Civil Service Commission, 28th June, 1957.

The Civil Service Commissioners hereby give notice that the following Regulations are published with the approval of the Lords Commissioners of H.M. Treasury, viz.:—

REGULATIONS FOR THE RECRUITMENT OF ASSISTANT GOVERNORS CLASS II (WOMEN) IN THE PRISON AND BORSTAL SERVICE (ENGLAND AND WALES) UNDER THE PRISON COMMISSION.

1. Women only may compete.

2. Age.

Candidates must be at least 21 years of age on 1st January, 1957. There is no upper age limit, but in appointing persons in a permanent capacity Departments expect regular and effective service for a reasonable period, and the Civil Service Commissioners will take this requirement into account.

3. Nationality.

To be eligible for appointment a candidate must be a British subject, a British protected person or a citizen of the Irish Republic and in addition satisfy one of the following conditions:—

(a) if she was a British subject, a British protected person or a citizen of the Irish Republic at birth:—

(i) at least one of her parents must be, or have been at death, a British subject, a British protected person or a citizen of the Irish Republic, or

(ii) the candidate must have resided in a country or territory within the Commonwealth or in the Irish Republic or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown or partly have so resided and partly been so employed for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of her appointment:

(b) if she was not a British subject, a British protected person or a citizen of the Irish Republic at birth, she must have resided in a country or territory within the Commonwealth or in the Irish Republic or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown or partly have so resided and partly been so employed for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of her appointment:

(c) if not qualified under sub-paragraph (a) or sub-paragraph (b) of this paragraph, she must satisfy the Commissioners that she is so closely connected with a country or territory within the Commonwealth either by ancestry, upbringing or residence, or by reason of national service, that an exception may properly be made in her favour.

4. Qualifications and experience

Candidates must have had a good general education. University qualifications are not essential. Those who do not possess at least a school certificate or equivalent academic qualification will be expected to show that they have made a serious attempt to supplement their education since leaving school.

In the selection of Assistant Governors, the assessment of qualities of mind and character plays a big part, and candidates must be able to hold their own with all ranks and to fill a position of responsibility in which tact, judgment, and complete integrity of character are required. A keen interest in difficult reformative work is essential, and a knowledge of working-class homes and conditions is looked for.

5. Health.

Successful candidates must satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners as to their health.

6. Competition.

Those candidates who from their applications seem to the Civil Service Commissioners and the Prison Commissioners to be best qualified will be invited to interview before a Selection Board consisting of representatives of the Civil Service Commissioners and the Prison Commissioners. The Board will recommend for appointment those who appear to be most suitable. Candidates should note that, if they are selected for interview, enquiries as to character will be made of referees and employers—including the present employer. The Selection Board will take into consideration the candidates' records of experience and education, any reports that they may receive from persons named by the candidates as referees or employers, and the personal qualities of the candidates as shown at this interview. The decision of the Civil Service Commissioners will be final.

7. Candidates trained as teachers.

Candidates who have been trained as teachers at public expense, elsewhere than in England and Wales, cannot be appointed until the consent of the appropriate education authority (e.g. the Scottish Education Department, the Ministry of Education for Northern Ireland) has been notified to the Commissioners.

8. Canvassing.

Any attempt on the part of candidates to enlist support for their applications through Members of Parliament or other influential persons, except as referees to be named by them in their application forms, will disqualify them for appointment.

9. Fee.

Every successful candidate will be required to pay a fee of £3 before the issue of a certificate of qualification for appointment.
