May the Almighty God, by whom Kings Reign, make Your Majesty his Instrument of accomplishing the great Work, in which You have made so happy a Progress; May Your Enemies be soon oblig'd to submit to such a Peace, as may be for the Glory of God, the Honour of Your Majesty, and the Security of the Protestant Religion and the Liberties of Europe; And may You long enjoy that Blessing here, and be Crown'd with everlasting Glory hereafter.

Which Address Her Majesty received very Graciously.

Plymouth, March 8.
