land was overflown, and that in the City of Am lerdan on Sunday Talk it so much threatned the most principal Digue, that the Magistrates were constrained to employ above 600. Pigneers for the fortifying thereof. which ( had it failed ) would have brought most part of that Country under water.

The Smirna Convoy is fafely arrived at the Texel under the-Convoy of the Captains de Haen and Binks, but leveral thips which lay ready fraught for the Streights have been cast away by the violence of the ill weather, and amongst-others one ship of 36 Guns, laden to the value of 300 thouland livres: also one Hambourgher and one Swedish ship lost by the same ill weather.

Bruffels; Offob. 25. On Munday last arrived here the Duke a Ærfehos to adjourt some d fficulties in the affairs concerning the Province of Haynault, whole D. puties have agreed to the payment of the Militia among them, but demute upon the first payment till first some Order be raken for the Reformation of the forces which has been hitherto deferred by reason of the indisposition of the Prince

The French are again drawing together a force between Bousy and To irnay, more powerful then the former, with a Train of Artillery, pretending only to Convoy Coals to Atth, some Companies being marched out of France for this service, so that in Horse and Foot, their number will

amount to near 14 thousand men. The Cheadel at Tournay is so far a lyanced, that on Sa-

turday last they planted on it 70 pieces of Canon, and have hung on their Gates, so that it is now become very de-

The 27th instant an end will be put to the long and hitherro ineffectual Treaty or Conference at Lille, after which, the French give out, that they will not hearken to any farther Proposals till first the Sluices of Neupors, the Town of Conde and the other parts to which they pretend, be given into their hands.

The French are every where raising forces, and the Prince of Gonde's Drums beating in the French parts of Burgundy, having an Eye upon the iffue of the troubles about Belançon where the people have forced the Spanish Garrison into. the Cittadel; but the Prince D' Aremberg is endeavouring to reduce them to obedience, between whole forces and the Countrey people have happened several little skirmisses, in which some men have been killed on each side.

As yet no end is put to the disputes between our Com-

missioners and these of Liege about the Imposts.

On Monday last the Grand Provest of that Chapter meeting with our Commissioners, the Chancellour communicated to him the Moderation that was ordered to be used on our pare, but then told him it was expected that those of Liege should take off their Tariff, with which the Provoit peplyed, that this was not agreeable to the promise made to him, and that it was time for him to retirn home, fince he had spent so much time to so little purpose, since they required a thing which he could not have the considerace to propose to those that employed hints but this notwithstanding, its not believed this affair will end thus, but that some expedient will be Yound out to dismis him with satisfaction.

Part, Off, 30. His Majelty seems to be displeased It the return of the Duke de Navailles from Candia, as being contrary to his Orders, and the promises his Majesty made to the Pope and the Republick of Venice, by whose desertion the Venetian General found himselfe disabled to continue longer the defence of the place, and therefore elosed with the Turks for the most advantageous Articles he could obtain from them.

His Majesty in testimony of this diffatisfaction, has been pleased to send one of his sootmen with a Letter to the said Dake de Navailles, commanding him to repair to his estate at Noors, and not to see the Court till farther order,

The Mareshal de Bellefonds being by this Surrender diverted from his Expedicion designed for the Levants intends suddenly for Rochelle to give a Visit to Madam de Chamber. Six Pregars are equipping with all alligence in that Port, intended (as was given our) for Algiers, but tis believed may be rather sent for the West-Indies, upon some design projected by the Count D'Estree.

Madam de schomberg, who has been long indisposed at Rechelle, and by it pur a stop to the Count her Husbands Voyage for Liebonne, is now happily recovered from her

distemper.

. I The disturbances at Bulançon in Franche Comse, are happily ended, the Prince D'Aremberg having thought fit to pais an Act of Oblivion, excepting only some few persons said to be the Ring-leaders in the late Tumuk, whom he intends to make exemplary, alloon as they can be apprehended, who fearing the danger and confequence of the

Treaty, timely withdrew themselves.

The Turkish Minister continues at Fountainblem, diverting himself with Hunting. The Court not being yet affured of his Charactet, Monfieut De Lionne may in few dayes conferr with the Turkill Interpreter, to re-cei/e light from his Commission, that accordingly care may be taken to give him a proportionable and fuitable En-

The King has ordered the fum of 600 thouland 11vres to be provided for the rebuilding of the lately ruined Fortification of the Chafteau Trompette at Bourdeaux.

All the Deputies from the Electors of the Empire are affembled at Heidlebourg, to confider of the par they are to take in relation to the Triple-Alliance where is also present the Count William of Furstem, bourg, who endeavers to promote the interest of this Crown: But is infinitely displeased at several papers which have been leastered up and down to his defa-

mation, charging him with defignes against his own Country and ingratitude to the Empire.

As yet it is not resolved whither the Circle of Eurgundy shall be included with the rest of the Circle. cles of Germany, to bear them proportion in rayling 30 Thousand Men for the Safety and Security of the Empire.
