**T**HE Joseph and Thomas, a Transport-Ship. Thomas Rogers Commander, of about 300 Tons, 10 Guns, and 20 Men, came in here the 5th instant. On the 13th of the last Month, in her return hither from Gibraltar, she was separated by bad Weather from her Convoy: The day following, a Biscay Privateer of 22 Guns, and 160 Men, came up with her early in the morning, with whom she fought most part of the day, being within Pistol-shot of one another; The Privateer boarded her thrice during the Fight, but met with so brave a Resistance, that he was obliged at last to sheer off, and leave her, having lost a great many Men. The Transport-Ship is much disabled; and the Commander, with divers of his Men, were wounded; but, as it is hoped, none of them mortally.

*Vienna, Febr. 28.* On the 16th instant General Herberstein arrived here from Hungary, in order to take Possession of his new Employment, as Vice-President of the Council of War. The same day we received Advice from General Heister, That 5000 Male-contents were passed on this Side the Danube, over the Ice, a little below Raab, under the Command of Count Caoli, and were entred into the District of Rabau; since which time the River is thaw'd, so that they cannot return, nor General Heister send a Detachment in pursuit of them. He is come back with the Troops under his Command to his former Quarters about Pösting. The Emperor's Ministers continue their Conferences, to consult upon the Means of putting an end to those Troubles, by the way of an Accommodation. We hear that the Electors of Bavaria has left Munich, and is pass'd by Saltzboung, in order to have an interview with the Queen Dowager of Poland, her Mother, who is coming from Rome, with a design to meet her at Verona, or at Gratz.

*Copenhagen, March 7.* Orders were sent from hence the 3d instant for the Danish Forces which are now in Bavaria to march into Italy. The King intends to go from hence this Spring to visit his Country of Oldenbourg, where his Majesty has not been since his Succession to the Crown, and some other Parts of his Dominions. Monsieur Plessen arriv'd here the 6th instant from Hamboung.

*Berlin, March 8.* Monsieur Rosenhan, Ambassador from the King of Sweden, had on the 5th instant his Private Audiences of the King of Prussia and the Prince Royal his Son. Monsieur Iten left this Place yesterday, in order to his return to Hanover. The Great Marshal of this Court goes from hence to morrow, with a numerous Retinue of Officers and other Gentlemen, towards the Frontiers, to receive the late Queen's Body, and attend it thither. A very magnificent Mausoleum is preparing in the old Chapel in the Castle, where the Body is to be Deposited, until the Ceremony of its Interment is performed, which, as is said, will not be before September next. The Marquis de Pré, Envoy from the Duke of Savoy, is lately

arrived here from Holland. All Matters being fully adjust'd about the March of the Prussian Forces which are to be sent into Italy to his Royal Highness's Assistance, Orders have been given for those Forces which are to supply their Places to march from Prussia with all Expedition. Letters from Silesia say, That some Saxon Horse were drawing together near Plecz and Teschen, on the Frontiers of Moravia, in order, as is suppos'd, to serve as a Guard to the King of Poland in his return from Dresden to Cracow. The King of Sweden went lately from Rawitz towards Graudentz, but is return'd to his former Quarters. We hear that an Army of 50000 Muscovites is advancing towards Poland; and that the Diet at Rossien in Samogitia, and some other particular Diets of several Palatinates in Poland, have declared their Resolution to stand by their King Augustus.

*Hanover, March 10.* The late Queen of Prussia's Body was removed from hence yesterday, in order to be carried to Berlin; which was done with great Solemnity. The whole Convoy is conducted by our Elector's Great Marshal: When he comes to the Frontiers of the Duke of Cell's Country, he is to deliver it into the Care of the Great Marshal to that Duke, who will attend it through his Highness's Territories: And upon the Borders of the King of Prussia's Dominions, the Great Marshal, and other Officers of his Majesty's Court, are to receive and conduct it with great State to Berlin. The Princess Sophia has been indispos'd, but is at present much better.

*Hague, March 13. N. S.* The States of Holland and Westfriseland met again the 11th instant. The Men of War and Transport-Ships which are designed to be sent from hence with Forces and other Supplies to Portugal, will be ready to sail very speedily; whereof publick Notice has been given to the Merchants, that such as have any Ships bound thither may take the opportunity of sending them with this Convoy. All things continue very quiet on the Moselle, as well as upon our own Frontiers. We hear that Prince Lewis of Baden has appointed the Rendezvous of those Forces, of which the Imperial Army under his Command is to consist, to be at Necker-Ulm by the 10th of next Month. According to our Advices from France, both Gibraltar and Verue still made a vigorous Defence. Some Letters from Paris add, That there was a new Insurrection in the Province of Languedoc, which had oblig'd the French Court to send a considerable Body of Forces that way; and that the Marshal de Montreuil was order'd to repair thither with all possible Diligence.

*Bristol, Febr. 28.* Last night arriv'd here the Antelope of this Place, William Hellier-Commander, in 8 Weeks from Jamaica, who left that Island very healthy.

*Falmouth, March 1.* The 27th past came into this Port, the Crispin-Galley, Ezekiel Nichols Master, in 5 Weeks from Leghorae, laden with Oranges and Lemons. The same day came in the Mary of this Place, John Row Master, laden also with Oranges and Lemons from Lisbon.

**Dartmouth, March 2.** On the first instant came into this Harbour the Hunter Privateer of Guernsey, Captain Richard Robinson Commander; who, on the 25th past, sent in here a Dogger laden with Wine from Bourdeaux: The same Privateer hath since taken another Dogger laden with Wine from Bourdeaux, and hath sent her to Guernsey.

**Plimouth, March 4.** On the 2d instant came into this Port, the Marlborough, William Mills Master, with a Prize laden with Wine from Bayonne. The same day came in here from London, the Radnor, Morgan Williams Master, and the Sarah and Dorithy, John King Master. Yesterday came in from the Eastward several of Her Majesty's Ships, and brought in with them, upon Suspicion, the Anna, Jacob Mifour Master, the Hope, John Folk Master, both of Stockholm; and the Charity of Copenhagen, Victor Randeport Master, all laden with Wine and Brandy, from Bourdeaux.

**Westminster, March 7.** Her Majesty hath been graciously pleased, by Writ, to Call to the House of Lords, the Rt. Hon. James Lord Dursley, Eldest Son of the Rt. Hon. Charles Earl of Berkeley; who was this day accordingly introduced and Seated on the Baron's Bench in the usual manner.
