

approval of the Minister of Housing and Local Government, should be prohibited, and that burials should be discontinued therein as follows, viz:—

Woodditton.—Forthwith and entirely in the Old Churchyard of the Church of St. Mary the Virgin, Woodditton, in the said Parish, coloured green on the plan annexed hereto.

Provided that—

In the said Old Churchyard, in two grave spaces in which no interment has heretofore taken place, the burial may be allowed at their decease of the bodies of Sidney Taylor and Arthur Stanley Hensby for which such grave spaces have been reserved and appropriated as burial places, with exclusive rights of burial therein, subject however to the condition that no

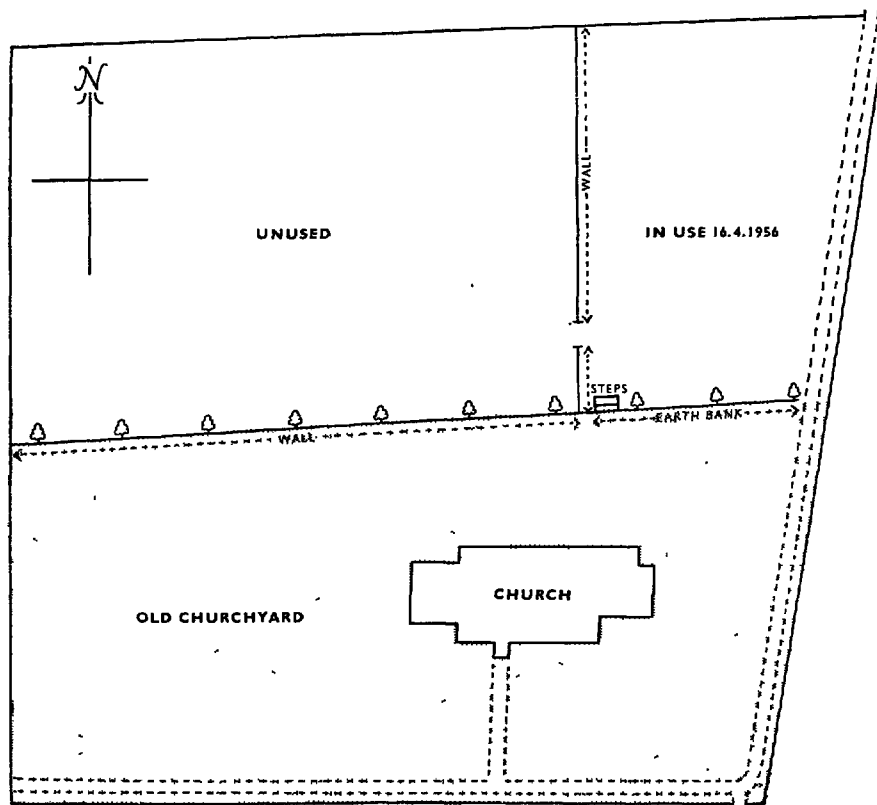
part of the coffins containing the bodies shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the graves.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give Notice of such Representation and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council on the 8th day of July next.

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette, and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the Churches or Chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within the Parish affected by such Representation one month before the said 8th day of July.

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Church Commissioners have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the 25th day of April, 1957, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

“We, the Church Commissioners, in pursuance of the Church Patronage Act, 1870, and of the Acts therein mentioned, have prepared the following Scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of an interest hereinafter mentioned in the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the churches and cure (hereinafter called ‘the said benefice’) of Corringham with Springthorpe in the County and diocese of Lincoln.

“SCHEME.

“Whereas we are satisfied that the patronage of the said benefice is exercised in a series of three successive turns of presentation of which the Reverend Frank Callis Bott of 18, Johnson Mansions, Queen's Club Gardens, West Kensington in the County of London, Clerk, and Frederick Percy Hewetson Birtwhistle of Priestgate, Barton-on-Humber in the County of Lincoln, Medical Practitioner, as the surviving personal representatives of the late Reverend George Crowle Uppleby are entitled to two turns.

“And whereas the said Reverend Frank Callis Bott and the said Frederick Percy Hewetson Birtwhistle desire to transfer their said interest in the advowson of the said benefice to the Bishop of Lincoln for the time being and are consenting to this Scheme (in testimony whereof they have executed the same):

“And whereas we are satisfied that the transfer will tend to make better provision for the cure of souls:

“Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Kenneth, Bishop of Lincoln (in testimony whereof he has executed this Scheme), we, the said Church Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the said interest of the said Reverend Frank Callis Bott and the said Frederick Percy Hewetson Birtwhistle in the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice shall be transferred to the said Kenneth, Bishop of Lincoln, and his successors in the same Bishopric, and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the Bishop of Lincoln for the time being.”

And Whereas the said Scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council:
