Genoa, Jan. 10. N. S.

A War is begun between the Bey of Tunis and Tripoli, and there has happened an Engagement between the Armies on both sides, wherein the latter was entirely routed; who afterwards retired to Tripoli, whither the Tuniscens are marched in order to Besiege him. The Sieur Chamillart, a French Brigadier-General, Embark'd here the first instant, for Monaco, being ordered to Serve the next Campaign in Flanders. The Bodies of two French Officers of Note, who were killed in the Siege of Verue, have lately been brought hither, in order to their being carried to France.

Venice, Jan. 17. The Imperial and the French Armies continue in the Province of Brescia. A Detachment of the Imperialists has lately made an Excursion into the Duchy of Mantua, and brought home a great Booty; and it is said they expect very suddenly a considerable Reinforcement from the Country of Tirol; and as soon as it has joyned them, will march towards Mirandola, in order to raise the Blockade of that Place. The French Army in Piedmont under the Command of the Duke de Vendosme is much diminished, by reason of the great numbers of Men he has lost before Verue; and he daily meets with new Difficulties in the carrying on of that Siege.

Danzick, Jan. 20. The new Elected King, Stanislaus, is lately come to Elbing, and has sent hither to invite the Cardinal Primate to come to him; but it is said the Cardinal has excused himself. General Meyersfeldt is marching with a Body of Swedish Forces from Prussia towards Lithuania, to observe the Muscovite Troops in that Duchy. The King of Sweden continues in his Quarter at Rawitz. His Majesty had laid a Tax of 7 Crowns a Month upon every Chimney in the Palatines of Posen and Calisch, to continue during 6 Months; but he has been prevailed with to lessen it to 6 Crowns a Month on each Chimney to be paid by the wealthier Inhabitants, 5 Crowns by the poorer sort, and but 4 Crowns by those who have or shall acknowledge Stanislaus to be their King. The Swedes at Posen; and in all other Places which they are possessed of, oblige the Magistrates to pay to them the Monies arising by the Excise on Beer, and other Publick Revenues, towards the Subsistence of their Forces. They write from Memel, that 3000 Muscovite Horse, Commanded by a Saxon Officer, marched from thence the 10th instant, in order to Attack a Body of 2000 Swedes which lay at Schonbowen. The Muscovite General Czeremet is marched with the Forces under his Command with intent to make an Interruption into Courland.

Dresden, Jan. 23. The King of Poland returned hither yesterday from Leipsick, and has given Orders for the raising of 4 Regiments of Granadiers, which are to be sent into Poland, where his Majesty designs to have a greater number of his Saxon Forces the next Campaign than he had the last. Preparations are making in order to his return to Cracow, his Majesty intending to be there by the 5th of the next Month, being the time appointed for the Meeting which is to be held there of the Chief of that part of the Nobility of Poland which still perseveres in their Loyalty to him.

Vienna, Jan. 20. On the 18th instant *Te Deum* was Sung here for the Recovery of the Emperor's Health. The day following the Assembly of the States of the Lower Austria was opened here with the usual Solemnity, the Emperor being present. Count Buccellini, Chancellor of the Court, made a Speech to the States, to this effect: That it having pleased God to Bless the Arms of the Emperor and his Allies last Year with many and great Victories, which might still be rendred more Important, if a right Use was made of them, a

way being now opened to further Progresses; it ought to be their Care to contribute all that lay in their Power to so good an End, by their chearfully assisting his Imperial Majesty with the necessary Supplies. He enumerated to them the several Successes of the last Campaign, which were chiefly owing, (under GOD) to the powerful Armies Her Majesty the Queen of Great Brittain had sent from the Thames to the Danube, under the Conduct of the Prince and Duke of Marlborough; That by the Assistance of Her Majesty, and other Powers of Europe, the Towns of Landau, Ulm, Augsbourg, Memmingen, Kempfen, Amberg, Sta-temberg, the Fortrefs of Kuffstein, the greatest part of Bavaria, and the whole Upper Palatinate, had been reduced, Ratisbon freed, and the Enemy driven out of the Marquisate of Burgau; He mentioned the Advantages gained at Scheilenberg, and in Hungary; but above all, the unparalleled Victory obtained by the Courage and Conduct of the Prince and Duke of Marlborough, at Hochster, the like to which has never been known in the Memory of Man, nor is to be met with in the Annals of Europe. All which he told them could not but be a great Encouragement to them to comply with the Emperor's Demands, which were delivered to them in Writing. Then the Emperor made a short Speech, telling them the Reasons which had obliged him to Demand such large Supplies as were mentioned in the Paper delivered to them; and earnestly desired that they would take the same into their immediate Consideration, and be speedy in their Resolutions thereupon. Count Orto, the Land-Marshal, answered, in the Name of the States; That they would immediately consider thereof; and that though this Province has suffered very much in the present War, yet they would, to the utmost of their Power, comply with his Imperial Majesty's Desires, and second his sincere Intentions for the Publick Good, and the Tranquillity of Europe.

Hague, Feb. 3. N. S. The Yachts and Men of War which are to attend the Earl of Albemarle, Count Galah the Emperor's Envoy, and Sir David Mitchell, in their Passage, to England, have been obliged by the Frost to get into Helvoetsluys. The Prince Royal of Prussia intends also to go over to England. Our Advices from the Moselle say, That a Conspiracy had been discovered at Triers for the blowing up of the Magazines of that Place, just upon the point of its Execution, when the Matches were already laid for that treacherous purpose. The French Forces on that side continue in motion, notwithstanding the Rigour of the Season; but it does not yet appear with what design. They write from France; That on the 22d of the last Month the Duke of Vendosme had made an Assault upon one of the Bastions of Verue, and possessed himself of it, and that the Garison continued notwithstanding to make a resolute Defence; as did likewise that of Gibrairar, which had, since its being reinforced, made several vigorous Sallies.

Whitehaven, Jan. 21. On the 19th instant 6 laden Colliers sailed hence for Dublin; and yesterday the Catherine, Simon Ribron Master, and the Europe, Lowther Gale Master, set Sail for Virginia.

Plymouth, Jan. 22. Yesterday sailed hence the Great Rose-Tree, and the Charles the Third, both Privateers or Flushing, to Cruize. The same day arrived here the Elizabeth and Hannah of London, Robert Claffs Master, homeward-bound from Oporto.

Plymouth, Jan. 23. Yesterday came in here Her Majesty's Ships the Deptford and Rochester, from Cruizing. This day came in Her Majesty's Ship the Crown, which hath taken and brought in here a Dogger of 60 Tuns that was bound from Dunkirk to Nantz.
