Christopher All Perform

THE Chief of the Polish Nobility who continue Loyal to their King Augustus, met at Gracow the 5th inftant, in pursuance of their Madjournment. The next day they fate again, and a burrwas read to them from the King, acquainting then with the Reasons which had hindered his meetigher at that time, and obliged him to delay his moing for some time longer; whereupon their Assemhyrefolved to meet again three Weeks after the King's kenn; without prefixing any certain day; but that, in the mean time, their Marihal may have Power to all them together upon any fudden Emergency; there which they Adjourned. The Swedish Forces thich were at Lowitz, are marched to Kalisch, in other, as is believed, to advance further towards the Roders of Silelia. A considerable Train of Artillery, which has been taken out of the Arfenals of Munich, and other Towns of Bavaria, is gerting ready to be far into Italy, whither a confiderable Body of Men

is also to march from that Electorate to the Assistance of the Duke of Savoy.

The Recruits for compleating Francfort, Febr. 25. our Quota of Men towards carrying on the War the next Summer, are all raised; and the other Preparations for an early Campaign are carried on with all possible Application. The Confederate Forces in these Parts are all ordered to be in a readiness to march upon the first Notice they shall receive. A great number of Horses has lately been sent from hence towards the Moselle, to remount our Cavalry which is quartered on that side. All Dilligence is used in repairing the Fortifications of Landau, and in putting that Place

into a good posture of Defence.

Paris, Febr. 23. Our Advices from the Camp be-fore Verue of the 13th instant give an Account of Monsieur de Lapara's Arrival there; and that upon view of the several Attacks, and the Disposition of the Siege, he had judged it almost impossible to carry it on with any Success, unless the Communication were cut off between the Town and Crescentino; for which purpose, the Duke of Vendolme had, by his Advice, resolved to attack a Fort that covers the Bridge over the Po, and had railed a Battery of 12 Pieces of Cannon against it, to which 6 more were forthwith to be added. Letters from Madrid say, The Government there has lately been obliged to lay divers heavy Taxes and Duties, as well upon Lands and Houses, as upon Cat-tel and Trade, in order to support the vast Expences of the War, which occasions great Murmurings among the Spaniards, who have not been accustomed to Hardships of this Nature.

Falmouth, Febr. 24. On the 21st instant sailed hence the King William, and the Queen Anne, both Dutch Privateers, to Cruize. The next day a small Vessel sailed for St. Malo, having on Board about 90 French Prisoners, lately brought in here by the Dutch Privateers, who are to be Exchanged. Yesterday sailed hence to the Eastward, the Mack Van Dorr; and under her Convoy, 5 Prizes; taken by her and other Dutch Privateers, 4 Coasters, and the Lidia of London, homeward-bound from Oporto. This day were forced in here by contrary Winds 19 Sail of outward-bound Ships, which came from Middlebourg, most of them belonging to that Place.
