## From Donday, October 25. to Chuilday, October 28. 1669.

Lyme, October 23.

He 21 Inflant arrived here the Windfor and Eliqubeth of this place with Canvas, and other the ulual Lading from St. Malos, from whence they put to Sea the 18th. and te 1 us, That there has been lately Publifut a Proclamation,

Recalling all the French Subjects from Foreign-parts. That the Importation of Drapery from Holland is there feverely prohibited. That there is a great Prefs for Carpenters to be employed upon their Men of Warr. And that there was a warme and Confident Report, That Sie Thomas Allen had lately Seifed upon 2 Algier Men of Warr, the one of thirty, the other of Forty Guns.

Hull, Offol. 23. On Thursday arrived 3 Vessel of this place from Holland, informing, That on Sunday last happened a very Furious Storme, which had such violenc Effects in the Texel; that a ship of 500 tuns, Laden with Stuffs and Cloth, belonging to Holland, and bound for the Streights, was cast upon the Sands and peristied, with most of her Men: And, that several other Vessels were there lost, one whereof bound for the Indies, and divers others disabled.

They farther tell us, that about a week fince arrived in the Texell a Veffel of Newcassie much endammaged, and her Mass loss by the temperfueus weather, and had been forced to heave over-board a confiderable part of her Lading, which was Lead and Cloth; and, that it was feared that 2 other Vefsels which came out in her company from Newcassie, might have run much hazard.

Alfo, that 4 Veffels of London, which were driven to sea from Tarmonth lands, were put into the Texell. By the fame ill-weather 4-Laden Colliers were caft away on ' the Coafts near Bridlington.

Falmouth, Offob. 20. The 16th Instant put out to fea from this Port a Fleet of about 20 Merchant-Ihips, bound for the Streights, Jamaica, Portugal, and the Canaries, but, 'tis feared that ill-weather may divert, and put them back again.

Cracovia, Očt. 5. We are now Affured, That the Colfacks have wholly put themselves under the Obedience and Protection of the *Turks*, and that *Dorofenfko* has received the Commanders-Staffe as General, as also, that the Standard of Mahomet is born by them t This is Confirmed by above 30 Letters, amongst the reft by one from the Balla of *sile*firia to the King, who, amongst other things, forbids the Poles to approach near *Ukrania*, left he be forced to protect against them as Enemies to the Grand Seignior his Master.

The Jurkes have put a Garrilon into Raschord, a Town upon the River of Niestre, on the way between Podolie and Valachia, about 15 Leagues from Kamenicz, upon the Frontires of Poland.

The Lofs of this fo Confiderable a Province has given us no finall Allarum.

The Count d' Harach is bere with the Order of the Golden-Fleece, with which his Majefty will be fuddenly Invefted, His Majefty ferms to be much concerned how to beftow His Nomination to the Cardinalship which the Pope was pressed to Grane Him, being equally importun'd by the Popes Nuncio, and the Bishop of *cefters*.

The Kig has given Power to the Dietive of Cracovie ,

to Affemble themfelves within 4 Leagues of this place, fo that in little time they may repair themfelves for the former Rupture, and make choice of their Reprefentatives to be prefent in the General-Affembly.

Hague, November 1. The Deputies of 2 stephen have written to the States defiring that the Xown of I euterum feituated near the Frontiers of Munfier and County of Gleves may be fortified, and put into a pollure of defence, which may ferve as a Bulwork for the prefervation of the Countreys Guelders, Utreths, Freize and Groning, e, flowing that the Fortifications thereof might be perfected for the expence of 100 thouland Francks; and if neglected might probably fall in the hands of fuch as might attempt the diffurbance, of their Peace, to the irreparable detriment of these Countreys; but this being to fall under the confideration of the other Provinces which are already not overforwards in furnishing their proportions to things of this nature, tis believed inay meet with fome difficulty.

The Vicechancellour Romfwinckel is fetu ned from Cleves leeming to perswade, that the Elector. His Mastet is no Enemy to the design on foot for the fecuring of the publick peace, and that his territoryes lying convenient for the Defence of the Rhine and Meuse, hemight in Reason expect some encouragement for that service.

The Spanish Ambassador Gamara is gone to Bruffels to consult with the Constable of Castille about the asufurance which is to be given to Swedeland in point of Subsidyes, whole journey making the address of this State lets necessary in that particular, the Heer Vrybergen is ordered to return home,

The Deputies of the Adviralty met the 30 of the last Month. From Bordes and other parts of Fran e we are filled with complaints of the great Imposts layd upon our Marchandiles and Manufactures, which may reduce the States to come to a fudden Resolution in making them a like return.

This rown is full of Foreigne Officers who come to offer their fervice to the States, who have already agreed with 5 olonels for the raifing of 3 Regiments of footjeach of them to confift of 10 Companyes and 100 men in each Company; and 2 Régiments of Horde, 500 in each Regiment 2 to all of which the States are to give armes, and 6 Rizdollers for every foot foundier; and 40 for every horfinan brought into this Channey.

Ao for every horiman brought into this Country. Paris, Nov. 2. On V vedneiday last the Venetian-Ambsflador (in an Audience) prelented His Majefly with the Particulars of the Captulation for the Surrender of Gandia, of which the Principal Articles are as followetb.

Articles of Peace screed upon between the most serene Republick of Venice, and the Outoman Port, the 19th of September, 1669, by the Captain-General, and the Grand-Vilier, and Ratify'd by the Senate the 18th of Octob, the fame year.

