Lyme, October 23.

**T**He 21 Instant arrived here the *Windsor* and *Elizabeth* of this place with Canvas, and other the usual Lading from *St. Malos*, from whence they put to Sea the 18th. and to us, That there has been lately Publish'd a Proclamation, Recalling all the French Subjects from Foreign-parts. That the Importation of Drapery from *Holland* is there severely prohibited. That there is a great Preis for Carpenters to be employed upon their Men of Warr. And that there was a warme and Confident Report, That *Sir Thomas Allen* had lately Seised upon 2 *Algier* Men of Warr, the one of thirty, the other of Forty Guns.

*Hull*, Octob. 23. On Thursday arrived 3 Vessels of this place from *Holland*, informing, That on Sunday last happened a very Furious Storme, which had such violent Effects in the *Texel*; that a ship of 500 tuns, Laden with Stuffs and Cloth, belonging to *Holland*, and bound for the *Streights*, was cast upon the Sands and perished, with most of her Men: And, that several other Vessels were there lost, one whereof bound for the *Indies*, and divers others disabled.

They farther tell us, that about a week since arrived in the *Texell* a Vessel of *Newcastle* much endamaged, and her Masts lost by the tempestuous weather, and had been forced to heave over-board a considerable part of her Lading, which was Lead and Cloth; and, that it was feared that 2 other Vessels which came out in her company from *Newcastle*, might have run much hazard.

Also, that 4 Vessels of *London*, which were driven to Sea from *Tarmonth-sands*, were put into the *Texell*. By the same ill-weather 4 Laden Colliers were cast away on the Coasts near *Bridlington*.

*Falmouth*, Octob. 20. The 16th Instant put out to Sea from this Port a Fleet of about 20 Merchant-ships, bound for the *Streights*, *Jamaica*, *Portugal*, and the *Canaries*, but, 'tis feared that ill-weather may divert, and put them back again.

*Cracovia*, Oct. 5. We are now Assured, That the *Cossacks* have wholly put themselves under the Obedience and Protection of the *Turks*, and that *Dorosenko* has received the Commanders-Staffe as General, as also, that the Standard of *Mahomet* is born by them: This is Confirmed by above 30 Letters, amongst the rest by one from the *Bassa* of *Silesia* to the King, who, amongst other things, forbids the *Poles* to approach near *Ukrania*, lest he be forced to proceed against them as Enemies to the Grand Signior his Master.

The *Turkes* have put a Garrison into *Raschow*, a Town upon the River of *Niepre*, on the way between *Podolie* and *Valachia*, about 15 Leagues from *Kamenietz*, upon the Frontiers of *Poland*.

The Loss of this so Considerable a Province has given us no small Allarum.

The Count *d'Harach* is here with the Order of the Golden-Fleece, with which his Majesty will be suddenly Invested. His Majesty seems to be much concerned how to bestow His Nomination to the Cardinalship which the Pope was pleased to Grant Him, being equally importun'd by the Popes Nuncio, and the Bishop of *Cesiers*.

The King has given Power to the *Dietine* of *Cracovia*

to Assemble themselves within 4 Leagues of this place, so that in little time they may repair themselves for the former Rupture, and make choice of their Representatives to be present in the General-Assembly.

*Hague*, November 1. The Deputies of *Zusphen* have written to the States desiring that the Town of *Leurtum* situated near the Frontiers of *Adunfier* and County of *Cleves* may be fortified and put into a posture of defence, which may serve as a Bulwork for the preservation of the Countreys *Gueders*, *Utrecht*, *Freize* and *Groningae*, shewing that the Fortifications thereof might be perfected for the expence of 100 thousand Francks; and if neglected might probably fall in the hands of such as might attempt the disturbance of their Peace, to the irreparable detriment of these Countreys; but this being to fall under the consideration of the other Provinces which are already nor overforwards in furnishing their proportions to things of this nature, 'tis believed may meet with some difficulty.

The Vicechancellour *Komswinkel* is returned from *Cleves* seeming to perswade, that the Elector His Master is no Enemy to the assign on foot for the securing of the publick peace, and that his territories lying convenient for the Defence of the *Rhine* and *Meuse*, he might in Reason expect some encouragement for that service.

The Spanish Ambassador *Ganara* is gone to *Brussels* to consult with the Constable of *Castille* about the assurance which is to be given to *Sweden* in point of Subsidies, whose journey making the addresses of this State less necessary in that particular, the Heer *Vrybergen* is ordered to return home.

The Deputies of the Admiralty met the 30 of the last Month. From *Bordeaux* and other parts of *France* we are fill'd with complaints of the great Impolts layd upon our Marchandises and Manufactures, which may reduce the States to come to a sudden Resolution in making them a like return.

This Town is full of Foreigne Officers who come to offer their service to the States, who have already agreed with 5 Colonels for the raising of 3 Regiments of foot, each of them to consist of 10 Companies and 100 men in each Company; and 2 Regiments of Horse, 500 in each Regiment: to all of which the States are to give armes, and 6 Rixdollers for every foot soldier, and 40 for every horseman brought into this Countrey.

*Paris*, Nov. 2. On Wednesday last the *Venetian* Ambassador (in an Audience) presented His Majesty with the Particulars of the Capitulation for the Surrender of *Gandia*, of which the Principal Articles are as followeth.

Articles of Peace agreed upon between the most Serene Republick of Venice, and the Otoman Port, the 19th of September, 1669, by the Captain-General, and the Grand-Vizier, and Ratify'd by the Senate the 18th of Octob. the same year.

