St. James's, March 24. The following Address from the House of Peers of Ireland having been transmitted hither by his Grace the Duke of Ormond, Lord Lieutenant of that Kingdom, was presented to Her Majesty by the Right Honourable Mr. Secretary Hedges.

The humble Address of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, in Parliament Assembled.

WE Your Majesty's most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects, the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, in Parliament Assembled, do return our humble Thanks to Your Majesty for Your most Gracious Answer to our late Address; in which You are pleased to express so particular and tender a Care and Concern, for the Happiness and Prosperity of this Kingdom: And we Beseech Almighty God to increase the Glory of Your Reign, and to give us fresh Occasions every Year of shewing our Loyalty and Duty to Your Majesty, and Adoring the Divine Goodness to You and Your People.

The Address of the House of Commons of Ireland, inserted in the Gazette of Thursday the 15th instant, being likewise transmitted by his Grace the Lord Lieutenant, was also presented by the Rt. Hon. Mr. Secretary Hedges.

Both which Addresses Her Majesty received very graciously.

St. James's, March 14. N. S. The French, since their taking of the Fort which covered the Communication of Verne, have plied that Place very warmly with their Cannon, and made large Breaches; but the Garrison having undermined all their Works, the Enemy have not yet thought fit to venture upon a general Assault; And it is believed they will rather endeavour to reduce the Place by Famine. The Imperial and French Armies in the Brescian continue to observe each other: The former are in Expectation of considerable Reinforcements from Germany, whose Arrival will make a great Alteration in the Posture of Affairs in these Parts.

Warsaw, March 13. Our Suburbs suffer very much from the Parties of the Confederated and other Troops, which frequently take Quarters there, and do all demand Contributions; and this City it self has often been under Apprehension of being plundered by them. They write from Lithuania, That 6000 Muscovites have taken Quarters in Wilna, who are to be joyned by greater Numbers, and that a Body of 12000 Swedes is marching that way to attack them.

Ramitz, March 14. The King of Sweden continues here, and the new Elected King has his Quarters at Reuffen. General Horn arrived here this Week from Dresden, where he has been detained as Prisoner at War; and an Agreement is concluded between the Kings of Sweden and Poland for a further Exchange of Prisoners on both sides. The Prince of Lubomirski came hither the 11th instant to wait upon the King of Sweden; The Starost Spielski, of the same Family, is also come hither with many of his Followers, whom his Majesty has taken into his Service: He was favourably received, and is since gone to Reuffen to wait upon the new Elected King. We hear that an Action has lately happened at Lowitz, between a Party of Swedes, and one of the Poles who continue faithful to their King Augustus, wherein the latter were worsted.

Cracow, March 17. The Officers and Servants of the King of Poland, who lay at Wisnietz, are removed to Tarnaw, a Place belonging to the Princess Lubomirsky, about 12 Miles from hence. The Saxon Forces which were quartered in these Parts, are Commanded, as is said, to march to Lithuania, in order to joyn the Muscovites.

Francfort, March 22. Preparations are making here with all Dilligence against the next Campaign, and Directions are given for the preparing of a great number of Pontoons, of a new Invention, which will be more convenient and lighter of Carriage than any which have heretofore been made use of. The Palatine Forces that are designed for Italy will be marching thither very suddenly; and the rest of that Elector's Troops, which are quartered on this side, are to march towards Weiffembourg. The Forces of Swabia and Franconia are to Rendezvous near Durmuntz, and will likewise leave their Quarters very soon: They are afterwards to be posted in the Lines of Biehl and Stollhoffen. The Fortifications of Landau are now repaired, and the Place put into a good Posture of Defence. The Forces of the Elector of Mentz have Orders to be in a readiness to take the Field. General Dopff passed by Hanau the 19th instant, in his way to Aschaffembourg, whither he is going to confer with Prince Lewis of Baden. It is said his Highness intends to be the 3d of the next Month at Rhinfeld, where a Body of Troops is to draw together by that time.

Falmouth, March 19. The Alliance Packet-Boat, Captain Green Commander, failed hence yesterday for Lisbon. The same day came in here the Four Brothers of Flushing, Erasmus Muller Master, laden with Oil and

and Fruit from Leghorn. This Ship about 14 days ago took a French Flyboat, with 600 Hogheads of Sugar on Board, which came from St. Domingo, but was afterwards separated from her in bad Weather. This day came in Her Majesty's Ship the Scaford, Captain Saunders Commander, from Dublin; and with her the Thomas, James Thomas Master, belonging to that Port, laden with Hides and Butter. The Christian-Mary is also arrived here from Norway, being laden with Timber for this Place.

Diale, March 23. Her Majesty's Ship the Maidstone came into the Downes this morning, and brought in as Prize a French Privateer, which she had taken off of Beachy-Head.

St. James's, March 21. This day Count Zefferini, Envoy Extraordinary from the Great Duke of Tuscany, had a publick Audience of Her Majesty, and afterwards of His Royal Highness, by whom he was graciously received, having been conducted in the usual Manner to both these Audiences, by Sir Charles Cottrill Master of the Ceremonies.

The Dutch Mails of Tuesday and Friday last are not yet come in.
