Venice, March 14. N. S.

HE Electress of Bavaria arrived here the 6th in-frant from Munich. The Senate sent one of the Procurators of St. Mark to Compliment her, but the defired to be excused, intending to be here Incognito. The 10th she went from hence to Padua, to meet the Queen-Dowager of Poland, her Mother, who is coming hither from Rome; And it is believed they will continue here some time. We have an Account from Brescia, That the Sieur de Lautrec, a General Officer in the French Service, died lately of the Wounds he received in an Engagement which happened about a Month ago, between a Party which he Commanded, and another of the German Forces. A Detachment of 2000 Imperialists is come into the Valley of Polifella, and the Grand Prior has posted part of his Forces on that fide to observe them . He larely sent a Detachment of 200 Men to feize a certain Post on the Lake di Garda, in order to hinder the Germans from pilling by Water between Riva and Torbole; but 300 of the latter being joined by 100 Pealants, repulfed the Enemy with Lois. Letters from Confiantinople give an Account, That Signior Justiniani, who relides there on the part of this Republick, had Audience of the new Great Visier Mahomet Bashaw on the 11th of the last Month, and was very favourably received; and that the Porte does not feem in the least disposed to break the Treaty of Carlowicz, and Engage it felf in a new War. Since the Deposing and Banishment of the last Great Vider Calicos, the Age of the Janisanes, the Stambole Effendi, and several other Officers, who had been foromored by him, have also been removed from their Employments. These frequent Changes in their Governmen and Ministry have occanioned from bivitions among the Turks, as will probabilizations when the control of the c bly employ them so much at home, that they will be the less at leisure to give any Disturbance to their Neighbours.

Vienna, March 14. On the 12th instant the King of the Romans went on the other side of the Danube to Regiment of Dragoons of Tollet, consisting of 800 Men, who immediately embarked on the River, and sell down to Presbourg. We shortly expect the Regiment of Foot of Salm, and a Regiment of Dragoons lately raised in Ravaria by General Festz, which are likewise to march the same way. Letters from Presbourg of the 12th give an Account, That General Heister having marched along the Waag as fat as Newsstadtel and Trenschin, was returning towards the Island of Schut. Part of the Garison of Presbourg is employed in making a Bridge for him to passover the Danube near Pictdorf. A Party of 2, or 100 Hungarians having lately appeared near Risensial, one of 200 Dragoons of the Regiment of Barcith, gave them Chaie, and pursued them into a Wood, where Count Caroli lay in Ambush with 2000 Matecontents more, who sell upon the Imperialists, and pursued them as far as St. Margarita; where a Party trom Oedemburg coming to their Assistance, they repulsed the Malecontents, and retired to that Garison.

Dresdon: March 17. The King of Poland's Department Cracow begins to be discoursed of as Court, though without any certainty as to the time. There are frequent Consultations held between his Ministers upon the present Juncture of Affairs; and more particularly the putting of this Electorate into a Posture of Deseace if the Swedes should attack it, which Fear, however, begins to be pritty well over. They write from Poland, That the Starost Spielski, who had of-

fered to fubmit to the King, upon Promise of a Pardon, has again changed lides, and is gone over to the Swedes with 600 of his Followers.

Berlin, March 21. Great Preparations are making here for the melancholly Ceremony of the Reception of the Iare Queen's Body, which is expected to morrow night; the Mansleum wherein it is to be deposited is ready, and makes a very magnificent Shew, being full of fine Statues, and illuminated with near 2000 Candles. The King returned hither the 19th from Schonhausen. The Gentleman whom the Maraquis de Prie, Ambistador from Savoy, has dispatched to Turin, left this Place the 17th, and the next day passed through Dessay, and Complimented the Prince of Anhalt in his Excellency's Name. The Prince has returned the Compliment by his Secretary, who has assured the Marquis, That his Master will use all possible Dilligence in the March of the Prussian Troops towards Italy; that he designs to go Post from Anhalt the 23d, in order to put himself at the head of those Troops, and hopes to be in four days on the Frontiers of Tirol. We are told for certain, That those Forces began their March the 20th instant, if not sooner; and, it is said; That General Stille, who Commands them in the Absence of the Prince of Anhalt, has incurred the Displeasure of this Court for having deferred their March longer than the 15th, contrary to the positive Orders which had been sent him from hence. Letters from Dresden say, That the K. of Poland is still there, and has not yet fixt the time of his Departure for Cracow. The Saxon Forces which were near that City have made a Motion, as if they were to March towards Lithania to join the Muscovites.

Hugue, Merch 27 N 5 The States General having found it inconvenient to delay any longer the Nomination of the General Officers who are to Command their Forces the next Campaign, came the 25th instant to a final Resolution in that Point. They have appointed Monsieur d'Auverquerque to have the Chief Command of their Army near the Masse, and the Generals Slangenbourg, Salish and Tilly, to serve under him. The Count de Noyelles and General Dopff are to Command on the Moselle. A Conspiracy has been discovered at Hulls for the Betraying of that Place to the French, and three of the Persons who were concerned in it are seized. This day we received Advice, That the Duke of Vendosme having made Preparations for Attacking the Camp at Crescentino, the Duke of Savoy, not being able to defend it, retired towards Chivas. The Advices from France say, That Monsseur Pointi, with the French Squadron under his Command, was still before Gibraltar, but give no Account of any Progress they have made in that Siege.

Kinjale, March 6. A Squadron of Her Majelty's Ships Commanded by Sir George Byng, Vice-Admiral of the Blue, came in here this day, and blought with them as Prizes, 3 French Merchant-Ships homeward bound from the Weft-Indies, viz. The Elephant of Rochel, of too Tuns and 18 Guns, laden with Sugar, rasken by ther Majelty's Ship the Medway, the Glutton of Rochfore, of too Tuns and 8 Guns, laden allo with Sugar, raken by the Hepping 1, and the John and James, of too Tuns, laden with Sugar, and Ginger, taken by the Rochiefter. Her Majelty's Shiptile 1 ketter, one of the faid Squadron, allo took a Brench Majelty War that was their Convoy, named the Theth of Electron, of my Gluss, and 244 Men, after an oblinete of Fight of 6 hours, wherein the Enemy, had 31 Men killed and woulded, and 14 Men were killed and 31 wounded on Board the Exeter.
