A PROCLAMATION,

For the due Observance of an Act made in the last Session of Parliament, Intituled, *An Act to Prevent all Traiterous Correspondence with Her Majesties Enemies.*

W Hereas by an Act made in the last Session of Parliament, Intituled, *An Act to Prevent all Traiterous Correspondence with Her Majesties Enemies, It is Enacted, That if at any time after the five and twentieth Day of March, One thousand seven hundred and five, any Person or Persons shall, during the Continuance of the present War with France, Spain, or Loud, or Transport, or Deliver, or cause to be Sent, or Laden, or Transported, or Delivered unto, or for the Use of the French King, or any of his Subjects, residing within his Dominions, or any Town or Territory in his Possession, or into, or for any Port or Place within his Dominions, any Arms, Ordnance, Powder, Bullets, Pitch, Tar, Hemp, Malt, Cordage, Iron, or Salt-Petre, or any Person or Persons, so as aforesaid offending, and bring thereof Convicted or Adjudged by due Course of Law, shall be Deemed, Declared, and Adjudged to be a Traitor or Traitors, and suffer the Pains of Death, and also Lose and Forfeit as in Cases of High-Treason. And also, That if any of Our Subjects, who have at any time since the fourth Day of May, in the first Year of Our Kings, voluntarily gone into France, or any of the French Kings Dominions in Europe, without Licence from Us, or who have at any time since the said fourth Day of May, in the first Year of Our Reign, born Arms in the Service of the French King, either by Sea or Land, shall at any time after the said five and twentieth Day of March, One thousand seven hundred and five, Return into this Our Kingdom of England, or any other Our Dominions, without Licence from Us under Our Privy-Seal, every Person so offending, and being thereof Lawfully Convicted or Attainted, shall be Taken, Deemed, and Adjudged to be Guilty of High-Treason, and shall suffer the Penalties as in Case of High-Treason. And further, That if any Person who, since the said fourth Day of May, in the first Year of Our Reign, went into France, or any of the French Kings Dominions, without Licence from Us, or hath been in Arms under the French King, either by Sea or Land, hath returned into this Realm without Licence from Us, every such Person shall Depart this Realm before the first Day of May, One thousand seven hundred and five, unless such Person shall, before the said first Day of May, obtain Our Licence under Our Privy-Seal for staying here; And that in case such Person shall not Depart this Realm on or before the said first Day of May, or shall after such Departure Return into this Realm, without Our Licence, as aforesaid, every such Person so offending, being thereof Lawfully Convicted, shall be Taken, Deemed, and Adjudged to be Guilty of High-Treason, and shall suffer Penalties as in Case of High-Treason. And further, That if any of Our Subjects shall, from and after the said five and twentieth Day of March, One thousand seven hundred and five, during the Continuance of this present War with France, without Licence from Us, voluntarily Go, or Repair, or Embark in any Vessel, with an Intent to go into France, or any Dominions of the French King, and be thereof Convicted or Attainted by due Course of Law, every such Person shall be Taken, Deemed, and Adjudged to be Guilty of High-Treason, and shall suffer as in Case of High-Treason: We therefore taking the same into Our serious Consideration, to the end no Person may pretend Ignorance of the said Law, and the Penalties, by Virtue thereof, to be inflicted on such as shall offend therein, have thought fit, by the Advice of Our Privy-Council, to Issue this Our Royal Proclamation, to Notice and Declare to all Our Loving Subjects the Purport and Tenor of the said Act, hereby Prohibiting them, and every of them, to do any thing therein, as they tender Our Royal Displeasure, and would avoid the severe Penalties, by Virtue of the said Act, to be inflicted on such as shall be found guilty of any Breach thereof.*

Given at Our Court at St. James's the Nine and twentieth Day of March, 1705. In the Fourth Year of Our Reign.

GOD Save the QUEEN.

Triers, March 27. We have begun to cast up a new Line for the better Security of this City, and of the great Magazines that are erecting here. The Confederate Forces in these Parts are ordered to be in a readiness to take the Field upon the first Notice they shall receive. The Marshal de Villars is come back from the French Court to Metz, and has given Orders for all the French Horse between Maubeuge and Verdun to be ready for a general Review to be made about the 5th Instant. The Enemy have sent several Boats laden with Ammunition from Metz to Thionville, which were sent forward by Land to Luxembourg: They pretend to open the Campaign very soon. All possible Care is taken on our side not to be behind hand in our Preparations.