1. That the City of Candia shall be delive ed by the Captain=General into the Hands of the Grand Visiers to Enjoy and Dispose of Absolutely, as Place belonging to the Grand-Seignior. 2. That all Forts, and Principal Ports-of the ifle

2. That a'l Fo es, and Principal Ports-of the Isle Cantia, with the Little-Islands adjacent, which are no in the Possession of the Most Screne Republick of Veric, fiall continue fill under the Obedience of the faid Republick, in the fame manner as they were before the begining of the Warr.

3. That all the Islands which the Most Sorene Republick of *Venice* posses in the *Archipillago*, and other Seas, shall continue as before under the entire and absolute Obedience of the faid Republick.

4. That the Fort of *Cliffe*, and all other places Conqu red by the *Armes* of the Moft Serene Republick of Venice in *Da.matia* and *Albania* from the *Turks*, shall remain to the faid Republick, in Soveraignty, and Independent.

5. That neither of the 2 parties (hall be bound, or obliged to supply the other with any summ of Moneys, or any other thing whatloever, under pretence of Reimbursement of the Charge and Experces of the Warr, or by way of Pension, Presents or any other *Title* whatloever.

6. That the Grand Visier permit and grant fo much time to the Captain Generall as is necessary for the carrying out of the Citty of *Candia* all amunition either for ware or food. That he confert that all Soldiers march out of the Place with their arms and baggage. That he permit the inhabitants which will not continue there to retire whether they please with their Familyes, Rings, and Jewels. That he Confert that the Captain General may carry away all the Relicks, Sacred Veilels and all Onaments belonging to the Churches.

Onaments belonging to the Churches. 7. That the Captain General may take out of the Citty of *Candia* 320 Brafs Guns which are to continue in the free power and difpolal of the most ferene Republick of Venice.

8. That the Prisoners and flaver, on both fides made during the fiege of *Candia* the immediately reftored. The Captain General and the Grand Visier having already given out their necessary O.ders' for the Execution of this Article.

9. That all these Articles agreed and executed faithfully, Both partyes shall swear and promise to preferve the peace reciprocally and inviolably for the advantage of Trade, and the mutual quiet of both their Su jefts.

Trade, and the mutual quiet of both their Su jefts. His Majefty feems much offended with the Duke de Navailles whom he charges as having returned home contrary to otder, and has commanded him to fend him a journal of all that paffed during that Expedition, with the reafons moving him to his fudden deperture and to fend him the Originals of all Or 'ers given or fent to him.

Monficur Laisne having defended the Duke , affirming he had Orders for his Return, is confined to Quimpercorantin in Bretagne till farther Order.

tin in Bretagne till farther Order. Edenburgh, Oft. 19. This day his Grace rode from the Palace of Hollyrood, to the Parliament House, after this manner: 1 he Earl of Arrol, Lord High Constable, with a numerous Train of Gentlemen and Partifans, being fate in his Robes at the Gate of the Parliament-house, to welcome and guard the Members, as they alighted, into the House about 11 of the Clock the Lord Chancellor and Earl Marshal, with the Purse & Mace, and 6 Trumpets before them, came from the Palace to the Parliament-house, according to Cuflome, to fee all things in readinels, and to receive the Lord High Commissioner at his Entrance. A little after, fet forth 6 Trumpets, and 6 Heraulds, after whom followed in Order and good Equipage on horsback, the Burgefles, Knights, Lords, Bishops, Viscounts, Earls, and the Archbishop of St Andrews : Then 6. Trumpets and 2. Kettle-Drums in rich Liveries, after ehem 6. Heraulds, and Lyon King-at, Arms, in his Formalitics, bareheaded; after him came allo bare, his Majeflies Gentleman-Ulher, then the

Lord *Tefter*, carrying his Majefties Commilsion, next the Earl of *Marre* with the Sword, the Earl of *Argyle* with the Scepter, and the Marquis of *Duglas* with the Crown': Then the Lord High-Commilsioner binifelf, attended by feveral Gentlemen on foot bareheaded, and a large Train of his Servants in Rich Liveries followed by Duke *Hamilton*, after him a Guard, followed by four Trumpets and Kettle-Drum before his Majefties Troops of Guard: The Citizens being in Arms, and drawn on both fides the way, from the Pallace to the Parliament-houfe. At his Entrance into the Parliament-houfe, all the Guns were difcharged round the Caftle.

His Grace being fate in the Chair of State, and the Regalia placed on a Table before him, and the three Estates seated, the Bishop of Dunblane baving Prayed, his Majesties Commission to the Earl of Lander daill was stirft read, and then the doubtfull Elections of Members referred to Examination

This done, His Majefties Letter to the Parliament was twice read, and afterwards enlarg, ed on by the Lord Commissioner, feconded by a shorter one from the Lord Chancellor, perfwading them to a concurrence with His Majefties defigne of uniting the two Kingdoms. Afterwards they proceeded to the election of the Lords of the Articles: The Nobility choofing 8. Bishops, and the Bishops 8. Noblemen, and these 16. making choyce of 8. Knights and as many Burgefles, who with the 8. Officers of State make up the number of the faid Lords of the Articles, by whom all affairs are to be prepared for the house, and are accordingly ordered to fit every morning and afternoon. This done the Parliament adjourned till thursday: the three Estaves returning in the fame order as they came to Holyrood Houfe, where they were again welcomed by all the Guns of the Caffle, On thurfday the Kings letter was again read in the Houfe, the answer prepared by the Lords of the Articles; being read and debated that and the day following, was agreed to by all the Members, one perfon only excepted, and is now published, together with his Majeffies Letter and the Lord Commissioners Speech.
