Paris, Jan. 25. The Imperial Forces commanded by the Count de Lingenes have lately extended their Quarters in the Breche towards St. Anthony, Conchiglia, and Ponte di Meha, and take the necessary Dispositions for entering upon Action, as soon

as their Reinforcements are arrived from Germany. The Grand Prior, with the French Army under his Command, continues to observe their Motions; and has given Orders for the more closely Blocking up of the Imperial Garrison at Mirandola. They write from the Milanese, That the Town of Veruc does still make a vigorous Defence; and that the Duke of Vendosme, having lost a considerable number of Men in that Siege, has been obliged to drain the neighbouring Garrisons to reinforce his Army.

Dingle, Jan. 24. Last night the Hope Galley, of Bristol, Burthen 150 Tuns, arrived here from Leghorn, being laden with Wine, Oyl and Fruit, and homeward-bound.

Castle-Town, Jan. 24. This morning arrived here Her Majesty's Ship the Gosport, Captain Thomas Smith Commander, from New-England, but last from Lisbon; as also the Litchfield Prize, Captain Peter Chamberlayn Commander, from Newfoundland, but last from Lisbon.

Kingsale, Jan. 26. Yesterday arrived Her Majesty's Ships the Woolwich and Milford from Lisbon; on board which came Major-General Harvey, and several other Officers: On the 17th Instant, as they came out of the River of Lisbon, some Ships of Sir John Leake's Squadron were going in, and the rest were daily expected from Lagos-Bay. Under Convoy of the Woolwich and Milford came the Elizabeth and Katherine of London, James Heily Master, from Leghorn, laden with Wine, Fruit and Soap; the Anne and Lancelot of Ramsgate, James Taddy Master, with Wine, Oyl and Fruit, and the Vina Merchant of London, Burthen 150 Tuns, Richard Mogher Master, with Wine and Fruit, both bound home from Viana; the Marienbourg of Flushing, of 160 Tuns, Peter Jencho Master, from Genoua, with Oil and Fruit, homeward-bound; the Phoenix Galley of Topsham, William Spring Master, from Lisbon, laden with Fruit, Wine, and Oil, bound for Plymouth; the Mary Pink of London, Thomas Lewis Master, from Nevis, with Sugar; and the Speedwell Brigantine of London, Benjamin Smith Master, from Nevis, laden with Sugar; both homeward-bound.

Waterford, Jan. 27. On the 20th Instant in the evening came into this Harbour the Ruby, of Middleboing, a Dutch Privateer of 26 Guns, Peter Britt Commander, who brought in with him a French Prize called the Francis of Nants, of 140 Tuns and 10 Guns, laden with Sugar, Cotton and Indigo, from Martinico. The Greyhound of Antegoa, George Loreton Master, arrived here the 22d. from St. Thomas, laden with Sugar, Ginger, and Cocoa-Nuts, bound for London. Yesterday and this day came in here the John Galley of London, John Beaver Master, from Lisbon, laden with Fruit and Wine, homeward-bound; the Eagle of Zurickzee, Dingen Samill Master, in Ballast, bound for Waterford; the Margaret of Wexford, John Owens Master, from Milford, laden with Coals, and bound for Cork; the Shorcham Frigate, Captain Passenger Commander, from Milford; the Hare Galley, of Bristol, Edward Masculine Commander, from Zefalopia, laden with Currans, bound for Bistol; the Thotland Frigate of and from Zurickzee, Joab Peters Master, with a Cargo of Merchant Goods, bound for Waterford; the Peter of Liverpool, Benjamin Thompson Master, laden with Salt, and bound for Waterford; the Fleet Galley of London, Edward Fleet Commander, from Lisbon, with Lead and Allom, bound for Ross; and the Success of Youghall, Richard Draper Master, from Milford, laden with Gulm; and bound for Waterford.

Dublin, Jan. 28. A Proclamation, by his Grace the Duke of Ormond, our Lord Lieutenant, was published here yesterday, giving Notice to the Members of both Houses of the Parliament of this Kingdom, That whereas it was Prorogued to the 10th of next Month, his Grace has thought fit that it should then meet, and proceed upon Buiness.

Falmouth, Jan. 29. The Alliance Packet-Boat arrived here yesterday from Lisbon: On the 24th Instant she met with a French Privateer of about 30 Guns, and they exchanged a Broad-side; after which the Privateer sheered off: The Packet-Boat received but little Damage. The same day failed hence the Volant Galley, John Pitts Master, bound for Leghorn. This day came in the Alexander Galley, John Steward Master, laden with Currans from Zant, and bound for Rotterdam.

Plymouth, Jan. 30. Several of Her Majesty's Ships, with a Fleet of Merchant Men under their Convoy, that staid hence lately to the Eastward, were put back yesterday into this Port. The same day came in here the Hull Galley of Amsterdam, honeward-bound with Fruit from Lisbon; the St. Jacob of Copenhagen, laden with Wine from Bayonne; and the Five Sisters of Zurickzee, with Figs from Faro: Her Majesty's Ship the Medway, with a French Privateer she had taken, of 32 Guns and 350 Men; The French Captain was killed, as was also one Man on board the Medway: Her Majesty's Ships the Crown, Bedford Galley, and

wine and brandy, and one in Ballast. This day came in from Spithead Her Majesty's Ships the Hampshire and Layitoff, and under their Convoy 16 Sail of Merchant Ships, bound for the East-Indies: As also about 20 Sail of Merchant Men, bound for the Straights, Guinea, the West-Indies, and Virginia; and 30 Sail from London, bound hither, with Stores, Groceries, and other Goods; and about 12 Coasters, bound for Falmouth.

Cowes, Jan. 31. Yesterday was brought in here by the Dolphin Privateer, Captain James Garfield Commander, the Black Whale of Copenhagen, laden with Brandy and Salt from Rochell. The Liberry, a Dutch Caper, came in here yesterday, and put to Sea again this day.

Tarmouth, Febr. 2. On the 31st past about 60 Sail of laden Colliers passed by this Place to the Southward, with their Convoys. Yesterday failed hence Her Majesty's Ships the Solebay and Sorlings, with a Fleet of about 50 Sail of Merchant Men, laden with Corn, under their Convoy, bound for Holland.

Portsmouth, Febr. 1. Yesterday morning a Squadron of Her Majesty's Ships, commanded by Sir Thomas Dilkes, Rear-Admiral of the Red, failed from St. Hellens, having under their Convoy a Fleet of Merchant Men and other Vessels, bound for Ireland and Lisbon.

Deale, Febr. 3. Yesterday in the afternoon came into the Downes Her Majesty's Ship the Maidstone, which on the first Instant at night was attacked off Beachy-head by three French Privateers, viz. one of 28 Guns, another of 14, and the third but a small one, which sheered off in the beginning of the Fight; but the other two maintained a Dispute of near 3 hours; after which they went off to Sea, being much damaged: The Maidstone had her Main-top-Mast shot by the board, 3 Men killed, and 9 wounded.

The Dutch Mails of Tuesday and Friday last are not yet come in.

The Prince having ordered Her Majesty's Ships the Prince George, Kent, Essex, Eagle, Orford and Bedford, at Portsmouth, and the Dorsetshire, Suffolk, Berwick, Nassau, Torbay, Ramelagh and Grafton, at Chatham, to be fitted out to sea with all possible Dispatch, and forthwith paid; It is the Commands of his Royal Highness, That the Men belonging to them, which are absent from the said Ships, do forthwith repair aboard them, as they will answer the contrary at their Peril.