1. That the City of *Candia* shall be deliv'd by the Captain-General into the Hands of the Grand Vizier, to Enjoy and Dispose of Absolutely, as Place belonging to the Grand-Signior.

2. That all Forts, and Principal Ports of the Isle *Candia*, with the Little-Ilands adjacent, which are not in the Possession of the Most Serene Republick of Venice,

shall continue still under the Obedience of the said Republick, in the same manner as they were before the beginning of the Warr.

3. That all the Islands which the Most Serene Republick of Venice possess in the *Archippilago*, and other Seas, shall continue as before under the entire and absolute Obedience of the said Republick.

4. That the Fort of *Cliffa*, and all other places Conquered by the *Armes* of the Most Serene Republick of Venice in *Da-mania* and *Aibania* from the *Turks*, shall remain to the said Republick, in Sovereignty, and Independence.

5. That neither of the 2 parties shall be bound, or obliged to supply the other with any sum of Moneys, or any other thing whatsoever, under pretence of Reimbursement of the Charge and Expenses of the Warr, or by way of Pension, Presents, or any other Title whatsoever.

6. That the Grand Visier permit and grant so much time to the Captain General as is necessary for the carrying out of the City of *Candia* all ammunition either for war or food. That he consent that all Soldiers march out of the Place with their armes and baggage. That he permit the inhabitants which will not continue there to retire whether they please with their Families, Rings, and Jewels. That he Consent that the Captain General may carry away all the Relicks, Sacred Vessels and all Ornaments belonging to the Churches.

7. That the Captain General may take out of the City of *Candia* 320 Brass Guns which are to continue in the free power and disposal of the most serene Republick of Venice.

8. That the Prisoners and slaves, on both sides made during the siege of *Candia* be immediately restored. The Captain General and the Grand Visier having already given out their necessary Orders for the Execution of this Article.

9. That all these Articles agreed and executed faithfully, Both parties shall swear and promise to preserve the peace reciprocally and inviolably for the advantage of Trade, and the mutual quiet of both their Subjects.

His Majesty seems much offended with the Duke de *Navailles* whom he charges as having returned home contrary to order, and has commanded him to send him a journal of all that passed during that Expedition, with the reasons moving him to his sudden departure and to send him the Originals of all Orders given or sent to him.

Monsieur *Laisne* having defended the Duke, affirming he had Orders for his Return, is confined to *Quimpercorantia* in *Britagne* till farther Order.

*Edenburgh, Oct. 19.* This day his Grace rode from the Palace of *Hollyrood*, to the Parliament House, after this manner: The Earl of *Arrol*, Lord High Constable, with a numerous Train of Gentlemen and Partisans, being sate in his Robes at the Gate of the Parliament-house, to welcome and guard the Members, as they alighted, into the House, about 11 of the Clock the Lord Chancellor and Earl Marshal, with the Purse & Mace, and 6 Trumpets before them, came from the Palace to the Parliament-house, according to Custom, to see all things in readines, and to receive the Lord High Commissioner at his Entrance. A little after, set forth 6 Trumpets, and 6 Heralds, after whom followed in Order and good Equipage on horsback, the Burgeses, Knights, Lords, Bishops, Viscounts, Earls, and the Archbishop of *St Andrews*: Then 6 Trumpets and 2 Kettle-Drums in rich Liveries, after them 6 Heralds, and *Lyon* King-at-Arms, in his Formalities, bareheaded; after him came also bare, his Majesties Gentleman-Usher, then the

Lord *Tester*, carrying his Majesties Commission, next the Earl of *Marre* with the Sword, the Earl of *Argyle* with the Scepter, and the Marquis of *Duglas* with the Crown: Then the Lord High-Commissioner himself, attended by several Gentlemen on foot bareheaded, and a large Train of his Servants in Rich Liveries followed by Duke *Hamilton*, after him a Guard, followed by four Trumpets and Kettle-Drum before his Majesties Troops of Guard: The Citizens being in Arms, and drawn on both sides the way, from the Palace to the Parliament-house. At his Entrance into the Parliament-house, all the Guns were discharged round the Castle.

His Grace being sate in the Chair of State, and the Regalia placed on a Table before him, and the three Estates seated, the Bishop of *Dumblane* having Prayed, his Majesties Commission to the Earl of *Lauderdaill* was first read, and then the doubtfull Elections of Members referred to Examination

This done, His Majesties Letter to the Parliament was twice read, and afterwards enlarged on by the Lord Commissioner, seconded by a shorter one from the Lord Chancellor, persuading them to a concurrence with His Majesties designe of uniting the two Kingdoms. Afterwards they proceeded to the election of the Lords of the Articles: The Nobility choosing 8. Bishops, and the Bishops 8. Noblemen, and these 16. making choyce of 8. Knights and as many Burgeses, who with the 8. Officers of State make up the number of the said Lords of the Articles, by whom all affairs are to be prepared for the house, and are accordingly ordered to sit every morning and afternoon. This done the Parliament adjourned till thursday: the three Estates returning in the same order as they came to Holyrood-House, where they were again welcomed by all the Guns of the Castle. On thursday the Kings letter was again read in the House, the answer prepared by the Lords of the Articles, being read and debated that and the day following, was agreed to by all the Members, one person only excepted, and is now published, together with his Majesties Letter and the Lord Commissioners Speech.