Frankfort, March 29. The Diet of the Circle of Franconia has given Orders for hastening the recruiting of their Forces, which are to consist of 3 old Regiments of Foot, 1 of Cuirassiers and 1 of Horse; and will (it's hoped) be in a readiness to take the Field in a few days: They have also increased their Artillery, and have begun to erect a Magazine of Provisions and Ammunition at Philipbourg for the use of their Forces. The Troops of Lunenburg, which have wintered in the Diocese of Fulda, have lately taken Quarters in the Neighbourhood of this City, and will shortly march towards the Moselle. Those of the Circle of the Upper Rhine are now posted between Croon-Weissemburg and Lauterbourg.

Cologne, March 31. The Diet of the Circle of Westphalia, which was assembled here, broke up yesterday, having taken several Resolutions for the speedy furnishing the Quota of this Circle towards carrying on the War; for which they had Thanks returned them by the Sieur Van Dieft, in the Name of the King of Prussia his Master, Director of the Circle; and the Baron of Mergerfen, Deputy of Paderborn, answered, in the Name of himself and all the other Deputies, That the several Princes and States of the Circle, by whom they were deputed, would certainly make good these Resolutions, and bring their Forces early into the Field. The Count de Nassau Weilbourg passed through this Place two days ago, in his way to Dusseldorp. Several Boats laden with Ammunition and Provisions have lately been sent from hence towards Triers, to furnish the Magazines there.

Falmouth, March 31. Yesterday the Queen Mary and the Wolfembourg, two Dutch Privateers, sent in here as Prizes the Santa Barbara of and from Bayon, and the Santa Cruz from St. John de Luz, both laden with Salt, which were bound to Placentia. Her Majesty's Ships the Southampton and Lizard sailed by this Port the next day to the Eastward, being come from Milford, and having under their Convoy a Fleet of about 100 Sail, some of them homeward-bound Ships from the West-Indies, the rest from Bristol, Swanzy, and other Ports; 15 of the latter, laden with Coals, came in here. Yesterday the Gentleman and Wolpenburgh, two other Privateers belonging to Flushing, came into this Port from cruising, and brought in with them as Prize the Providence of Nants, laden with Sugar from St. Domingo.

Dartmouth, March 29. Yesterday arrived here several Vessels belonging to this Port, laden with Coals and Salt from Wales: They came under Convoy of Her Majesty's

Majesty's Ships the Southampton and Lizard, in company of divers other Merchant-ships, seven of them being homeward-bound from the West-Indies, which are sailed for the Downes.

Hull, April 2. On the 3rd past, in the evening, arrived here Her Majesty's Ships the Pendennis and Rochester Prize, and under their Convoy about 10 or 12 Sail of Merchant-men from Rotterdam.

Coms, April 2. Yesterday came in here the Neptune, a Privateer of Flushing, Cornelius Garrets Commander, with a Prize, which he has taken in his Cruise: The Captain of the Privateer gives an Account, That he sailed from Lisbon the 18th of March, N.S. and says, That two days before Sir John Leake, with the Fleet under his Command, sailed for Gibraltar: And he further reports, That an Express was come in from thence by the way of Lagos, which brought Advice, That the Cannon of the Garison had done much Damage to the French Fleet that lay in that Bay, and had sunk 3 or 4 of their Ships.

Yarmouth, April 2. On the 3rd past Her Majesty's Ship the Kinfales, with about 100 Sail of laden Colliers under Her Convoy, passed through our Roads to the Southward.

Kensington, April 3. This day Signior Mocenigo, Ambassador Extraordinary from the Republick of Venice, had a Private Audience of Leave of Her Majesty, who was pleased to confer the Honour of Knighthood upon him, as has been practised by Her Majesty's Royal Predecessors to the Ambassadors of that State; and to make him a Present of a rich Sword, with which She had knighted him: His Excellency had afterwards a Private Audience of Leave of his Royal Highness: To both which Audiences he was conducted by Sir Charles Cottrell Master of the Ceremonies.

St. James's, March 29. Her Majesty having appointed the Rt. Hon. John Lord Cutts to command Her Forces in Ireland, under his Grace the Duke of Ormond, his Lordship is preparing to go thither accordingly.

St. James's, April 4. Her Majesty has been pleased to appoint the Right Honourable the Lord High Treasurer of England to be Lord Lieutenant of the County of Cornwall; and his Grace the Duke of Grafton to be Lord Lieutenant of the County of Suffolk.

There being in a Printed Paper, Entituled, The Elixir, or, The Marrow of Foreign News, Published April 2. 1705, amongst other Things, the following Words, viz. 'Tis said we shall send a stout Squadron of Men of War to the Baltick; and that it was resolv'd last Thursday Night in Council forthwith to declare War against Sweden, if that Prince should persist in his Resolutions to carry on the War against Poland. Which being false and groundless, Orders are given for the Prosecution of the Authors, &c. with the utmost Severity of the Law, for spreading the said false and groundless Report.'
