Raib, March 5. The Bassa of Waradin having cut off the heads of many of his Soldiery that had made incursions centrary to command, and fent information of the execution he had made to all our Governors of the Frontier Garrisons, to oblige them to a like severity.

To morrow they are to have a Conference with the Deputies of the States of Holland in the Council Chamber, to confult concerning the combination of the Courts of Justice, and to compele leveral differences risen between the two Pro-

Venice, March 10. Our Navy ( as we are informed by 2 Sayrnz Veilel that pait by our fhips ) did in three iquadrons put out from Pares, and fet fayl on their way for Candia, but to the great trouble both of Seamen and Soldiers were diverted by contrary windes, and forced to put in at Milo : Letters from Smyrna tell us, that the Turkish Empeter has commanded all Vessels of what Nation soever robe stopt, and an Imbargo set on them, having (as is supposed) a design to make use of them, with their Seamen, in his Warrs at Candia, where he resolves to use all endeaross to raile the fiege from Canes. We have news from Candia that 40 Turkish Galleys stole by night, out of the Dardanellocs, intended for the relief of that Island, but 14 of them sell into our hands, the others arrived with some men, whom they landed, but are in despaire of succouring Canes, which sievery Orgichals, hespead, but the Challetter Canes, which is very streightly besieged by the Christians, who hope in a short time to give a good account of the place, they being reduced to great wants: The Turks are preparing a great Flee: against the Spring, but it is thought will be diverted by the Perfian: to avoid the storm, the Turk has tent an Erwye to compose ( if possible ) all differences, the humour of the Ottoman Court at preient, being not at all inclined to Warrs.

The Pacquet boat between this place, Ferrara and Modens has lately been rob'd by several Banditi, which has so nrich incensed the Senate, that they offer pardon, and 1000 Ducats to any one of them that will come in and discover

Several Ottoman Gallyes have been at his accomplices. Candia with two hundred thousand Sultanins, for the pryment of their Army, but in their return, were half of them cast away by tempest. The Sultan has commanded his latendant of the Sea, to have his head taken off, for not putting out to Sea fo many thips as he was ordered to fit out.

From Sweden, the Sieur Isbrandts writes, that that Crown is exceedingly incented against Denmark for having thrown themselves into so st ict on Alliance with us, and slicks not to fay, they must and will maintain the freedom of the Baltick to all their Allies.

Holland calls to the other Provinces to come to the diffold of the principal charges in the Army this Campagne, but are foill fatisfied with the inclinations they perceive they bring with them to that work; that they have required them not to name in the States General, any of those they have already pitched upon in their respective Assemblies at home.

The Deputies in the Field begin to call out for more money, and yet we see no fruits of our expences hitherto.

The buliness of the Princes Advancement, is the great matter in debate now. But Holland se resees the danger of that Theme, and have therefore got it laid aside.

At Cleve, Beverning tells us, tle e appear lo many Mediators, that he knows not with whom he hath to do 5 and bath therefore defi ed he may have none to deal with but that E'ector, who itands obliged to his Mafters to end these delayes,

and m fall to action.

Dort, March 27. Among other the apprehensions that have of late le zed our Neighbors in the Mayorie of Bolledue, and Barony of Breda; they are strangely alarmen of late with the report of some English Forces deligned to pais that way to the affiftance of the Bithop; infomuch, that feveral principal Families of Gently, and others of best interest about Endhoven, and the adjacent parts, have most cereft about Endhoven, tainly employed a person of credit about the King of England, to obtain Protections from that King for them and their Estates, and dilowning any other part in this War, then what they have been necessificated into by the millaken Politicks of a Cabale, which now holds the Helm in that Government.

What fuccels it may have, we know not, but it is most certain, they think themselves not safe without some security of

this kinde against the English.
