ance of the Archdeaconnes and Rural Deanenes Act, 1874, and of the Acts mentioned therein, have pre-pared and now humbly tay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme which we have pre-pared with the consent of the Right Reverend Harry James, Bishop of Oxford, (in witness whereof he has signed and sealed the same) in respect of the Archdeaconries of Oxford and Berkshire, both in the diocese of Oxford, and of certain of the rural deaneries within such archdeaconries.

" SCHEME.

"As from the day on which any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme shall be published in the London Gazette and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order:-
