Gentry of Scotland, particularly by the Earl of Roxburgh at the head of a numerous Train of the Gentry of Teviotdale, and the Earl of Hume with another of the Merces, besides divers persons of the most considerable Quality from the Three Lothians the Western Shires, and divers other places of the Kingdom, where were also attending him in good Order the two Militia Troops and two Regiments of the Counties of Roxburgh and Selkirk: yesterday his Grace lodged at the Friars near Kelso, the body which attended him thither being computed to be above 2000 Horse, an universal joy appearing in all people upon his arrival.

Falmouth, Octob. 11. The 8th instant put to sea from this Harbor near 30 sail of Merchant Ships bound for several parts of France, with a fair wind.

Here are still in Port the African, the St Lucar Merchant, and several others bound for the Southwards, and may put to sea with the next opportunity of fair weather.

Plymouth, Octob. 12. Yesterday put in here by contrary winds the Peter of London bound for Cadix.
